THE TOURNAMENT POLICY BOARD

The Tournament Policy Board establishes goals and policies for the operation of the PGA TOUR. The 10-member Board is composed of the following:

Four Player Directors elected by the PGA TOUR membership. A Player Director also serves as Vice President of the PGA of America.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board.

Three PGA Directors, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the PGA TOUR. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner, conducts tournament play.

ABOUT THE COMMISSIONER

Deane R. Beman

Born: April 22, 1938

Entering his 18th year as Commissioner of the PGA TOUR, Deane R. Beman has overseen the most explosive period of growth in the TOUR's history, since succeeding Joseph C. Dey, Jr., on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the "business side" of the PGA TOUR has shown dramatic growth and now includes many heretofore uncharted paths, each designed to help encourage continued prosperity and to ensure the future of the game.

PGA TOUR Investments, Inc., created eight years ago, has already grown to include 14 "Stadium Golf" facilities nationally with more clubs in the planning or construction stages across the United States. 1989 saw the unveiling of TPC International with three TPC's in Japan with more to come. In December, 1986, in Clearwater, FL, the PGA TOUR opened the first in a network of "Family Golf Centers." In 1989 the TOUR opened another "Family Golf Center" at the Golf Club of Jacksonville, a municipal course the PGA TOUR built for the city of Jacksonville. In addition to providing state-of-the-art tournament and teaching golf arenas, Tournament Players Clubs and Family Golf Centers have been instrumental in the growth of PGA TOUR assets, which have climbed from \$730,000 to more than \$128.5 million during the Beman era.

PGA TOUR Properties, the joint marketing venture of the TOUR and PGA of America, continues to make steady progress in its quest to open new opportunities in golf for commercial sponsors and the TOUR's members. The Nabisco Golf competitions on the Regular TOUR and the Vantage Cup involvement with the Senior TOUR, an infusion of millions of dollars combined for players, sponsors and charities, is the largest example of these efforts.

PGA TOUR Productions, introduced in 1985, is the TOUR's first-ever in-house TV/audio-visual production entity, the creative possibilities of which are nearly limitless. Tournament highlight films, vignettes, commercials, specialty pieces and the acclaimed "Inside the PGA TOUR" weekly half-hour show airing on ESPN are several of Production's successful projects. In 1990 "Inside the PGA TOUR" was nominated for an ACE Award honoring cable television's best.

Other important innovations introduced during the Beman administration include a professional Agronomy department, the Nabisco Stats program, electronic scoreboards, "Official Golf Destinations" and Centinela Fitness Training Center.

Competitively, the Beman era has witnessed the birth of the SENIOR PGA TOUR which started in 1980 with two events and has grown to 40 events this year and the Ben Hogan Tour, which enjoyed a successful birth last year. In all, over 120 tournaments are on the combined slate with prize money having increased from \$8.2 million in 1974 to over \$80 million this year.

The Player Retirement Plan, inaugurated in 1983, has already contributed over \$12 million toward the future benefit of active Plan participants, and larger contributions are expected in future years.

Charity, easily the TOUR's leading money winner during the Beman era, continues to benefit at a yearly record pace. Contributions by American Golf Sponsors to charitable organizations rose to another unprecedented total of \$20.2 million in 1990.

During his active years as a player, Beman established an enviable slate of accomplishments, compiling one of the great amateur records of all time. He won United States Amateur titles in 1960 and 1963 and the British Amateur championship in 1959. As an amateur, Beman was a member of four Walker Cup teams, four World Amateur Cup teams and three U.S. Americas Cup squads.

At the age of 29, in 1967, he left a prosperous insurance brokerage firm in Bethesda, MD, to join the PGA TOUR as a full-time player. During his six-year professional career, he won the 1969 Texas Open, 1970 Greater Milwaukee Open, 1972 Quad Cities Open and 1973 Shrine-Robinson Classic.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PGA TOUR

"The PGA TOUR is enjoying these days the healthiest period of its existence. The reasons are too numerous to mention here, but in the opinion of many, including myself, the PGA TOUR is one of the last true forms of capitalism left in the world of sports today. Everyone starts out at zero the first of the year, and in the most literal sense, everyone starts out the same each week...One is merely paid for performance on the professional golf tour, and that may be one of the reasons it is held in such high esteem by the public. We as players, along with administrators, must endeavor to protect this idea forever."

From the forward by Ben Crenshaw in the recently published Doubleday book, The History of the PGA TOUR, by Al Barkow.

It is not always easy to discover the exact beginning of something. So it is with the PGA TOUR. Certainly, there were professionals who competed against each other from the earliest days of the game.

Then on New Year's Day, 1895, ten professional golfers played 36 holes of stroke play and competed for money. The total purse was \$150 and the winner took home \$75. Due to the fact that a large gallery had come to witness the event, the New York Times covered the tournament. Shortly thereafter, tournaments began to pop up across the country. There was the Western Open in 1899. But this was not "tour" golf. The events lacked continuity.

Interest in the game, however, continued to grow. American professionals were rapidly improving and when John McDermott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open, enthusiasm for the game blossomed.

Helping this growth was a commercially backed "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray. The duo travelled across the country and attracted good crowds wherever they stopped during the warmer months of 1913. However, the biggest explosion for the game occurred that September. A 20-year old "local boy", Francis Ouimet, defeated the pair in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, MA. Suddenly, golf became front page news and a game for everyone.

In the early Twenties, the PGA TOUR could have seen its first development. Tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas and Florida. These events were held in the winter and the golfers played their way east and up to Pinehurst in the spring. By the middle of the decade, the Tour was doing relatively well--offering \$77,000 in total. What's more, resorts, hotels and Chambers of Commerce began to realize the publicity value professional golf brought to their facilities. Names like Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen and Bobby Jones became folk heroes.

In the thirties, The TOUR continued to grow. The PGA of America was providing support and despite the nation's financial woes during the period, golf tournaments continued to attract good crowds. It is interesting to look back at some figures of the time. Paul Runyan was the leading money winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Last year, the top two money winners-- Greg Norman and Wayne Levi-- each earned over \$1 million.

The names of the golfers continued to become household words. In the late 1930's and early 1940's Sam Snead's name started to appear in the headlines with regularity. Then came Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, Jimmy Demaret and others who were beginning to gain nationwide fame.

The TOUR became more structured following World War II and then exploded in the late 1950's and early 60's. Flip through the **Facts and Figures** section of this TOUR Book and look at such areas as leading money winners and growth of tournament purses to

witness the sudden and continuing growth.

Once television became a player in the game, the eyes of the world were on golf. This exposure inspired millions to try the game and at the same time, TV rights fees sent purses soaring. The bulk of these rights fees, which are distributed by the PGA TOUR to all co-sponsors, have gone back into the purses, accounting for the tripling of prize money in the last decade.

The touring professionals began to gain some control of the TOUR in late 1968. Joseph C. Dey was the first commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974 and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the value of tournament purses has escalated at an unprecedented rate; PGA TOUR assets have grown from \$730,000 in 1974 to nearly \$129 million today, and total revenues have increased from \$3.9 million to over \$140 million in the same time period.

Since 1938 PGA TOUR events have donated over \$165 million dollars to charity. Each of the last 14 years have seen charitable contributions increase dramatically, to the point where over \$100 million has been donated since 1984. The slogan, "The leading money winner on the PGA TOUR is Charity," is definitely not just a catch phrase.

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR is also much broader today. The Senior PGA TOUR is considered by many as the sports success story of the 1980's. Last year, the PGA TOUR, with the help of the Ben Hogan Company and PGA of America sections, added another addition to its family. Named for one of golf's greats, the Ben Hogan Tour was created to help golfers sharpen their skills with hopes of earning a place on either the PGA TOUR or the Senior PGA TOUR.

Also continuing to grow is the Tournament Players Club Network. When the PGA TOUR opened the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass in 1980, it beckoned the era of Stadium Golf. Owned and operated by the TOUR, the concept means these courses are the only major league sports arenas owned by the players themselves.

The TPC Network has expanded to 14 clubs in cities across the world, with more clubs in either the construction or the planning stages.

Five years ago the PGA TOUR opened its first Family Golf Center in Clearwater, FL, and the TOUR has constructed municipal courses for Jacksonville, FL and Miami, FL. This, and other concepts, are expected to mature with the PGA TOUR.

1991 SEASON TO CULMINATE WITH TOUR CHAMPIONSHIP



The 1991 PGA TOUR will close its season with THE TOUR Championship Oct. 31-Nov. 3 at Pinehurst #2 in North Carolina. The top 30 money winners on the TOUR will compete for the largest purse on the TOUR, \$2 million with \$360,000 going to the winner.

The event will also serve as a climax for the \$2 million PGA TOUR Charity Team Competition, in which the top team earns \$500,000 for charitable concerns affiliated with the winning team's tournament. The PGA TOUR Player of the Year Award and the Arnold Palmer Award, which is given to the leading money winner on the PGA TOUR, should also be determined by the tournament.

The PGA TOUR will be returning to Pinehurst #2 for the first time since the 1980 Hall of Fame Classic. Designed by Donald Ross, Pinehurst #2 has previously hosted the PGA Championship and the Ryder Cup matches.

THE TOUR Championships, in just five years, has become one of the premier events on TOUR. The roll of past champions consists of Ben Crenshaw, Tom Watson, Curtis Strange, Tom Kite and in 1990, Jodie Mudd. Fans have been treated to exciting golf, with the last three tournaments ending in sudden death playoffs.

ABC Sports will broadcast the tournament for the first time in 1991.

Million Dollar Bonus For Sub-60 Round

Hilton Hotels Corporation is the Official Hotel of the PGA TOUR, SENIOR PGA TOUR, Ben Hogan Tour and the PGA of America.

As part of this unique agreement, Hilton will be offering an impressive \$1,000,000 bonus for any player who shoots a sub-60 round on either the 1991 PGA TOUR or SENIOR TOUR and has also instituted the Hilton Tournament and Course Record Challenges.

"We are pleased to enter into this partnership with Hilton," said Commissioner Deane R. Beman. "I think these rewards will provide the motivation for some memorable player achievements and help to showcase the exciting action of the PGA TOUR."

The winner of the Hilton One-Million Dollar Bonus for a sub-60 round will receive \$500,000 with another \$250,000 going to PGA TOUR Charities and \$250,000 going to PGA of America Junior Golf Fund.

Al Geiberger became the only player in PGA TOUR history to shoot a competitive round of less than 60 when he fired a 13-under-par 59 during the second round of the 1977 Danny Thomas Memphis Classic at Colonial Country Club in Memphis, TN. In 1990, David Frost made a run at 59 during the second round of the Northern Telecom Open, finishing with a spectacular 11-under-par 60. It was only the eighth time in TOUR annals that score was shot.

Hilton will also sponsor the Hilton Tournament and Course Record Challenges where any player who sets a tournament or course record on either the Regular or Senior TOUR will carry a \$5,000 credit balance to be used in any domestic U.S. Hilton hotel.

In 1990 four tournament records were established on the PGA TOUR, while 11 course records were set or tied. On the Senior TOUR, 11 tournament records were set or tied and 10 course records were set or tied.

The original concept of the PGA TOUR, The Tournament Players Clubs have within the decade of the 80's gone from a dream to a network that now encompasses 22 courses in 12 states and with the addition of TPC International, two countries.

It was the TOUR's view that the spectator had been left out in golf course design throughout the years and when it came time for the PGA TOUR to build its own course, the opportunity presented itself for the TOUR to build a course that not only challenged the players, but allowed spectators to see the action as never before.

It's called "Stadium Golf" and once you've viewed a tournament on a Stadium Golf Course, you'll understand why the network has grown in such a short period of time.


Spectator mounds abound that afford fans unrestricted views whether on tee shots, fairway shots or on the greens. In fact, the 18th hole at the original TPC at Sawgrass can accommodate crowds of some 30,000 people-all with a clean view of the action. You won't see any periscopes at an event on a Players Club course.

The network began in 1980 with the club at Sawgrass where it annually hosts THE PLAYERS Championship, and quickly grew into the present number of 22. All TPCs are designed to host PGA TOUR or Senior PGA TOUR events and to date the clubs have been designed by some of the top architects in the business-Pete Dye, Arnold Palmer, Arthur Hills, Jay Morrish, Bob Cupp, the Von Hagge/Devlin team and Jack Nicklaus to name just a few.

In addition, one of the things that adds a bit of spice to all TPCs is that a PGA TOUR player (or in some cases, two) are assigned to serve as a consultant to the designer. To date, Ed Sneed, Tom Weiskopf, Fuzzy Zoeller, Hubert Green, Craig Stadler, Ben Crenshaw, Al Geiberger and Chi Chi Rodriguez have been among those lending their expertise to the TPC Network.

In reality a nationwide country club, a membership at one TPC affords the member a chance to play at any of the other clubs across the country and an opportunity to view the greatest players in the world in action on his own course once a year.

Since the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass opened, the TPC Network has now truly become the best of the best in America.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS CONTINUE TO GROW

The American Golf Sponsors and the PGA TOUR were proud to announce last year that the \$20 million mark in charitable contributions in a single year has been surpassed for the first time. In 1990, the AGS donated \$20,190,762 to charity from proceeds generated from PGA TOUR events.

"It is to the credit of the AGS and the many fine volunteers that give so much of their time, that this milestone has been reached," said PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman.

"The AGS is proud of its association with the many fine communities and organizations that make an endeavor such as this possible," said Jim Bell, President of the AGS. "Without their dedication and support this effort would not be possible."

The money donated in 1990 brings to \$165 million the total that has been given to charity by PGA TOUR events since 1938. Since the AGS was formed in 1977, the organization has contributed \$151 million of that total.

1990 also marked the 14th consecutive year that the previous year's donations had been surpassed.

In addition to the money earned through the proceeds of tournaments, the PGA TOUR also sponsors the PGA TOUR Charity Team Competition, in which 40 events compete for \$2 million with the winning team earning \$500,000 for charity. Last year Phoenix, AZ area charitable organizations were the beneficiaries of the first place winnings as the Phoenix Open won the competition by a slim margin over the Honda Classic.

PGA TOUR STATS

An integral part of the PGA TOUR since 1980, the PGA TOUR Stats program has helped to clearly indicate who the most skilled TOUR players are in a variety of categories.

The ten stat categories are: Scoring, Driving Distance, Driving Accuracy, Greens In Regulation, Par-Breakers, Putting, Eagles, Birdies, Sand Saves and All-Around.

Statistics are gathered at each TOUR event by the walking scorers who accompany each group of players. The TOUR's Official Statistician then enters the raw data into an on-site computer, which then feeds the information back to TOUR Headquarters in Florida. There the weekly lists and standings are tabulated. Epson computer products are used to gather and compile the data.

Since its inception, the PGA TOUR Stats program has proven to be a real eye-opener. Prior to 1980, only the most sophisticated golf fans would have recognized Calvin Peete's amazing accuracy off the tee. However, with Calvin now winning the last ten consecutive Driving Accuracy titles, almost everyone realizes that Calvin is the game's most accurate player.

Another benefit of the PGA TOUR Stats program is felt by the players. Many of today's TOUR players have found the statistical printouts available at each TOUR site to be an excellent source of information about their own respective games. For example, a player can be working on his bunker play in practice and can chart on a weekly basis his progress through the keeping of statistics.

In order to be eligible for the PGA TOUR Stats program, a player must complete a minimum of 50 rounds in 1991.

NABISCO SCOREBOARDS

The PGA TOUR over the years has introduced many innovations to enhance the spectator enjoyment of the tournaments. One such innovation was "Stadium Golf," another was the electronic scoreboards. The introduction of the Nabisco Scoreboards in 1981 provided up-to-the-minute information about action on the course to all spectators.

The electronic Nabisco Scoreboard systems that travel the PGA TOUR are indeed a phenomenon. Not only do they bring status reports, current scores, biographical and statistical information, special reports and messages to players and fans spread out over many acres, but they also survive a gamut of weather conditions as well as the vagaries of travel as the two systems leapfrog around the nation.

In 1988 they became even more phenomenal with the introduction of new state-of-the-art technology. By the end of the 1988 TOUR schedule the existing systems were replaced by scoreboards featuring the new "Glowcube" technology from Daktronics Inc. of Brookings, S.D.—the manufacturer of the electronic scoreboards for the 1988 Winter Olympics. This "Glowcube" technology driven by Epson computers allows for faster scoring, better graphics and features the use of radio signals to transmit the data. The need for telephone lines from the greens to the scoreboards and from the scoreboards to the computer center in the van was eliminated.

Nabisco Golf will be responsible for the transport, set up and maintenance of the electronic Nabisco Scoreboard systems while PGA TOUR personnel will be responsible for the on-course operation during tournament week.

John Adams has found a steady improvement in his game the last few years and he has every reason to believe the upward swing will continue.

Three years ago, after going to noted teacher Jim Flick for help, John was able to finish first in the Greens in Regulation Nabisco statistic. He won by a slim margin over Dave Barr, hitting the greens average of .739 percent of the time. "Jim Flick is the reason I won it," John said.

In 1989, his progress continued and he had two top ten finishes and earned more than \$100,000 for the first time. Last year he back-to-back top 10 finishes in The International and Chattanooga Classic and went on to his best money year.

"It was a rebuilding year," he said of 1989. "I'm still trying to get back to the way I played in the early 1980's. Jim (Flick) has taken me from a large hook to a straight ball to a fade and it has helped a lot."

John doesn't remember how old he was when he started to play golf. Smiling he says, "All I know is I was as young as I could be and still hold a club."

In those days, he does know he played crosshanded and putted the same. "When I was about three-years old, I finally gave up playing crosshanded."

His father was a golf professional in the Midland, TX area, but retired when John was still a youngster. His father continued to coach and assist him through the years but in 1986 he passed away.

John played in junior events around Texas and eventually headed for Brevard Junior College. He transferred to Arizona State University, and while there, he won the 1975 Arizona State Amateur championship.

His first year on TOUR was 1978 and he found little success. Then, as he says, "I found a course I could play, but we don't play it any longer."

He was referring to Pinehurst No. 2. In the fall of 1982, he tied with Jay Haas in the Hall of Fame Classic, but lost in a playoff when he bogeyed the second extra hole. However, his check for \$27,000 was more than he had won in any single season. It boosted his season earnings to \$54,014, and that's more than he had won through his first four years on the TOUR combined.

Fulton Allem was a fine player in South Africa before he decided it was time to cast his lot with the pros on the PGA TOUR. Since doing so in the Fall of 1987, he has demonstrated the skills needed to be a valuable member for a long time.

When he won the South African PGA Championship in 1987, it qualified him for the NEC World Series of Golf, to be played at Firestone Country Club in Akron, OH, later that year.

He arrived with little fanfare but he departed as a man with a future on the TOUR. He battled Curtis Strange to the finish, playing four solid rounds and finishing alone in second place.

He earned \$86,400 and that was more than enough for him to qualify for his TOUR player's card. And, it also let him finish among the top 25 money winners for the year and thus gain exempt status.

"I was planning on going to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall," he said, "but I wasn't looking forward to all the pressure that goes with it. I felt I could play well enough to be on the PGA TOUR if I had the opportunity."

Since then, he has put together three solid years to maintain his exempt status with ease.

Allem has been a winner on his home circuit but he points out, "I had 18 second-place finishes before I finally won."

As it was reported in South Africa, "The dynamic Allem couldn't break through after 10 tough years of trying but he subsequently annexed four titles in one year.

"The cherry on top was his superb win the Lexington PGA over a difficult Wanderers course in late January (1987) where he outdeuled a plucky Hugh Baiocchi over the final stretch to claim the most important success of his career thus far."

Fulton started to play golf at age 7 under the encouragement of his father. Through the years, it has been his father who has been there to teach him the fine points of the game.

"Gary Player was a big influence," he said. "He was so serious about his golf that I tended to be the same way. I couldn't take it lightly like some of the amateurs, so, I decided to take the plunge and I turned pro when I was just 19."

Even today, Player is his favorite. "I have the highest respect for Gary and what he has done," Fulton said, "but I've always like Jack Nicklaus too.

"What I admire so much about Gary is that he has grinded all the way from nothing and has beaten the giants. He has guts and determination. He never gives up. I just love the man."

Billy Andrade is what you might call an "impact" player. He not only has a bright future on the PGA TOUR, but he has a wonderful personality to match. He is the type of young man every sponsor loves to have in the field.

He has enjoyed great success at all levels of the game and his peers believe he will be a standout on the TOUR for many, many years. In 1981, for example, as a 17-year old, he was ranked the No. 1 junior player in the nation.

His first year as a member of the PGA TOUR was not too bad, but certainly not what he expected of himself. He finished 134th on the money list with nearly \$75,000.

He returned to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1988 in an effort to improve his position as an exempt player. He finished fifth and, after a slow start on the West Coast at the start of 1989, he made his move. He had three top 10 finishes during the summer.

"I knew I would be all right," he said, "when I had guys like Fuzzy Zoeller and Tom Kite tell me, 'You're going to be out here a long time. Take your time and be patient. Don't try to force it.'"

His tie for second place in the 1989 Buick Open is his best TOUR finish but last year he made tremendous strides in his consistency. At one point, he had made the cut in 16-straight events. Obviously, he went on to enjoy his finest money season.

Billy started the game at age 5 when he would tag along behind his grandmother on the course. He played in his first tournament in Rhode Island when he was 11.

"I followed in the footsteps of Brad Faxon," he said. "Brad was three years ahead of me in school but we played together alot at the Rhode Island Country Club in Barrington."

He played most sports through school even though he lacked height, he was named all-state in basketball while at Providence (RI) Country Day School.

Knowing he wasn't big enough to play basketball in college, he started to concentrate on golf. He did well at an early age and "that fueled the fire," he said.

He was the recipient of an Arnold Palmer Scholarship to Wake Forest. He went on to win four collegiate events and lead the Deacons to the 1986 NCAA Championship. He was an All-American choice three times.

Through the years he gained considerable experience as a winner. He joined with Sam Randolph to win the Junior World Cup crown in Ireland in 1981. He also played on the World Amateur Cup and Walker Cup teams.

When your name is Tommy Armour III, it does attract a little extra attention. There are not many in the game who can say their grandfather--known as Silver Scot--was a winner of the United States, and British Opens, plus the PGA Championship.

The Silver Scot passed away in 1968 but he would have been proud of his grandson. It took him a few years to get settled in on the PGA TOUR but once he did, Tommy let you know that he is here to stay.

Last year was a big one for him as he won his first tournament--the Phoenix Open--by five strokes over Jim Thorpe. He was tied for the first-round and then took total command in the second round. He never was headed in the run to the finish.

He nearly won again three weeks later but he had to settle for second place in the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open, two strokes behind Dan Forsman.

He qualified for the TOUR's 1982 season, but won only \$4,254. He kept trying to get his card back, but didn't make it until the Fall of 1987. Meanwhile, he travelled the world, spending most of his time on the European and Asian Tours where he had enjoyed exempt status.

"It was a great experience," he said. "The main thing I was able to play in real golf tournaments." Each year, he became a little better and his patience paid off handsomely.

Tommy said he was "about 10" when he started to play the game, going out with his "Mom or Dad."

He played junior golf all around southern California, winning the occasional tournament. He played high school golf in Las Vegas. "I played baseball, too, but since the golf and baseball seasons were at the same time, I decided it was best for me to stick with."

Tommy went on to Lincoln Trail College in southern Illinois and then on to the University of New Mexico. "We played the Western Juniors in Albuquerque and I liked the course and the school so much that I decided to go there," he said.

While at New Mexico, he did win the William Tucker Intercollegiate event and he helped the Lobos to a fifth place in the NCAA Championship.

Every young player in the game could learn a valuable lesson from Paul Azinger. Certainly
he has as much talent as any player in the game today.. but it was his determination to succeed
that moved him into the upper echelons.

His rise to superstardom began in 1987 when he won three times and was named PGA Player-
of-the-Year. He won his first start of the year, the Phoenix Open and then added the Panasonic-
Las Vegas Invitational and Canon Sammy Davis, Jr. titles to his list.

He won in Las Vegas with an eagle putt of 30 feet on the last hole.

One of the keys to Paul's success has been his ever-improving consistency. Two years ago,
en route to earning \$951,649--he had 13 top-10 finishes in 25 starts. he finished the season with
a second in the Texas Open and ties for third at Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic and Nabisco
Championships.

Last year, he opened with an impressive victory in the MONY Tournament of Championships
and three times he came within a whisker of winning again. At Doral Ryder Open, he suffered a
disappointing playoff loss.

In the 1989 Ryder Cup against the European team, Paul played exceptionally well. His big
moment came in a singles victory over Seve Ballesteros.

He first gained international attention in the 1987 British Open. He led by one stroke with two
holes to play, but finished bogey-bogey due to bunker problems and Nick Faldo slipped in to win.

A turning point in Paul's career came when he attended Brevard Junior College and his coach
there, John Suttie, introduced him to John Redman. "As he has said, "John has taken me to the level
I'm at now.

He moved to Florida State University and in 1981 he turned professional and headed for the
TOUR's Qualifying Tournament. He made it. Although he missed the 1983 season, he was back
in 1984. After a season or two to get his spikes firmly implanted, his star began to soar.

As good as he has played, Paul has been even more impressive in his personal life. He has
become a favorite of the galleries because of his exciting play, but, even more important, he is
regarded as one of the nicest guys in the business.

Toward the end of last season, Emlyn Aubrey started to play the way he knew he could. A tie for eighth place in the Hardee's Golf Classic and a tie for seventh in H.E.B. Texas Open a month later gave him enough money to assure his exempt status for this year.

He said he put "too much pressure" on himself in the early going; trying too hard to be successful right out of the chute in his first year on TOUR.

He also pointed out that "late in the year, I had some good Sunday pairings with players such as Raymond Floyd, Paul Azinger and Craig Stadler.

"It gave me a chance to meet some of the really good players and watch them," he continued. "I found them real easy to play with and that helped a lot."

Four rounds in the 60s with a closing 67 at the Hardee's led to a check for \$28,000. He started the H.E.B. Texas Open with a 63 at Oak Hills and closed with a 67 and that meant another \$25,800.

Emlyn started to play the game at age four and, since his father was a high school golf coach, it was the natural game for him to play.

He had his first taste of competition at age 7. When Emlyn was nine-years old, his father transferred to another school. "He wanted to watch me play but felt it would be difficult for him to be my coach as well."

His father did teach him well, however. He won three straight Pennsylvania State Public Links titles. Along the way, he headed for Louisiana State University "because I wanted to go to school in the South." In 1984, he won the Southeastern Conference championship.

After he was graduated, he tried for his TOUR card three times without success but made it on his fourth attempt in the Fall of 1989.

Meanwhile, he played wherever he could. He won the 1989 Philippine Open and finished second on the Asian Tour Order of Merit that year. The experience proved beneficial.

Once on TOUR, he said it took awhile to get used to the routine. "I honestly expected the cuts to be four-and-five under par every week and I put too much pressure on myself on Thursdays and Fridays to shoot low scores."

He missed the cut in four of his first five starts in 1990 and then settled down. Although he didn't post any really low finishes until later in the year, he did develop some consistency.

"I had some problems with my putting," he added. "I could putt well for a couple of days but it was tough doing it for four days, but it did improve toward the end of the year."

It was a big decision for Ian Baker-Finch but he now knows it was the right one. At the end of 1988, Ian decided "it was time to pull up roots and play the U.S. TOUR fulltime."

He would forget about trying to play all over the world, hopping on airplanes from his homeland of Australia to Japan to Europe to the United States and back again. His pretty wife Jennie was delighted.

Golf Fans around the world--and in Akron, Ohio--knew he had exceptional talent and he put it all on display at the Southwestern Bell Colonial in Fort Worth, TX, in May of 1989.

He led all the way at the Colonial Country Club with rounds of 65, 70, 65 and 70 for a total of 10-under-par 270 and won by four strokes over David Edwards. He led by one after the first and second rounds and by four after three.

In the 1988 NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club, Ian was tied for the third-round lead with Larry Neslon and Mike Reid. He shot a final round of 71 and that dropped him into a tie for third place, two strokes out of the Reid-Tom Watson playoff.

However, in four starts, he earned \$75,840 to rank 133rd on the money list at the season's end. It was enough for him to gain membership in the PGA TOUR and, thus, could accept unlimited sponsors exemptions.

In some ways, his 1990 campaign was even better than the previous year's. Certainly, he won considerably more money but it was because he became a consistent challenger.

Twice he finished second--to Paul Azinger by a stroke in the MONY Tournament of Champions to open the year, and then by a stroke to Gil Morgan in the Kemper Open, thanks to a last round of 66.

A final round of 64 pushed him into place in the Hardee's Golf Classic.

Baker-Finch's home is in Sanctuary Cove, near Brisbane in Queensland, the same "neighborhood" as Greg Norman and Wayne Grady.

He turned professional in 1979 and his first important pro victory was in the 1983 New Zealand Open. He led the 1984 British Open at St. Andrews after three rounds, but a poor fourth round dropped him down the list.

He has won seven times on the Australia/New Zealand Tour, with his most impressive and chreished victory being in the 1988 Australian Masters. He won the 1984 New South Wales Open by 13 strokes.

He has represented his country well, playing on the 1985 World Cup team on four Australia/New Zealand Kirin Cup teams; and the last two Four Tours World Championship of Golf teams.

Dave Barr continues to string solid seasons together and leaves no doubt that he is Canada's finest player.

He consistently is in the money, although a few times last year, he let opportunities get away in the last round. His strongest showing was in the Hardee's Golf Classic where he finished one-stroke out of the playoff and in a tie for third place.

Dave's first victory on TOUR was in the 1981 Quad Cities Open in a five-way playoff and he won again in the 1987 Georgia Pacific Atlanta Classic with a brilliant 23-under-par score of 265.

Dave received considerable national attention in the 1985 United States Open championship when he battled Andy North all the way to the wire before finishing in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Tze-Chung Chen.

Dave always has been successful in his native Canada. He has won 12 Canadian Tour titles including the 1985 Canadian PGA Championship and the 1988 Canadian Tournament Players Division title. He also led the Canadian Order of Merit four times, including last year.

He has played on nine Canadian World Cup teams. In 1983 he won the individual title and in 1985 he joined with Dan Halldorson to give Canada the team championship.

When the final round started at the 1981 Quad Cities Open, Dave was five strokes behind Victor Regalado. A closing 66 shot him into a tie at the end of regulation play with Halldorson, Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner and Regalado.

It was eight holes later (only one playoff in TOUR history has been longer), that Dave managed a par and that was all he needed to gain his first triumph.

Andy Bean was one of the game's leading players for more than a decade before a bout with tendinitis cut into his effectiveness a couple of years ago, so, now, it's good to see the big fellow back on his game.

He won 11 times on the TOUR from 1977 through 1986--three of them being in the Doral-Eastern Open--and he came close to winning another pair in 1989.

Andy shot a 66 the final day of the PGA Championship and came within a stroke of forcing a playoff with Payne Stewart. Three weeks later, he was second in the Greater Milwaukee Open, only because of a superb winning effort by Greg Norman.

His victories have not been limited to official events on the TOUR. He has won in Japan and twice was the victor in the Isuzu Kapalua International on Maui in Hawaii.

After winning twice in 1986 and finishing fourth on the money list, Andy came up with a severe case of tendinitis in his right elbow in 1987. He dropped to 120th on the money list and the next year, he fell all the way to 149th. He simply couldn't play well.

Interestingly enough, he did play well in the Ryder Cup matches in 1987 and one of his victories was in singles over Ian Woosnam.

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, GA, where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, FL, where his father bought a course.

He is one of the biggest men in the game and he has the personality and the heart to match his size. Wherever the game is played, he always is one of the more popular men in the field.

Chip Beck had the kind of season in 1988 that many have been expecting of him since this talented young man joined the TOUR in 1979.

That year Chip finished second on the money list with a whopping \$916,818. He won twice and came close a third time losing in a playoff to Bob Lohr late in the year at the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic.

He broke through with his first-ever victory at the fabled Riviera Country Club taking home the Los Angeles Open title with a brilliant 17-under par effort. He won again two months later at the USF&G Classic with a near record performance of 26-under-par 262.

He earned a spot in the Disney playoff with a 25-under par performance and his brilliant scoring earned him the 1988 Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.46.

Last year was a special one as well. He won the Buick Open at Warwick Hills in Michigan with a blazing final round of 7-under-par 65. His 18-under-par 272 was one better than Hale Irwin, Mike Donald and Fuzzy Zoeller.

In addition, three weeks before the tournament, his wife, Karen, presented him with Mary Catherine.

Chip well remembers the day he was introduced to golf. He was only 10-years old at the time, and his mother was going to the Highland Golf Club in Fayetteville, NC, to attend a clinic that was to be given by the head professional.

Once he started to hit balls, he was hooked. He played all summer and the golf career of Chip Beck was well under way. By the end of the summer, he won the Pee Wee division at the club.

A journalism major at the University of Georgia, he enjoyed considerable success on the Bulldog team. As a senior, he was named the Athlete of the Year and that's the first time a golfer had ever been honored at Georgia. He won six collegiate events, such as the Southern Intercollegiate three times and the All-America championship hosted by the University of Houston. He also was an All-America choice three years.

Phil Blackmar picked a good week to get his game together last season as he tied for third place in the Las Vegas Invitational with Corey Pavin and collected \$75,400.

Until that week, Phil was looking at the possibility of losing his full exempt status, but five rounds in the 60's and the healthy check eliminated that dire possibility.

Phil is a big, easy-going fellow who has a golf game that can border on the awesome when he gets everything in synch, such as he did in Las Vegas.

He has won twice since starting on the TOUR in the Fall of 1984, but has been close to winning on several other occasions as well. He has won well over \$100,000 in five of the last six seasons.

Phil admits his rookie season of 1985 was even better than he expected it would be.

He won the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open in a playoff over Dan Pohl and Jodie Mudd as he birdied the first extra hole to earn \$108,000. He went on to collect a healthy \$198,537 for the year.

"It wasn't really a surprise," he said of the victory, "but I hadn't planned on it either. I did know that if I got hot, I could win. It was just a question of being lucky and getting hot at the right time."

He could have made the same statement in 1988 after the Provident Classic in Chattanooga, TN. He won the title and \$81,000 after a playoff against Payne Stewart. Phil rolled in a birdie putt on the first extra hole to clinch it.

Phil started in the game as a youngster and he had a teacher with good credentials--his father. Phil's dad won the National Lefthanders title in 1965 and he introduced Phil to the game.

Phil was a three-time All-Southwest Conference selection while at the University of Texas.

He performed splendidly at the 1984 Qualifying Tournament at La Quinta, CA, to finish one shot in back of medalist Paul Azinger.

"I recognize my limitations. I'm not one of the pure strikers out here," he said. "However, when I get hot I'm going to try and run the table."

Jim Booros saved his best for the finish last year as he put together four solid rounds to finish third in the Buick Southern Open. The check for \$40,800 boosted him well over the \$100,000 mark for the second straight year and assured his exempt status.

The last two years have been his most successful and he believes one of the main reasons may be because he finally has been able to devote his full time to the game and his life on the TOUR. For many years he tried to play the TOUR and also work as the head professional at the Allentown (PA) Municipal course.

"Early in my career," he said, "if I wasn't playing well, I'd bail out and go back home to the club. I knew I always had that waiting for me."

As a result, he did struggle trying to keep his TOUR card. Only twice before did he enjoy exempt status and that was in 1983 after finishing 89th on the 1982 money list and again in 1984 after finishing 125th in 1983.

He lost his card again after the 1984 season and was not able to regain it until the start of 1988.

He did win the 1989 Deposit Guaranty Golf Classic in Hattiesburg, MS, in a playoff over Mike Donald. While the victory was unofficial, the \$36,000 he collected definitely counted. Two weeks later he finished fifth in the K mart Greater Greensboro Open to earn another \$36,500.

At Hattiesburg, the tournament was called after 54 holes due to severe storms, and Jim and Mike were tied. Jim laughed, "Mike is one of the best friends I have, but I was doing a rain dance in the parking lot."

In their playoff, Jim won it with a par on the fourth extra hole.

He said his play at Greensboro was a "carry-over," and he was pleased with his performance. "I hung in there on the weekend to tie for fifth," he said, "and I felt good about being able to do that. It's something I will remember."

Jim enjoyed playing golf around his hometown of Reading, PA, but basketball was his game in those days. He was named to the all-state team in high school and went to Edinboro State College on a basketball scholarship.

However, late in his senior year in high school, he tore a cartilage in his right knee, and he says, "that had a lot to do with my turning to golf."

After one year at Edinboro State, he left school to devote more time to golf. After he won the 1973 Pennsylvania Public Links crown, he played the mini-tours for three years. On his fifth try in the Q-School, he obtained his card at Brownsville, TX, in the Fall of 1976.

One of the hardest workers on the PGA TOUR, Bill Britton finally received his reward in 1989 when he took home his first title at the Centel Classic.

For Bill, it was a reward for perseverance and hard work over the years. Times have not always been kind to the competitive man from New York, but he kept faith in himself and reached new heights last year.

He began his TOUR career in 1980 and showed good progress through the next three years. In fact, he finished 57th on the money list in 1982 with over \$75,000. During that season he had his best ever finish, a playoff loss to Hal Sutton at the Walt Disney World Classic. Bill had played brilliantly with a closing 64 to force the overtime.

From 1983 through 1987 though, Bill struggled and did not even play on TOUR in 1986.

In 1988, he began to play the way he always felt he could. The confidence carried over into 1989 and he enjoyed a splendid season, highlighted by the impressive four-stroke victory in the Centel Classic.

Last year, his strong play continued but Bill also gained considerable national attention with his performances in The Masters Tournament and the PGA Championship. He tied for seventh place at Augusta and was fourth alone at Shoal Creek in the PGA.

His best finish a year ago was a tie for third place in the Hardee's Golf Classic. His closing round of 65 left him one stroke out of the playoff.

Bill began his golfing career when he used to sneak under the fence at a public course near his home in Staten Island, NY. He enjoyed amateur success winning the Metropolitan Amateur in 1975 and 1976 and he also won the Metropolitan Open in 1979.

He won the National Junior College title while at Miami Dade North and then attended the University of Florida where he graduated in 1979. He then joined the TOUR in the spring of 1980.

In some ways, Mark Brooks enjoyed the finest season of his career a year ago. He didn't win, as he did in 1988, but he collected more money and had more top 10 finishes than ever before.

He set the tone for the year early with a tie for third place in the Honda Classic; and certainly back-to-back ties for fifth place in the Centel Western Open and the U.S. Open were impressive.

His victory two years ago came in the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open in a playoff over Joey Sindelar and Dave Barr.

He put together four splendid rounds of 66-65-69-69 for a 15-under-par 269. In the playoff, Sindelar was eliminated on the first extra hole. On the second, Mark rolled in a birdie putt of 10 feet to win it.

"It was on the same line as my 3 1/2-foot par putt in regulation," he said. "I gave the winning putt just a little more.

"This will take a few days for it all to sink in," said Brooks. "There are so many things that you don't think about, out on the course, so many things that you shouldn't think about. Things like the playing in the Masters and such. My only goal was make good golf swings; that was the ticket all week."

He nearly won again late in 1988 losing in a playoff to Tom Purtzer at the Gatlin Brothers Southwest Classic. He gained entry into sudden death with a 50-foot eagle on the final hole.

"I exceeded all of my expectations in 1988," said Brooks. "My first goal was to stay away from Qualifying School. Winning was just icing on the cake."

Mark began the game at the age of eight, while visiting his grandparents. His grandfather was an avid golfer, and soon had Mark feeling the same way.

He enjoyed much success at the high school and junior levels, winning several titles. From there he moved on to the University of Texas, where he was a two-time All-America selection.

He obtained his TOUR card four different times, only to have to go back to Qualifying School at the end of the year.

Billy Ray Brown has been making marvelous strides up the ladder of success on the PGA TOUR and it seems evident to followers of the game that his star will continue to rise.

The big, friendly fellow out of the University of Houston joined the TOUR for the start of the 1988 season and his progress has been very positive.

He made grand strides a year ago and the highlight of the campaign had to be at the U.S. Open at Medinah. He was tied for the third round lead with Mike Donald and while most eyes through the closing rounds were on Hale Irwin, Donald and Nick Faldo, Billy Ray made a move.

A birdie at the par 3, 17th hole, where he hit a 9-iron to two feet put him at 7-under-par, just one stroke out of the lead. On the 18th, another good approach left him with a 15 footer for a birdie that would place him in a tie with Irwin and Donald.

Unfortunately, he played a little too much break and the ball rolled just to the left of the cup. So, he tied for third place with Faldo.

He had two other third-place finishes early on, in the Phoenix Open and the Honda Classic. He also was fifth in THE PLAYERS Championship.

His best-ever TOUR finish was a tie for second place in the 1989 Kemper Open.

It is no great surprise that Brown has done as well as he has, due to his excellent amateur background. As a freshman at the University of Houston in 1982, he won the NCAA Championship. He finished his four years at Houston as a four-time All-America selection.

Although winning the NCAA Championship was a wonderful accomplishment for Brown, it also raised expectations for him. His next three years at Houston were good, but never quite what he wanted them to be.

While at Houston, Billy Ray was a teammate of Steve Elkington. During that time, the Cougars won three NCAA team championships.

Brown was raised in a very athletic household. His dad was a center for the Oakland Raiders of the National Football League, and his brother played tackle for the St. Louis Cardinals

Brad Bryant should receive an award for perseverance. His career was starting to blossom in the early 1980's when he was struck down by injuries and serious illnesses within his close-knit family.

It is a testimony to his strong character that he has been able to wade his way through it all without complaint and finally put together solid performances through the last two season.

Last year, a final round of 64 in the Independent Insurance Agent Open at The Woodlands, TX, left him tied for third place, just one stroke out of the Tony Sills-Gil Morgan playoff. He finished the year with more top 10 finishes than ever before and his best-ever money year.

How good was he early in his career? In 1982, he came within a whisker of winning the Tournament Players Championship as he tied for second place and later in the year was second in the Quad Cities Open. The following year, he again was a runner-up in the Byron Nelson Classic.

In 1984, however, he not only tore up his left shoulder, but his father and wife, Sue, were stricken with serious illnesses. He tried to play with the shoulder, but played hurt.

Finally in December of 1985--after the injury had been properly diagnosed--he underwent an operation. The recovery period was long and slow but the good signs started to reappear in 1988.

"It was the first time I had been able to play healthy since 1983," he says matter-of-factly. No question, without the injury, his life on TOUR would have changed dramatically through the middle 1980's.

Brad started in the game at age 10, going to the course with his father in Rosebud, TX. At age 15, he started to work hard on his game and says "you can't believe how many golf balls I hit when I was 15-and-16-years old."

The effort made him the terror of New Mexico junior golf and he went on to the University of New Mexico.

He obtained his TOUR card in the Fall of 1978 and progressed steadily. In the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, he was tied for the lead after three rounds with Bruce Lietzke. Jerry Pate, the eventual winner, was three strokes behind.

When he birdied the 14th the last day, he still was tied, now with Lietzke and Pate. However, he three-putted the 15th and, even though he birdied the 16th, Pate birdied the 17th and 18th to win it. Brad tied with Scott Simpson for second place.

It is easy to understand why Curt Byrum has a special fondness for the Hardee's Golf Classic and the Oakwood Country Club in Coal Valley, IL.

First of all, he claimed the 1989 Hardee's title as his first on the PGA TOUR. A final round 4-under-par 66 for a total of 12-under-par 268 was all he needed to earn the winner's check of \$126,000.

On a historical note, his younger brother Tom, won the Kemper Open seven weeks earlier so they became the first brothers to win in the same year since Dave and Mike Hill did it in 1972.

As Curt said with a laugh afterwards, "I started to feel the pressure when Tom won because I'm the oldest and I've always been one up." The he added, "It's nice to have the first one out of the way. I feel I'm over the hump and I hope to go on from here."

There is another good reason why the Hardee's and Oakwood are special. He had lost his TOUR membership after the 1985 season, but the folks at Hardee's gave him a sponsor exemption into the 1986 event. It was his first start of the year.

Curt played marvelously. Rounds of 64 the first-and-third days put him two strokes ahead of Mark Wiebe going into the final round. Although Wiebe came on strong to gain the victory, Curt finished second and earned \$43,200. It was enough to earn him a special membership and his career blossomed from there.

A month later, he joined with Bobby Nichols in the Showdown Classic at Jeremy Ranch in Utah--a popular Senior PGA TOUR event--and he played brilliantly as they won the title.

He used that confidence to put together an excellent 1987 campaign in which he won \$212,450, highlighted by a runnerup finish at the prestigious Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village.

Curt and Tom grew up in Onida, South Dakota. "We used to have a nine-hole course with sand greens there," Curt said. "It's grown over now, but when Tom and I would go home, we would get out the mowers and cut down a couple of the fairways so we could practice."

He was exceptional as a high school athlete. He was all-state as a quarterback in football and as a guard in basketball. His senior year in 1977, he was named the South Dakota Athlete of the Year.

He was recruited by the University of New Mexico to play golf so that's where he decided to go.

After three years at the University, Curt came under the tutelage of Ken Venturi and they still spend time together although for many years the Byrum brothers have helped each other.

Everyone knew it was only a matter of time before the Byrum brothers broke through and won golf tournaments.

Tom, who is two years younger than Curt, was the first to do it and he was most impressive at the 1989 Kemper Open on the TPC at Avenel course. He won by five strokes after shooting 65-68 for his final two rounds and totalling 16-under-par 268. It was worth \$162,000.

Several weeks later, Curt won the Hardee's Golf Classic, so they became the first brothers to win in the same year since Mike and Dave Hill did it in 1972.

Tom said afterwards, "I'm not real excited to be the first in the family to win. My brother has taught me more than anybody and he's been an inspiration to me."

He came close to winning on a few occasions. He finished second in the Southwest Classic during his rookie season of 1986. He appeared headed for victory in the Pensacola Open late in 1988, leading by four strokes going into the final round, but Andrew Magee came on strong to win it.

Early last year, he fashioned closing rounds of 69 and 68 to gain a third-place finish in the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open in San Diego.

A lot of hard work and patience has paid off for Tom, but he also points to the week of the Hardee's Golf Classic in July of 1986 as one that had a tremendous impact on his life on TOUR.

His older brother, Curt, who had lost his TOUR card at the end of 1985, received a sponsor's exemption and finished second and earned \$43,200. That was enough to get his playing privileges back so the Byrum brothers were a team again.

"Curt has helped me with my game more than anyone else," Tom said. "We know each other's swings and we constantly watch each other. A lot of the success I've had happened after he came back on TOUR."

After he was graduated from high school, Tom headed for New Mexico where Curt was going to the University. He took a part-time job at a country club in Albuquerque and became a walk-on for the golf team. He played for two years, one of them with Curt, and then transferred to New Mexico State where he did exceptionally well.

"That was when I decided to see how far I could go in the game," he said. After he was graduated in 1984 with a degree in Sociology, he entered the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1984. He didn't make it. "I simply wasn't ready," he said, matter of factly.

He played in Asia in the Spring of 1985 and the experience was invaluable. He went back to the Q-School in the fall of 1985 and made it easily, finishing third.

The folks up in Onida, South Dakota--all 850 of them--are mighty proud of the Byrum boys and well they should be.

Mark Calcavecchia truly is one of the outstanding players in the game today and is recognized as a superstar worldwide.

It took him a few seasons to put all the pieces of his powerful game together and once he did, he demonstrated the skills to match any player at anytime.

He enjoyed a great campaign two years ago, winning the Phoenix Open by seven strokes with a 65-64 finish and the Nissan Los Angeles Open.

His biggest week came in mid-July during the British Open Championship at Troon, Scotland. Mark birdied the final hole and his score of 13-under-par 275 tied him with Greg Norman and Wayne Grady.

The Royal and Ancient uses a multi-hole playoff system and this time it was to be decided over four holes. Mark went to the fourth extra-hole tied with Norman, but the Aussie drove into a bunker and more problems followed.

Meanwhile, Mark won it with a drive to the right and then a great 5-iron shot from 190 yards to within seven feet. His birdie that followed was icing on the cake.

Mark's first victory came in the 1986 Southwest Classic in Abilene, TX. It gave him exempt status for the first time and he made the most of it. The next Spring he won the Honda Classic, and the following year, he won the Bank of Boston Classic.

Last year, he had an incredible start to the season with four runner-up finishes in his first nine events, including three in a row - Doral Ryder Open where he lost in a playoff to Greg Norman, the Honda Classic and then THE PLAYERS Championship.

After his family moved from Laurel, Nebraska, to the Palm Beach area in Florida when he was 13-years old, he discovered he could play golf every day of the year. "I couldn't believe it at first," he said, "and the greatest thing was playing golf on Christmas Day afternoon."

He turned professional in January of 1981 and six-months later, he qualified for his TOUR card. He was barely 21-years old.

David Canipe tried the PGA TOUR circuit back in the mid-70's with little success. But after years of triumph on the mini-tours, he returned to the TOUR in 1987 and in 1988 he broke through into the top 125 money winners for the first time.

After graduating from the University of Georgia, where he teamed with Bill Kratzert and Lyn Lott to name a couple, Canipe set his sites on the PGA TOUR. He first appeared in 1976 and he played off and on through 1980 earning only a total of \$4,576 for the four years.

"That was back in the days of Monday qualifiers," recalled Canipe. "Monday qualifiers and myself didn't get along very well."

Canipe headed to Florida after the 1980 season to tackle the then extensive mini-tour system. After an estimated 25 victories, though, Canipe decided to come back out on the fledgling Tournament Players Series circuit sponsored by the TOUR.

He won the 1984 Provident Classic in Chattanooga and his success on that level heightened his desire to try the big league again. When the Space Coast tour in Florida started to encounter difficulties, Canipe headed back to the PGA TOUR Qualifying School in the fall of 1986.

It was an excellent decision for Canipe although 1987 was not as good a year as he would have liked. He earned only \$36,927 to finish 167th on the money list and he was forced to return to the Q-School.

He tied for eighth place at the 1987 school and returned to the TOUR with confidence for the rest of the 1988 season. Early on the West Coast, he tied for ninth place in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

In May, his career received a big boost. He posted scores of 71-69-68-68 over three windswept courses in Las Vegas to finish tied for fourth at the lucrative Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational to take home a check for \$52,361.

"Las Vegas was the turning point of my comeback," said Canipe. "I wasn't sure I'd be successful until then. I felt like I was going to play better, but not rock solid sure."

Last year, he enjoyed his best-ever finish, a third place in the Federal Express St. Jude Classic and collected \$68,000.

"The main thing about last year," he said, "was my game was more consistent. I was more comfortable."

Brian Claar has always felt he belonged on the PGA TOUR but if there was one thing that convinced him, it was the fifth place finish in the 1989 U.S. Open at Oak Hills in Rochester, NY.

Curtis Strange won the championship and gained most of the attention. Chip Beck, Mark McCumber and Ian Woosnam tied for second place, just one-stroke behind Curtis.

Then there was Brian Claar, with finishing rounds of 68 and 69, all alone in fifth, just two back. Those were the two lowest rounds of the weekend.

He barely made it through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1989 and then went on to enjoy a successful season last year, easily earning exempt status. A seventh-place finish in the BellSouth Atlanta Classic was the start of making the cut in 12 straight events.

Right in the middle of the stretch, he took two weeks off and during that time, his wife, Tracy, presented him with a son, Zackary.

"He gives me something extra to play for," Brian said. "My wife and my son both deserve a nice future."

Brian first earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1985 and he made the most of it. He earned \$117,355 and was acclaimed the Rookie-of-the-Year. He made the cut in 20 of 27 starts with a tie for sixth place in the Canadian Open his best.

He couldn't maintain that level, however. He fell well back on the money list the next two seasons and didn't make a notable impression until his appearance in the Open at Oak Hills.

Brian hails from a non-golfing family and his introduction to the game during his childhood in Connecticut was unusual to say the least.

"No one in the family played," he said, "but I found some old golf balls in a drawer. I took them out to the beach and hit them around with a baseball bat. My neighbor saw me. He belonged to a country club so he took me out to play.

"I really wasn't good at all, but I was stubborn enough that I was determined to learn how to play."

After graduating from high school, he migrated to Florida and the University of Tampa where his game started to come together.

"I was able to practice a lot because of the weather," he said, "and I really improved. By my junior year, I knew I wanted to play the TOUR."

No question about it, Russ Cochran is the finest lefthanded golfer on the PGA TOUR and is the best since Bob Charles of New Zealand was winning TOUR events in the 60's and early 70's.

Each year he seems to be contending more often and that pleases him. "I'm happy to be able to play good golf and raise a good family," he said. "Each year I try to figure out a way to improve the level of my game."

He definitely improved the level of his game. As an example, he enjoyed his finest season a year ago with his best money year. His biggest paycheck--\$68,000--came in the USF&G Classic. While most of the attention was focused on David Frost--the winner--and Greg Norman--the runner-up--Russ shot a closing 67 to finish in third place.

He joined the TOUR in 1983 and, although he did not enjoy great success on the regular TOUR, he did win \$100,863 and two events on the old Tournament Players Series. That, really launched him on his way to success. For the first time in his career he put together back-to-back top-ten finishes in the 1988 MCI Heritage Classic and the USF&G Classic.

Although he easily retained his exempt status through 1985 and 1986, he wasn't up to par physically and it cut into his effectiveness. He struggled early in 1987, but by the end of April, his game started to come around. At one stretch, he made the cut in 11 straight events.

The highlight of that season was a tie for second in the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis. He finished just one stroke behind Curtis Strange and many of his friends from Kentucky were there to see him do it.

Russ started in golf when he was about 10-years-old. He used to go to a neighboring course with his older brother. A couple of years later, when he won a state age-group tournament, he truly was hooked. He played junior golf in the area and then through high school, winning the state scholastic title in 1975. He went to the University of Kentucky and played for three more years.

Oh, yes, he does play lefthanded. "When I was younger, I used ladies' clubs because they were the only lefthanded ones I could find. Several people told me I should switch around and try to play right-handed, but no one made a real effort to change me, so I stayed with it. I do everything left handed, anyway."

Including accepting healthy checks on the PGA TOUR.

Everyone loves to see a young man rewarded for hard work, so it has been especially pleasant to see John Cook enjoy some very good years on the PGA TOUR.

Physical problems cut into his effectiveness during several seasons but never complained. When healthy, he is one of the best.

His right hand had bothered him for several years and, finally in May of 1989, he underwent an operation to remove tiny pieces of bone that had broken away and to relocate a tendon. He was off the TOUR for more than five months.

He demonstrated last year that he is all the way back and twice came within a stroke of winning. However, he lost twice in playoff-to Tom Kite at the Federal Express St. Jude Classic; and to Bob Tway at the Las Vegas Invitational. It did turn out to be his best money year by far.

John never was better than he was during The International at Castle Pines near Denver in August of 1987. He went the distance in the tournament that uses a modified Stableford system for scoring and earned \$180,000. It was an eagle three at the 17th hole that put him over the top.

A week after Jan presented him with Jason, their third child, in January of 1986, John played extremely well in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. He tied with his good friend Donnie Hammond. Unfortunately for John, Donnie won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

In 1983, when he earned \$216,868, he won the Canadian Open in a string six-hole playoff over Johnny Miller and accumulated seven top ten finishes.

One of his best-ever efforts on TOUR came in the 1981 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, when he was tied with Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett and Barney Thompson. John finally won the title on the third extra hole. Due to heavy rains, it was a 54 hole tournament.

John has been successful during all stages of his golfing career. He won the 1974 World Junior title when he outlasted Gary Hallberg. One of his biggest titles came in 1978 when he won the U.S. Amateur Championship. The next year, he lost in the Amateur final to Mark O'Meara.

He was an All-American choice three years at Ohio State, and in 1979, he helped the Buckeyes win the NCAA team title. In December of 1983, he was on the U.S. World Cup team with Rex Caldwell and they combined to win the team championship.

There are few players in the game with the talent of Fred Couples. He continually displays an ability to rise to the occasion, especially on the more difficult courses.

It was never more clearly demonstrated than in the 1984 Tournament Players Championship on the TPC at Sawgrass where every shot must be precise. Fred took the lead the second day with a brilliant record-tying 8-under par 64 and he stayed in front the rest of the way. He had to fight off the challenges of the game's finest players to get the victory. Seve Ballesteros and Tom Watson were chasing him after the third round and the final margin was only one stroke over Lee Trevino.

He had another one of those weeks last year in the Nissan Los Angeles Open at Riviera Country Club. He equated the course record with a 9-under par 62 the third day and his 18-under par 266 was good for a three-stroke victory over Gil Morgan.

He continued on to have another great season, finishing second in the PGA Championship, third in the Memorial and fifth in the Masters Tournament, plus a few other strong top 10 finishes.

Fred's first victory came the hard way in the 1983 Kemper Open on the demanding Congressional Country Club course. He had to defeat Gil Morgan, Scott Simpson, Barry Jaeckel and Tze-Chung Chen in a playoff. On the second extra hole, the 211-yard 16th, he hit a splendid 5-iron shot to within two feet of the hole and he made it for his victory. "I felt like crying," he said. "I've never hit a shot that amounted to so much."

He won the 1987 Byron Nelson Classic in a playoff over Mark Calcavecchia. The next year, he lost the Phoenix Open in a playoff to Sandy Lyle. A second place in the 1989 Doral Ryder Open was the best of his nine top 10 finishes that year.

Couples was introduced to golf by his father, who works for the Seattle Parks & Recreation Department. So all sports were a natural with him. Within a few years, he was competing in junior golf events in the Seattle area.

Anytime Ben Crenshaw wins a golf tournament, it is one of those wonderful moments in the game. There probably isn't a player in the game who is more loved by his fans and peers.

So, his victory in the 1984 Masters Tournament was extra special. As he thought about what he had accomplished, he said slowly, "It's a sweet, sweet thing. I don't think there ever will be anything sweeter for me."

In the final round, he shot a four-under-par 68 and won by two over Tom Watson with an 11-under-par 277. "Ben deserved it," Watson said later. "He's been in the hunt in a lot of major championships. This is his first, and I know what it must mean to him."

He followed the great year with a horrible season in 1985 but it wasn't diagnosed until late in the year that he was suffering from a hyperactive thyroid.

Once on the proper medication, he came back strong--vintage Crenshaw. He won twice in 1986 and added victories in 1987 and 1988. In 1989 he played extremely well in the NEC World Series of Golf, only to lose in a playoff to David Frost.

Last year Ben won again and it was in one of his favorite events, the Southwestern Bell Colonial. He also won the title in 1977, then known as the Colonial National Invitation. It certainly was the highlight of another very successful campaign.

Ben's first victory was in the 1973 San Antonio-Texas Open. It was a historical week since, after a splendid amateur career, he was making his first start as an official member of the TOUR.

Jay Delsing came close to getting his elusive first victory on the PGA TOUR last year as he tied for third place in the Hardee's Golf Classic, just one stroke out of the Joey Sindelar-Willie Wood playoff.

Nevertheless, it was his best-ever TOUR finish as he shot rounds of 66, 65, 70 and 68 for an 11-under-par 269.

He had other good finishes in this, his best season, such as a fifth in the USF&G Classic and a tie for eighth place in the Phoenix Open.

He had another "day to remember" in the 1985 B.C. Open. He matched the EnJoie Golf Club tournament record with a 9-under-par 62; equalling the mark set by Fuzzy Zoeller in 1982.

"I finally had the hole get in the way most of the day," the lanky former UCLA standout said. "I had almost the same putts yesterday in the first round when I shot a 73, but they didn't go in. It's a crazy game."

He was born into a sports atmosphere. His father, Jim Delsing, played for many years as an outfielder in the major leagues with such teams as the Yankees, White Sox, Tigers, St. Louis Browns and Kansas City A's.

"I love baseball probably more than golf," Jay said, "but I took up golf when I was about 14 because I wanted something that I could do by myself."

During his days at St. Louis University High School in St. Louis, the 6'5 1/2" Delsing was an outstanding basketball player, but UCLA recruited him for his golf and not basketball. With the Bruins, he was a teammate of Corey Pavin and Steve Pate.

After earning his degree in economics, he played the mini-tours for a year to gain more experience. Then he tried the TOUR's Qualifying School in 1984. He finished 24th and was on his way.

He displayed considerable talent as 1985 progressed, but it took the 62 at the B.C. to put his name in the headlines. "I once shot a 61 when I was in high school," he said, "but that was my best in competition."

Incidentally, Jay never had the pleasure of watching his dad in the major leagues. He was the fourth of five children and Jim had put his spikes away by the time Jay was old enough to know what was going on. "I did see him play in an old-timers game, though, and that was special."

Mike Donald will be remembered as one of the truly nice guys in the game, but he also will be remembered for his gutsy performance in the 1990 U.S. Open Championship at Medinah.

He was tied for the third-round lead and had a one-stroke lead the last day until he bogeyed the 16th. However, it was Hale Irwin who made five birdies on the incoming nine--including a near impossible 60-footer on the 18th--who caught him.

The next day, in the 18-hole playoff, they still were tied after 18, shooting 74s, and then Irwin won it on the first extra hole with a 10-footer for a birdie.

Teary-eyed, Irwin said, "Mike Donald, God bless him. I almost wish he had won."

A month later, Mike tied with Irwin and Fuzzy Zoeller for second place in the Buick Open.

During his 10th year on TOUR, Mike finally broke through and won in the 1989 Anheuser Busch Classic. He did it in a playoff over Hal Sutton and Tim Simpson.

Well liked by his peers, Mike was elected in the fall of 1987 to a four-year term as a Player Director on the TOUR's Policy Board.

When Mike was in the ninth grade, he gave up baseball to concentrate on golf. It was a good move. He went on to Broward Community College and won the National Junior College championship. It earned him a Chris Schenkel scholarship to Georgia Southern College.

In his first tournament at Georgia Southern, he finished fifth, not bad at all when you consider the players who were 1-2 respectively were Jay Haas of Wake Forest and Chip Beck of Georgia. His parade didn't last long though, because "I had a conflict with the coach and they took my scholarship away."

So Mike headed for home. "I didn't have any money, so I delivered flowers and umpired baseball games for a year." Georgia Southern brought in a new coach the next year and Mike was back in school. Before he returned though, Mike was impressive again as he went to the finals of the 1978 North and South Amateur before losing to Gary Hallberg.

Mike started in the game at age 12. "My parents bought me a set of clubs because they didn't know what else to buy me."

Ed Dougherty's year was wrapped up in one tournament last year, and, my what a week it was.

By his own admission, he was having a so-so year when he headed for the Greater Milwaukee Open. By the time Sunday evening had arrived at the Tuckaway Country Club, he had come within a stroke of his first TOUR victory.

Ed had rounds of 69, 69, 67 and 66 for a 17-under-par 271 and tied with Jim Gallagher and Billy Mayfair.

On the first extra hole, Gallagher was the only one to find the green. Ed was bunkered and Mayfair was over the green. Jim two-putted for his par and the victory as Ed and Billy bogeyed.

"The week at Milwaukee just snowballed," he said. "It seems as if I play well there every year."

When he started the 1990 campaign, Ed had one main goal in mind. He wanted to make 150 cuts during his career to qualify for the "veteran member" category on the exempt priority list. He had 144 at the start and reached his mark at the Centel Western Open.

Ed has been on-and-off the TOUR several times since first qualifying for his card in Spring of 1975. His best previous year had been in 1987 when he collected \$76,705 to earn exempt status.

When not on the TOUR, he proved to be the terror of the PGA Club Pro series. In 1985, he was named the PGA Club Pro Player-of-the-Year, mainly on the strength of winning the national club pro championship.

He won both the club pro match and stroke play championships in the mid-80s and also won three Philadelphia PGA Sectional crowns.

Ed was a TOUR regular from 1975 through 1982 but never earned more than \$27,948 in a single season.

He returned home to Pennsylvania to work at Edgemont Country Club as a club professional. In the years that followed, he played exceptionally well in the regional and national club pro events.

"I had won everything that the PGA has," he said at the time. "the Grand Slam of club pro tournaments. I decided then to try and do something more with my game."

He went back to the Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1986 and made it.

Bob Eastwood has been able to enjoy a number of good years on the PGA TOUR but early in his career, he was wondering if he would be able to say that.

So, it is easy to understand why he found it difficult to express his feelings in 1984. He simply said, "Incredible. I knew I was capable of winning. It was just a matter of time for me to get everything together." "Time" turned out to be in his 13th year as an active player, and he not only broke through with his first victory, but he won his second as well.

He won again in 1985 but his victory in the Byron Nelson Classic came in a rather unexpected fashion. He trailed Payne Stewart by two strokes as Payne played the last hole. Surprisingly, Payne double bogeyed the 18th to drop back into a tie with Bob. On the first extra hole, Bob won the title.

His first victory was in the 1984 USF&G Classic in New Orleans and then he won the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic. He also tied for third in the World Series of Golf that year.

Last year was the fifth time he has collected more than \$100,000. There certainly would have been more but injuries also cut into his effectiveness during a few years.

He was four years old when he started to play golf. His father was in the golf business in Stockton, CA., and helped to build the Dry Creek Ranch GC in the 1960s. It was a family affair.

His skills surfaced early, as he won city amateur titles in Stockton and Sacramento. He won the 1966 California State Amateur and while at San Jose State, he won the West Coast Athletic Conference title.

Bob headed for the TOUR Qualifying School in the Spring of 1969 and he not only made it through, but he was the medalist. His life on the TOUR had to wait awhile, though. In October of that year, he went into the Army and was not discharged until October of 1971. So, he really didn't join the TOUR full-time until 1972.

Several people have helped him along the way, such as Bob Warner in junior golf and Tom LoPresti during his college and early days on TOUR; but in recent years, Butch Baird has been his guiding hand on the practice tee.

Throughout his career, David Edwards has shown an ability to post really low numbers on some of the more difficult golf courses..

Two years ago for example, he trailed Ian Baker-Finch by nine strokes entering the final round of the Southwestern Bell Colonial. He then went out and shot a 65 on the tough Colonial course to leap into second place.

Three years ago, he finished 65-67 to move into second place in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic.

Last year, two of his top 10 finishes came as results of final round 65s, in the Doral Ryder Open and the MCI Heritage Classic.

His best may have been in the 1984 Los Angeles Open on the great Riviera Country Club course. He shot a magnificent 7-under-par 64 to win by three over Jack Renner.

The victory put him in the 1984 Masters Tournament for the first time and the experience was all he expected it to be--and more. A final-round 67 boosted him into a tie for third place.

David enjoys telling people how he got started in the game. "I was about 12-years old," he said, "and I played because my brother Danny (who is five years older) played. That's all there was to it. All I did when I was growing up was tag along. I did whatever he did. He was the one who talked me into getting a set of clubs."

In the fall of 1980, they carried their brother relationship to the ultimate, winning the Walt Disney World National Team Championship.

David has enjoyed his share of success during his career, but he said it hasn't been easy. "At every level, from juniors, through high school, then college and now on the TOUR, I have had to start at the bottom and work my way up. I haven't been any instant success."

He always found that success, though. He won the Oklahoma State Junior title in 1973, and won the National Collegiate championship for Oklahoma State in 1978, and twice was named to the collegiate All-America team.

Bob Estes appears to be on his way to a long and marvelous career on the PGA TOUR.

He had a good rookie season in 1989 and came back with an even better one last year as he made a significant jump up on the money list.

"I've made steady progress in my game since my junior year in college," he said, "and my goal is to continue to improve each year."

He came within a whisker of winning in his first year but lost in a playoff to Mike Hulbert in the B.C. Open. His only bogey during the final afternoon came on the first extra hole and Hulbert won it with a par.

For Bob Estes, playing on the PGA TOUR was a goal for many, many years. He was an exceptional basketball player--gaining all-district honors around Abilene, TX his junior and senior years--but "when I was about 12 years old, I knew I wanted to play on the TOUR."

He was only four-years old when his father took him to the golf course for the first time. By the time he was "six or seven" he was playing in junior events around Abilene. "They were on a Par 3 course," he said, "and my Dad helped to run them."

He played basketball and golf through high school; in fact he won the Texas High School Golf Championship in 1983.

He earned a golf scholarship to the University of Texas and enjoyed considerable success as a collegiate. In 1988, he was awarded the Jack Nicklaus and Fred Haskins awards as the college-player-of-the-year.

His close friend and teammate through these years--from eighth grade on--has been Kyle Coody, son of former Masters champion Charles Coody.

In 1988 after leaving Texas, Bob turned professional and played in five TOUR events on sponsor exemptions. He made the cut in four of them. "That gave me some added confidence going into Q-School," he said.

He made it to become eligible for the 1989 campaign. He struggled in the early weeks of his rookie season, but in the summer, he obtained some help from Frank Johnson, a pro in Abilene, and Mike Adams in Austin.

"My short game was in pretty good shape anyway," he explained, "but after working with Frank and Mike, my ball-striking improved greatly."

Eventhough Brad Fabel had the best finish of his TOUR career in the Canon Greater Hartford Open last summer, he can't help but think about what might have been.

Wayne Levi won the title with a 13-under-par 267 on the TPC of Connecticut course while Brad tied for second place with three others two strokes behind.

He was tied with Nolan Henke when the final round started and promptly double bogeyed the first hole. He fought back with birdies at the second and eighth holes before taking a bogey at nine.

Two more birdies came at the 10th and 13th holes, so now he was within a stroke of Levi, who had assumed the lead.

Then came the par 3, 172-yard 16th hole. He selected a 6-iron and proceeded to hit it pure, too pure. The ball sailed over the flag and over the green, eventually rolling into the lake on the left. A double bogey followed and a chance for his first victory evaporated.

He still felt good about the week. "When I needed it, I made a good swing," he said. "Where guts and nerves are concerned, I was all right. I made a mistake with the club selection. But that's part of life and that's part of golf."

The \$66,000 he earned was the biggest check of his TOUR career and served as the cornerstone of a strong season.

Brad first earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1984 and went on to earn exempt status in his first full season of 1985. Twice he tied for third place that season, in the Quad Cities Open and Greater Milwaukee Open.

Nagging back problems have cut into his effectiveness during the last few seasons, but when Brad feels right, he has demonstrated an ability to play very well indeed.

After a standout high school career in Kentucky, Brad enrolled at the University of Houston to play golf. One season later, though, he transferred to Brevard Junior College in Florida where he stayed another year.

He then enrolled at the Western Kentucky University, resumed playing golf and set his sights on the PGA TOUR.

When Brad Faxon was enjoying a very successful season during his final year at Furman University, he started to think about the game of golf as a career. "It wasn't until then," he said, "that I realized I was good enough to play on the TOUR."

There wasn't any doubt in the minds of those who followed him through his young career that he was good enough. Brad had enjoyed success at all levels of the game.

Three times he won the Rhode Island State Junior championship. Twice he won the Rhode Island State Amateur and on two other occasions, in 1980 and 1981, he won the New England Amateur titles.

He won 11 times during his collegiate days, and in 1983, won three of the finest awards given to college golfers, the Fred Haskins, Golf Magazine and the NCAA Coaches awards as the Player-of-the-Year. He also was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team that year.

During those later years, he had a taste of TOUR competition. He played in three U.S. Opens, and in 1983 at Oakmont, was the low amateur.

At one time, Brad's grandfather owned a golf course on Cape Cod, and that's where his father, a scratch golfer, learned to play. "I was about five-or-six years old when Dad started me," Brad said, "and I played in my first tournament when I was 13."

It was with that sort of background that Brad launched his PGA TOUR career in the Fall of 1983. He entered the Qualifying School and had little trouble making the grade.

Gradually, his game continued to develop and it was solid the week of the 1986 Provident Classic in Chattanooga (opposite U.S. Open). He shot 67-62-69-63--261 for the victory. Even though it wasn't an official victory, the \$54,000 was official money.

His consistency level has improved each year as he continues to climb the ladder of success. He topped the \$200,000 mark for the first time in 1989, twice finishing second. The first was in the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open in San Diego, CA, and the other was before many of his home state followers in the Bank of Boston Classic.

In the Summer of 1984, he visited with Dr. Bob Rotella, the noted sports psychologist. "I had heard of Dr. Rotella when I was in college," Brad said, "and I've always been interested in sports psychology. He has helped me with the mental aspects of the game."

Raymond Floyd's position as one of the greatest players in the history of the game is assured. His successes have been spread out over nearly three decades and among his impressive credentials are victories in the 1976 Masters Tournament, the 1981 Tournament Players Championship, the 1982 PGA Championship and the 1986 United States Open Championship.

He is the co-holder of the Masters record with Jack Nicklaus at 17-under-par 271. His victory in Tournament Players Championship was in a playoff over an up-and-coming young star named Curtis Strange plus Barry Jaeckel.

When he won the Open at Shinnecock Hills in 1986, he was the oldest ever to win the coveted title. After last year, Hale Irwin is now the oldest.

"The U.S. Open had always been one of my goals," he said. "I don't think my career would have been complete without winning the Open."

His victory in the PGA at Southern Hills in Tulsa also was extremely impressive. He called his first round of 7-under-par 63 "without a doubt, the best round of golf I have ever played, anywhere in my life."

Last year was another very good one, but it also gave him one of the biggest disappointments of his great career. He appeared to have won the Masters again, but Nick Faldo came on strong at the finish to win a playoff on the second extra hole.

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, NC, the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Golf Club in Fayetteville.

Dan Forsman is a man on a mission. He knows what he has to do with his life to be successful and each year he finds new-and-better ways to accomplish his goals.

"I feel like I'm still young and trying to learn," said Forsman. "There's a great deal more wisdom and scoring knowledge that I need to acquire."

He needed all of skills to win the 1990 Shearson Lehman Hutton Open at Torrey Pines in San Diego, CA. A 63 the second day put him in position and then he gained a two-stroke lead after three rounds. That also was his final margin of victory.

His first victory came in rather impressive fashion. He was six-strokes behind Bob Tway after two rounds of the 1985 Lite Quad Cities Open. He shot a splendid 7-under-par 63 the third day to take the lead and then clinched the victory with a closing 67.

In 1986, he struck it rich again in the rain-shortened Hertz Bay Hill Classic. Rounds of 68 and 67 gave him a two-stroke lead after two rounds and then he held off the strong challenges of Ray Floyd and Mike Hulbert in the third (and last) round to win by a stroke. He earned \$90,000.

He believes he learned a valuable lesson in 1988. He played in 35 tournaments, trying to win his second straight "birdies" title. He did, with 465 for the year, but said it took "too much out of me." The result was his earnings slipped in 1989.

Dan started to play golf at age 13, being introduced to the game by his father, an avid golfer. Although he was born in Wisconsin, the family moved to the San Francisco area "When I was about two."

He played his golf at the Los Altos Country Club and started to play in the Northern California junior program, competing against the likes of Bobby Clampett and Joey Rasset.

Dan qualified for the 1982 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach and it was the first time he had ever competed against the TOUR pros. He was fortunate one day to have a practice round with Seve Ballesteros. At the time, Dan was working as an apprentice at the Camelback Country Club.

After enjoying some success in sectional PGA events, he felt it was time to try the TOUR. He went to the School in the Fall of 1982 and made it.

There appears to be no limit to what David Frost can accomplish in this game and year-after-year he keeps moving forward, reaching new heights.

He was winless through his first three years on the PGA TOUR, but his progress was impressive. He broke through toward the end of 1988 and won twice, in the Southern Open in a playoff over Bob Tway and then in the Northern Telecom Tucson Open.

The same week as the Tucson Open, he won the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Finals. He had 11 top-10 finishes in 25 starts.

Two years ago he was even more consistent than the year before but the big victory came in late August in the NEC World Series of Golf. As an example of his steadiness, he had rounds of 70,68,69 and 69 on the par 70 South Course at Firestone Country Club.

His 4-under-par 276 tied him with Ben Crenshaw and then he won it all with a par on the second extra hole. With the victory, he earned a 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events.

Last year, he won the USF&G Classic in rather spectacular fashion. Needing a par on the final hole to tie Greg Norman-who had already finished-at the English Turn G&CC, David drove into a long bunker on the left. His second shot landed in a greenside bunker, some 50 feet from the hole. From there, he holed his explosion shot for a birdie and the victory.

"Somehow, I just knew it would go in," Frost said later. He is known as one of the better bunker players in the game.

A resident of Dallas, TX, David started on TOUR in 1985. Twice he lost playoffs before gaining his first victory. He lost to Tom Kite in the 1986 Western Open and to Seve Ballesteros in the 1988 Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic.

David started in the game at age 14. "I would caddy for my Dad," he said. He played in his first South African Amateur when he was 18. Three times he was selected to play on the South African National amateur team.

The trend was being established as he steadily refined his game. He turned professional in 1981. The following year, he ventured to the United States and "I tried to play on the mini-tour, but I didn't do much."

Before Fred Funk earned his PGA TOUR card in the Fall of 1988, he served as the head golf coach at the University of Maryland for eight years.

"It was a lot of fun," Fred said. "Maybe I was more of a friend to the players than a coach, but it was very satisfying. Maybe the most rewarding factor to me was that 95 per cent of the guys graduated."

As enjoyable an experience as it was, the desire to compete always was there, mainly because he found success at different levels. For example, he won Foot-Joy's National Assistant Pro Championship in 1984 and won the Maryland State Open in 1984 and 1987. There were others.

"I tried to get on TOUR in the Fall of 1984, 1985 and 1986," he said, "but didn't make it. I simply wasn't good enough."

During the summer of 1987, he tore a rotator cuff and was off the circuit for several months.

Once healthy again, he made it through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1988 and had moderate success in 1989. He had to return to the Q-School, however, in the fall and he finished ninth.

Last year, he was able to make a significant move and had three top 10 finishes with a tie for third place in the Chattanooga Classic his best.

As for life on the TOUR, he said, "I always thought it was harder to get your player's card than it was to keep it, but I was off on that, way off. The TOUR is a lot harder than I thought it would be."

"Last year, I was a little more comfortable with everything," he added. "The first year, I felt I could play, but as it turned out, I didn't play well enough, often enough. Now, I know I can play out here."

He said he has reached the stage where nothing surprises him.

On second thought, he added, "I was surprised no one broke 60 last year. When these guys are going on all cylinders, they are awesome."

The best feeling he had all year came at the Buick Open at Warwick Hills in Grand Blanc, MI. "I had a 65 on Sunday afternoon and that moved me into fifth place. It put me over the hump for keeping my TOUR card." He collected \$40,000.

His other healthy check was for \$34,800 as he finished with a pair of 66s to tie for third place in Chattanooga.

Fred started to play golf at about age 10. "I picked it up on my own. It looked like something I wanted to do." By the age of 14, he was competing in junior events and the desire to someday play on the TOUR was starting to take shape.

Jim Gallagher, Jr. always believed he could play well enough to be successful on the PGA TOUR and he proved it last year.

He won the Greater Milwaukee Open in a playoff over Ed Dougherty and Billy Mayfair. They had tied at 17-under-par 271 on the Tuckaway Country Club course.

On the first extra hole- a par 3-Jim hit a 5-iron shot onto the green, some 45-feet from the hole, while Dougherty and Mayfair missed the putting surface. Jim proceeded to two putt for his par while his rivals suffered bogeys.

The victory was in the middle of a solid three-tournament stretch. He tied for sixth place at The International and followed the victory with a tie for third place at the Hardee's Golf Classic.

He had a most enjoyable season in 1989, winning \$265,809-easily his best until last year. He also was married in the fall to the former Cissy Meeks, a member of the LPGA.

A former star at the University of Tennessee, Gallagher comes from a golfing family and there was little doubt that Jim Jr., would be a golfer.

"My dad has been a club professional for years and he started me at age two," remembered Gallagher. "He didn't always have time to teach me, though, so I learned with my Mom."

His father is the professional at Meshingomesia CC in Marion, IN, and that's where Jim played most of his early golf. Like most youngsters, Gallagher played all sports.

After attending Tennessee, Gallagher qualified for the PGA TOUR in fall of 1983 on first try. His first year, though, was a bit of a disappointment to him as he finished 148th on the money list earning \$22,249.

He regained his full exempt status the hard way in 1988. He lost his card at the end of the 1987 season and played only on sponsor exemptions. A tie for second at the Greater Milwaukee Open, though, vaulted him into contention for the top 125 and he played well down the stretch.

Robert Gamez said he "dreamed about winning on the PGA TOUR for as long as I can remember," but never in his wildest dreams did he ever see himself winning in his first official start as a member of the TOUR.

He did, though, in the Northern Telecom Tucson Open in January of 1990.

He'll also tell you he never dreamed of making a spectacular eagle on the treacherous final hole at the Bay Hill Club to win The Nestle Invitational by a stroke over Greg Norman.

"It was the thrill of a lifetime," he said moments after his victory on the TPC at Starpass course in Tucson, "especially with my family and so many of my friends there."

Robert's mother and father traveled from their home in Las Vegas to see their son make his debut on the PGA TOUR. And his brother Randy was his caddy.

Since Robert spent three years at the University of Arizona in Tucson, all of his ex-teammates and many of his college pals were in the gallery cheering him on. Indeed, it was a special time.

After rounds of 65, 66 and 69, Robert held a one-stroke lead over David Frost going into the final round. He took complete control early the last afternoon and, at one point, led by as many as six shots. He eventually won by four over Mark Calcavecchia.

At Bay Hill in Orlando, the competition was fierce throughout the last round among Gamez, Norman, Larry Mize, Curtis Strange, Paul Azinger and Scott Hoch.

Going to the final hole - ranked the most difficult on the TOUR last year - Robert was 12-under par while Mize, who was playing with him and Norman, through 16, were 13 under.

"I figured I had to hit it close to make birdie to tie Larry," Robert said afterwards. He wasn't certain how Norman stood.

So, he selected a 7-iron from 176 yards. He hit the perfect shot. The ball landed about four feet to the right of the hole and then jumped right into the cup for an eagle 2.

Mize went on to bogey the hole and finish third, while Norman parred in and settled for second place.

Robert says the first time he swung a cut-down golf club was when he was two-years old. His father, an avid golfer, would take him to the practice range when he had to baby-sit.

He knew at an early age that golf would be his game. Through high school, he never really won anything but kept playing and practicing. He showed enough promise to obtain a scholarship to the University of Arizona.

Then his game started to jell. He won six collegiate events and, in 1989, was named the winner of the Jack Nicklaus and Fred Haskins awards as the "outstanding college player-of-the-year." He also earned a berth on the Walker Cup team.

He turned professional in the fall of 1989 and played in three official events, his best finish being a tie for 20th in the Southern Open. In 1988, as an amateur, he played in the Northern Telecom Tucson Open and tied for 46th place.

Incidentally, with a smile, he reminds people, "the name is Robert; not Bob or Bobby."

Buddy Gardner had one of the more pleasing weeks of his golfing career in late March of 1990 when he went to the Ben Hogan Panama City Beach Classic.

Buddy had signed on to represent the new Hombre Golf Club there and he proceeded to win the tournament in rather impressive style. Although it did not count as an "official" TOUR victory, it was an important triumph for the likable Gardner.

Buddy can always look at the 1987 Big "I" Houston Open as the tournament someone "took away" from him. He didn't lose it. Jay Haas simply went out and won it.

Trailing by a stroke going to the final hole, Haas, who was playing ahead of Gardner, holed a putt of 70 feet for a birdie and a 12-under-par 276. A few minutes later, Buddy had to two putt from 80 feet for his par and force a playoff. Jay won it on the first extra hole.

Buddy should be saluted for his work with the Big Oak Ranch outside Birmingham, AL. As he said, "It's a camp for abused-and-unwanted boys and girls between the ages of six and 18. "Every year, Buddy hosts a pro-amateur event with the proceeds going to the camp.

Buddy first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1977, but in his first full year of 1978, he won only \$5,637 and lost his card. He went back to the Q-School the Fall of that year and earned it back. Starting in 1979, he failed to qualify for the first four events, and then hit paydirt. He tied for second behind Bruce Lietzke in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. It set up a very good year, winning \$71,468. He also tied for second in the Anheuser Busch Classic in the fall.

The three most important changes in his life have occurred off the golf course. On May 28, 1983, he married Susan, a nurse from Birmingham. Another was in February of 1987 when Brooke Marie was born. And then in December of 1989

Buddy started in the game at age five. "We lived about 100 yards from the first tee of the Bonnie Crest Country Club in Montgomery (AL). Everyone in the family played golf, so it was natural for me to play, too."

At one time, Buddy recalls, the juniors competition in that area was pretty tough, "with the likes of Bill Rogers, Mike Reid, Mac McLendon and myself competing against each other."

He won the Alabama State high school golf championship as a senior and went to Auburn University on a scholarship.

Bob Gilder has always been the type of player capable of reeling off an impressive string of birdies and a study of his record over the years shows you that when this man gets hot, he's really hot.

Three years ago, he closed his season with a victory in the Isuzu Kapalua International on Maui in Hawaii with a 22-under-par 266. He won by two strokes over John Mahaffey.

Interestingly enough, two years ago he finished second to Mahaffey in the Federal Express St. Jude Classic.

Players dream of having years such as he enjoyed in 1982 when he won three times and earned \$308,648. He was sixth on the money list and his exceptional play earned him a position on the 1983 Ryder Cup team.

Each time he won in 1982, he put on a marvelous display of scoring. His winning total of 14-under-par 266 in the Byron Nelson Classic was the lowest ever shot in the 16 years the tournament was played at Preston Trail.

His 19-under-par 261 in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic set a tournament standard and his week was highlighted by a double eagle two on the 509-yard 18th hole the third day. He only needed a driver and three wood. Finally, he won the Bank of Boston Classic.

After the first five weeks of 1983, he was heading for another splendid year. He won the Phoenix Open in a playoff over Rex Caldwell, Johnny Miller and Mark O'Meara.

Bob starred for the Arizona State University golf team--winning the 1973 Western Athletic Conference title--and was a teammate of Howard Twitty and Tom Purtzer. After graduation in 1973, he tried for his TOUR card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974, he won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Jack Newton and Bob Charies.

In the Fall of 1975, he did earn his playing privileges.

In his first start of 1976, he missed the cut in the Tucson Open. The next week at the Phoenix Country Club, he overtook Roger Maltbie the final afternoon to win by two strokes.

Bill Glasson won for the first time at the 1985 Kemper Open and he has been a force on the PGA TOUR ever since. Some years have been better than others, but when everything is right with his game, he's a tough one to handle.

He had a big year in 1988 winning the B.C. Open. He held a three-stroke lead over Joey Sindelar going into the final round and he held on to win. All four of his rounds were in the 60s with a third-round 6-under-par 65 the key.

He finished the season with a victory in the Centel Classic in Tallahassee, again having all four rounds in the 60s. In mid-summer of 1988, he had three straight top 10 finishes with a tie for second in the Canadian Open his best.

It was a big year in another way. Maxwell Alexander was born five days after his B.C. victory to Bill and his wife Courtney.

Bill enjoyed another successful year in 1989. In February he captured the Doral Ryder Open by one stroke over Fred Couples on the way to his best season on the TOUR with \$474,511 in earnings.

Bill's first year on TOUR was in 1984 but, even though he won the Driving Distance statistical category, he lost his player's card at the end of the year. He returned to the Qualifying Tournament at the end of the year and regained it. He made the most of his new opportunity.

He finished eighth in the 1985 Andy Williams Open to earn \$11,200 and two stops later he took home another big check, this one for \$18,250 after his tie for fifth at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. In his next stop, he collected another \$18,050 at the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational.

Feeling instilled with confidence, and with his card all but assured for 1986, Glasson travelled to the long and difficult Congressional Country Club for the Kemper Open.

After three rounds, Bill stood at 4-under-par 212, six-shots in back of Larry Mize.

However, Glasson caught fire on Sunday while Mize struggled and when Glasson reached the par-four 18th hole, he needed to make a 50-foot putt to claim the lead. His long putt ran true and dropped in the hole for a stunning birdie that held up as the final groups finished behind him. The victory was worth \$90,000.

Pained by bad knees that have faced surgery three times, the victory had a second benefit beyond the money. It allowed Bill to pick his spots the rest of the season and to rest his knees whenever necessary, something he has continued to do.

Wayne Grady's victory in the PGA Championship added support to the old belief that nice things truly do happen to nice people.

His peers will tell you that the Australian certainly is "one of the nicest guys" in the business. He has gone through his fine career with a smile on his face, accepting whatever came along and then moving on.

He has had his disappointments and his taste of glory, but there has never been a bigger week in the golf life of Wayne Grady than the one in August of 1990 at Shoal Creek, AL.

While others complained about the rough, Wayne merely kept the ball in the fairway. He assumed the lead the second day after a round of 67 and never was headed. He led by one stroke after two days, by two strokes after three and he won by three with a total of 6-under-par 282.

His first TOUR victory was in the 1989 Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic as he defeated Ronnie Black in a playoff. A month later he lost the British Open Championship at Royal Troon in Scotland in a playoff to Mark Calcavecchia. Greg Norman also was involved.

As a youngster, Wayne wanted to be a pilot in the Australian Air Force. He didn't start to play golf until he was 14 years of age and then turned professional two-years later. He worked in pro shops, but realized it was not the life he wanted, at least not at that time.

He applied to get his amateur status back and was able to do so later in the year. He played a lot a amateur golf around Queensland and then turned professional again in 1978 when he was 21-years old. During those years, he worked under the wing of Charlie Earp at Royal Queensland. He's the same man who has worked with Greg Norman for years.

Later in 1978, he did win the West Lakes Classic in Australia and collected \$12,000. "I thought this was an easy way to make a living," he says, "and I got lazy."

He continued to play on the Asian tour but with little success. Along about 1983, he realized it was time to buckle down and go to work on his game. It was the start of his success story.

He played for a short while in Europe in 1983 and showed a little profit. The next year, his earnings leaped, thanks to the victory in the German Open. The week prior to his triumph, he was second in the Benson & Hedges International after Sam Torrance birdied the last hole to beat him.

Wayne made a few appearances on the PGA TOUR in 1984. "I didn't feel all that comfortable, but I was determined to give it a try in the Qualifying School." He finished in sixth place at LaQuinta, CA in 1984.

There have been many highlights in the spectacular career of David Graham, too many to mention, but everyone knows his victories in the 1979 PGA Championship and the 1981 United States Open Championship would be enough to last many a man a lifetime.

David, the proud man that he is, will treasure those moments forever.

He has cut back considerably on his playing schedule the last couple of years. He not only wanted to spend more time with his family, but he also has become busy in other businesses, such as golf course design.

David has established a remarkable record for a fellow who started in the game with a pick-up set of left-handed clubs.

At the Merion Golf Club in the 1981 U.S. Open Championship, he trailed George Burns by three strokes after three rounds. He then played what many have called one of the finest finishing rounds in the history of the tournament. He shot a 3-under-par 67 for a total of 7-under 273, one stroke better than Burns and Bill Rogers.

As Rogers said at the awards ceremony, "David Graham hit 18 greens in regulation and in the last round of the U.S. Open, that is unbelievable."

Not many of his eight victories have been easy. His first was in the 1972 Cleveland Open and he had to defeat his close friend, Bruce Devlin, in a playoff.

When he won the PGA Championship in 1979, he was cruising and then he double bogeyed the 18th hole to let Ben Crenshaw tie him. He won it with a birdie on the third extra hole.

In the Memorial Tournament in 1980, Tom Watson was headed for an apparent victory, but David won it with a 30-foot birdie putt at the 18th.

David was only 14-years old when he found the left-handed clubs in his garage in Windsor, Australia. He played with them for two years before making the switch to righthanded. As a 16-year old, he worked in a golf shop in Melbourne and, after a three-year apprenticeship, took a head job at a nine-hole course in Tasmania.

Late in the 1960's, he embarked on the tournament circuit, first through Australia and the Far East. It was a road that has taken him to the very top.

Hubert Green has every reason to be proud of the exceptional record he has compiled during his two decades on the PGA TOUR. He has won 19 times and he has the 1977 United States Open and 1985 PGA Championships as his highlights.

He won the Open at Southern Hills in Tulsa. He captured the PGA in a stirring duel with Lee Trevino at Cherry Hills in Denver.

He was two strokes behind Trevino after two rounds, but moved three strokes in front of Lee after the third round. Hubert was able to hold his game together on the treacherous greens and won by two over Trevino.

He nearly made it 20 victories in the Spring of 1986, but Andy Bean caught him on the closing holes in the Doral-Eastern Open and then won with a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

A low point to his exceptionally fine career came during the 1983 season when he suffered with a shoulder problem. Microscopic surgery in the Fall of that year corrected the situation.

Hubert had a stretch of about seven years through the 1970s when he was devastating and certainly one of the outstanding players in the world. During one three-week period in 1976, he won three straight tournaments--Doral-Eastern Open, Greater Jacksonville Open and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

In 1977 he won the United States Open in a gutsy performance at Southern Hills in Tulsa. While his swing may have appeared a little unorthodox, it was highly effective.

Hubert started to swing a club at age five, but as he was going through the teen years, he played all sports. "My father was a believer in sports," he says. "He wanted me to play them all, but as I became older, I eliminated one after the other as I realized I wasn't good enough or big enough to play them." As a result, he began to concentrate more on golf.

He turned professional in 1970 and worked for a summer as an assistant pro at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, PA. He qualified for his TOUR card in the fall of that year.

Ken Green found the easiest way to turn a discouraging year into a brilliant one: win tournaments back-to-back.

He did that in 1988 when he captured the Canadian Open by one stroke with a second-day 65 on the tough Glen Abbey course; and the next week used a third-round 61 for an easy victory in the Greater Milwaukee Open at the Tuckaway Country Club.

The "discouraging" part came in the spring. He three putted the final green in the K mart Greater Greensboro Open to drop back into a tie with Sandy Lyle and then the big Scotsman won it with a birdie on the first extra hole.

A few weeks later in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic, he tied with Greg Norman, David Frost and Seve Ballesteros. Seve won the playoff with a birdie.

Late in the year, he had another disappointment. He was tied with Andrew Magee in the Pensacola Open but three putted the final green to finish tied for second.

Nevertheless, it was a great year for Ken Green and his performance elevated him onto a new plateau, one that is reserved for superstars.

Two years ago, Ken won for the fifth time on TOUR, a two-stroke victory over John Huston at the K mart Greater Greensboro Open. Middle rounds of 66 propelled him to the victory.

Ken's first year on the TOUR was in 1982, but he had to return to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982 and again in 1984 to keep his playing hopes alive.

It was in 1985 that he finally broke through, winning the Buick Open by four strokes with a 20-under-par 268.

He showed that it was no fluke, though, when he came back in 1986 to win the inaugural International tournament on his way to picking up \$317,835 for the year.

It would seem obvious that the modified Stableford scoring system used at The International is good for him because the next year he nearly won again. He finished second and collected \$108,000.

Ken started playing golf at age 12 when his family moved to Honduras where his father was the principal at the American School.

"The only choices we had in Honduras were to play soccer or golf," Green recalled. "I didn't want to kick the ball, so I just went to golf."

Jay Haas has been one of the more highly regarded players on the PGA TOUR for several years and one of the most popular among his colleagues.

Jay quietly goes about his business, wins a few tournaments, challenges numerous times and collects a healthy amount of money.

He won five times early in his career and then came a five-year dry spell before he won again. The victory was in the 1987 Big "I" Houston Open in a playoff over Buddy Gardner. Jay holed a birdie putt of 70 feet and it enabled him to tie Buddy. He then won it with a par on the first extra hole.

He won again in 1988, capturing the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic after starting with a round of 9-under-par 63.

He had five top 10 finishes in 1989 with ties for second in the MONY Tournament of Champions and the Southern Open. Last year, he started with a tie for second in the Northern Telecom Tucson Open.

Jay had big seasons in 1981 and 1982. He won twice each year, and it was his performance late in 1982 and early 1983 that earned him a position on the U.S. Ryder Cup team.

With former Masters champion Bob Goalby as his uncle, it was a foregone conclusion that Jay would become a professional golfer. Bob Started him early and has helped him through every stage of his career.

"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about half my size. He put a grip on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long before he put several more clubs together."

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois State High School Championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest University. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur, the third week he was the low amateur in the U.S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA Championship at Ohio State University.

Gary Hallberg is a personable fellow with a lot of talent and believes his best days still are ahead of him, although he has had some good ones the last few years.

He didn't play with much enthusiasm in 1988 after enjoying a banner year in 1987 when he won for the second time in his career--Greater Milwaukee Open. He won by two strokes with a 19-under-par at the Tuckaway Country Club.

The one shot that clinched it came on Monday after the final round was interrupted on Sunday by the weather. He was in the rough short of the green at the par three 17th hole, but he chipped in from 50 feet for a birdie. It gave him all the daylight he needed.

Gary's first TOUR victory was in the 1983 Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open. He trailed Tom Kite by four strokes entering the last round in 1983 and proceeded to shoot a six-under-par 66 to edge Kite by one. He had an eight-foot birdie putt at the final hole and he made it. "My heart was pumping like it's never pumped before," he said.

He nearly won the same title again the next year but Gary Koch shot a splendid final round of 65 at Torrey Pines to tie him and then Gary won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole.

Gary was an impressive winner all through his amateur career and instant stardom was expected once he joined the PGA TOUR. He became the first player ever to earn his TOUR card by winning the minimum \$8,000 needed at the time to obtain playing privileges without going through the Qualifying School. In 11 tournaments, he won \$64,244. He finished the year with six top 10 finishes.

Gary started in the game at age nine when his father brought home a set of old clubs. Once he started to play, he loved the game and worked diligently at it. So much so, in fact, that his Dad finally had to tell him to ease up and not be so serious. He eventually earned a scholarship to Wake Forest, and he went on to become the first four-time, first-team All-America choice. He was the NCAA champion in 1979 and won a total of 14 college tournaments.

Jim Hallet has been showing all the indications of breaking away from the field and moving up to another plateau in the game.

As an example, last September he had the best month of his career. He went from 24th at the Hardee's to 15th at the Canadian Open to ninth at the B.C. Open (with a 66-66 start) and then made it into a playoff against Kenny Knox at the Buick Southern Open.

Knox won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole. Although slightly disappointed at not winning, Jim was delighted with his strong play. "I'm excited about the way I played, he said. "This was a new experience for me and I believe I handled it well."

Jim will never forget his first trip to the Masters Tournament in 1983. He was a 23-year old amateur and qualified by reaching the semi-finals of the 1982 U.S. Amateur Championship.

The first day, this extremely-personable young man shot a 4-under-par 68--the same as Arnold Palmer and Seve Ballesteros. The next day, he found himself paired with Arnold and Seve.

"That was one of the biggest thrills I've ever had," he said. "Actually, I believe I was leading through 27 holes."

Eventually, Jim shot a 1-over-par 73 for a 141 total, while Seve had a 70 that day and Arnold a 74. Seve went on to win while Jim finally finished tied for 40th place.

Jim is another in a long line of golfers in the Hallet family. His grandfather was a head professional and his father worked for a while as an assistant to Art Wall in the Poconos.

Nevertheless, Jim used to dream of being a hockey player. He was, and a good one, too, until his Alma Mater, Bryant College, dropped the sport. "That's when I turned to golf on a more fulltime basis," he says. "but I played just about every sport because I've always been competitive."

His first taste of success was at age 14 when he won the Northeast Junior Classic on Paul Harney's course in Massachusetts. A few years later, he lost the major Northeast Amateur Classic in a playoff to Chris Perry.

Before earning his TOUR card in the fall of 1987, however, he did win such Open titles as Rhode Island, Massachusetts and British Columbia. Playing around the world to gain needed experience, he even finished as the leader in the 1987 Asian Order of Merit.

He turned professional in 1984 and it wasn't until his fourth attempt at the Qualifying Tournament that he made it through. That was in the fall of 1987 and he finished second, just one stroke behind John Huston.

Donnie Hammond has a reason to be proud of his progress on the PGA TOUR. His first victory came in the 1986 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic when a final round of 66 let him tie with John Cook and then he won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

He climbed several notches two years ago as his last season burst produced his second TOUR win at the Texas Open. His four-day total of 258 (22-under-par) was the second lowest in TOUR history as his 65-64-65-64 missed Mike Souchak's TOUR record by a single shot.

He followed that up by finishing second by a single shot to Tim Simpson in his next start at the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic. That late season effort bolted him 92nd on the money list all the way to 20th at season's end with \$458,471.

"It was a pretty good year, but a great finish," Hammond noted. "I started out well, slumped in the middle and played great at the end."

When Donnie made his bid to join the PGA TOUR, he established a record that may stand forever. He was the medalist in the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982 by an incredible 14 strokes.

Ben Crenshaw won by 12 strokes in the Fall of 1973 and most people thought no one would ever come close to that mark.

Donnie played his six rounds in 13-under-par 419. He opened with rounds of 66 and 68, followed with a 71, and then stunned everyone with a then record 7-under-par 65 on the demanding Tournament Players Club course in Ponte Vedra, FL.

One of the keys, he said, came the first day. He started at No. 10 at the TPC and "When I walked to the 18th green (his ninth hole), I looked up and there was my Dad in the stands. I was three under at the time and I stayed pumped up all week."

His home was in Frederick, MD, and the old Baltimore Colts of the NFL had their pre-season training camp not too far away at Westminster College. "I would go with Dad to watch them, and then we'd play a nine-hole course there. I only had four-or-five irons, but I seemed to pick it up quickly. When he saw that, he bought me a set. I was 13 at the time."

Donnie played at Frederick High School and then went to Jacksonville University. In three years, he won five college events, including the Sun Belt Conference title in 1979 by six strokes.

It was a "rewarding" victory for Morris Hatafsky when he came on strong at the finish to win the 1990 Bank of Boston Classic by a stroke over Scott Verplank.

He birdied three of the last four holes at the Pleasant Valley Country Club for a final-round 68 and a total of 9-under-par 275.

"Golf has been a real struggle for me the last two years," he said, "ever since I won the Kemper Open (in 1988)."

He added, "It's been a difficult journey but I've learned through my faith that you have to persevere, have faith."

The victory in the Kemper was extremely satisfying because it was his first victory in five years and it came in a playoff over Tom Kite.

In July of 1983, he won the Greater Milwaukee Open in a playoff over George Cadle. The next week, he lost a playoff to Danny Edwards in the Miller High Life QCC.

The first time he reaped the rewards of his dedication was in the Fall of 1982 when he won the Hall of Fame Classic on the famed No. 2 course at Pinehurst, winning by two strokes over Jerry Pate and D.A. Weibring.

A few years ago, he started to spend considerable time working on the mechanics of his swing. As a result, his ability to score improved.

"It was something I had to do," he explains. "I've not only learned a lot about the golf swing but about myself as well. I know the work will pay off for many years."

Morris started in golf at age 10 after his brother gave him a set of clubs. "I fell in love with the game right away," he said. Living in San Diego, it wasn't long until he was competing on the junior level and winning. At age 17, for example, he won the Mexico National Junior title, and in 1969, was the San Diego High School golfer of the year.

After two years at Arizona State University, he transferred to the United States International University and continued to play well. While a freshman at Arizona State, he was a teammate of Howard Twitty, Tom Purtzer and Bob Gilder.

Nolan Henke used to watch a lot of golf on television and he always thought that someday he might be good enough to play on the PGA TOUR.

Even though he was enjoying considerable success through his collegiate days at Florida State University--he was the runner-up in the 1987 NCAA Championship, for example--there was a speck of doubt.

Not any more, especially after his sophomore season of 1990 on the TOUR, highlighted by an impressive victory in the B.C. Open.

"It was a gradual evolution of things," he said. "As I became better, my goals became higher."

He missed in his first attempt to get his TOUR card in the Fall of 1987, but he made it the next year. "I thought it was the greatest thing to ever happen to me," he said.

"Once I got out here (in 1989), though, I felt lost. Here I was playing with and against the guys I watched on television. I was uncomfortable, but as the season went along and I got to know more people, I felt more relaxed."

His best finish was an eighth place at the B.C. Open and he finished the season in 159th place on the money list. He went back to the Qualifying Tournament and he made it again.

"My goal in 1990 was to make enough money to keep my card," he said. "Honestly, winning was never in my plans; at least not until it happened."

He shared the first-round lead in the B.C. Open at Endicott, NY, with Jim Hallet at 5-under-par 66. A second-round 64 gave him a two-stroke lead after two rounds and he increased it to three strokes with his third round of 70. A closing 68 gave him a three-stroke victory over Mark Wiebe and a check for \$126,000.

"I've never had the lead every day," he said later. "I didn't know what to expect." With a grin, he added. "I know I'm not going to have a heart attack for awhile. If I didn't have one out there in the final round, I know I'm safe."

He said he recalls "hitting a ball as soon as I could stand up," but it wasn't until he was 12- or-13 years old that he started to pay more attention to the game.

"No one else in the family played, but everyone encouraged me without pushing me," he stated.

"Once I got into high school, I knew golf was the game I wanted to play."

He had splendid success, winning seven collegiate events for the Seminoles plus such other significant amateur titles as the 1986 Porter Cup, the 1937 American Amateur Classic and the 1987 Monroe Invitational.

Since his early teen years, Mike Calbot of Bonita Springs, FL, has been his teacher.

Scott Hoch is recognized as one of the outstanding players in the game; one who can post very low numbers and is capable of winning at any time.

An important victory was earned in April of 1989 when he won the Las Vegas Invitational--and \$225,000--in a playoff over Robert Wrenn. He donated \$100,000 to the Arnold Palmer Children's Hospital, which is affiliated with the Orlando Regional Medical Center where his son Cameron was successfully treated for a rare bone infection in his right leg.

This marvelous success story came only three weeks after he tied Nick Faldo in the Masters Tournament and promptly missed a putt of 2 1/2 feet on the first extra hole (No. 10 at Augusta National) that would have given him the victory. On the next hole, Faldo made a long putt for birdie and the green jacket.

By the end of the year, Scott had accumulated \$670,680 to finish 10th on the money list--easily the best of his career. Scott won the coveted Vardon Trophy for low stroke average in 1986 with a 70.08 mark and nearly won it again the following season.

Scott qualified for the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1979 but before he had a chance to tee it up in his first start, the 1980 Phoenix Open, he jarred his back and had to withdraw. The pain became so severe that he could not even swing a club. It wasn't until the Atlanta Classic in June--the 23rd tournament of the year--that he was able to play 72 holes. He went 15 weeks without even trying to enter.

A few weeks later, in the Quad Cities Open, he shot a course-record 63 the first day and never was headed. He went on to set a tournament record 14-under-par 266 and edged two of his former Wake Forest teammates, Curtis Strange who was second, and Gary Hallberg, who finished third.

At Wake Forest, he was a teammate of Strange and Jay Haas when the Demon Deacons won the 1975 NCAA team title.

Mike Hulbert put together his finest season since he joined the TOUR in 1989, but it was an extra special one because he won the B.C. Open in his home territory.

Mike had to go one extra hole to get the triumph in a playoff over Bob Estes, but he pointed out, "It was like being at home. My whole family and a lot of friends were there."

A final-round 64 at the Canadian Open gave him a tie for second place and by season's end, he had accumulated seven top ten finishes and \$477,621, easily his best.

Mike's first TOUR victory came in the 1986 Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis and what made it exciting was the fact that he had to outduel his closest friend, Joey Sindelar, all the way to the finish. "I still can't believe it," Mike was saying long after the final putt had dropped. "I don't know when it will hit me."

The Hulbert-Sindelar relationship goes all the way back to their days as kids in Horseheads, NY. "Joey's family lived by the golf course," Mike recalls. "When I first started to go over there, I met Joey and we became friends right away. We'd play every day and we'd play as many holes as we could."

There was no doubt in Mike's mind that Joey was the better player. As they grew older, Joey headed for Ohio State University. Mike, meanwhile, started scouting around for a smaller school with a good program and he finally settled on East Tennessee State.

His skills started to show early in 1986. In his third start, the Shearson Lehman Brothers Andy Williams Open, he tied for third place. He pointed out, "I missed a putt of four feet on the last hole that would have put me in the (Bob Tway-Bernhard Langer) playoff." He won \$23,400.

Five weeks later in the final round of the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic, he birdied five of the first six holes and three of the last four to shoot a 64. He tied with Ray Floyd for second place, just one stroke behind Dan Forsman.

His steady play continued but his next strong finish didn't come until the 1986 PGA Championship at Inverness. A 69-68 start helped him to tie for seventh place.

Two weeks later, he earned his victory at the Colonial Country Club in Memphis with a 68-69 finish for an 8-under-par 280. It was worth \$109,064.

While Joey's dad helped him in the early days, he has been under the wing of David Leadbetter for the last five years.

Ed Humenik achieved the goal that all aspiring professional golfers dream about when he got his PGA TOUR card in 1989. Competing against the best golfers in the world, he played in 30 events, making the cut in 11 and narrowly missing nine more by a single stroke. In addition, he won the PGA TOUR Driving Distance category with a 280.9 yard average. However, he finished the season in 168th position on the PGA TOUR money list in 1989, not good enough to achieve exempt status in 1990.

After missing the cut in the 1989 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament due to an illness, Humenik was relegated to sponsor exemptions and open qualifying. But it didn't take the Hobe Sound, FL, resident long to realize that the Ben Hogan Tour may be the next best thing to being on the PGA TOUR.

After open qualifying in the Gateway Open in Fort Myers, Humenik finished tied for ninth and was exempt into the next week's event. He entered the Macon Open and claimed first prize with an 11-under-par performance that earned him an exemption into the remaining Ben Hogan Tour events.

With strong second place finishes in the Quicksilver Open and New York Classic, he sealed his top five position with a victory in the Santa Rosa Open.

"The wins in Macon and Santa Rosa meant a lot to me," Humenik said, "because it put me closer to my goal of returning to the Regular PGA TOUR without going through the qualifying tournament."

Humenik's length off the tee is his calling card as evidenced by his 1989 driving distance statistics. On the Ben Hogan Tour, he learned to use the driver to his advantage by setting up his approach shots into the greens.

"With my irons, I'm probably a club shorter than most of the guys on TOUR," said Humenik. "But with my driver, I'm quite a bit longer. I was paired with Seve Ballesteros in the 1989 U.S. Open and, with the driver, we were close in length, but with the irons he was slightly more than a club longer."

Humenik's study in course management on the 1990 Ben Hogan Tour enabled him to begin this year on a positive note.

"It feels great to be one identified as one of the top players on the Ben Hogan Tour. The competition at each tournament was beneficial for my game and I feel fortunate to have been a part of the inaugural season."

After John Huston earned medalist honors in the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1987, those closest to him expected his success to continue.

The quiet young man from Auburn University did succeed and his rise up the ladder reached its peak at the 1990 Honda Classic. He held off a strong challenge by Mark Calcavecchia down the stretch to win by two strokes for his first TOUR victory.

With a broad grin, he commented, "I've won a thousand tournaments in a thousand different ways but this was the first time I was awake. I've been dreaming about this for 20 years."

A month later at Augusta National, he was in the thick of the Masters Tournament race through three rounds but faltered slightly the last day and tied for third place.

Prior to last year, his best TOUR finish had been as a runner-up in the 1989 K mart Greater Greensboro Open.

John's father was a good player in the Orlando area and at the age of seven, it was Dad who first put the clubs in his hands. "I enjoyed the game right away and the more I played the more I wanted to play."

He was "about 11" when he started to play in small junior tournaments near his home. In 1978, he helped to lead Dunedin (FL) High School to a second place in the state scholastic championships.

He went on to Alexander City Junior College where he met Gene Sauers and when Gene moved on to Georgia Southern College, John went to Auburn University. They still are the best of friends and last fall played in the Chrysler Team Championship together.

"I knew from day one that I wanted to play on the TOUR," he said. "I was 13 years old when I saw my first TOUR event. It was the Greater Jacksonville Open at Deerwood Country Club."

After he turned professional in 1983, he tried the TOUR's Qualifying School with little success. It wasn't until the fall of 1987--his fifth attempt--that he did make it.

"I just wasn't ready the first couple of years," he admits. "I was ready in the fall of 1986, though, but I couldn't putt those greens at PGA West in La Quinta (California)."

He added with a laugh, "Everyone told me that the greens broke toward Indio, but I never did figure out where Indio was. They kept moving the town on me."

That's not likely to happen again.

The great players always seem to find a way to win, to keep a good round going, to keep a streak alive. Even during those moments when the situation appears near impossible, they have the skills to execute.

That was Hale Irwin at his finest during the 1990 U.S. Open at Medinah. He made five birdies on the incoming nine for a 31 and a 67 on the day.

His final birdie was on the last hole, a 60 footer, for a total of 8-under-par 280. It gave him a tie with Mike Donald, who finished sometime later.

The next day in their playoff, they still were tied after 18 holes with 74 strokes, but Hale won it with a birdie putt of 10 feet on the 19th hole. At age 45, he became the oldest player to win the Open.

The next week, it was vintage Irwin again as he held off the challenges of several young players to win the Buick Classic at Westchester Country Club.

The Open crown was his third. He won it in 1974 at Winged Foot and in 1979 at Inverness.

Always a model of consistency, he went from early 1975 through the 1978 schedule-- covering 86 tournaments--without missing a 36-hole cut. That's the third best streak in TOUR history.

Many of his victories have been on some of the more difficult tests in the game. His first two were in the Heritage Classic in 1971 and again in 1973 at Harbour Town Golf Links.

The Butler National, Riviera, Pinehurst No. 2, Muirfield Village and Pebble Beach are true classic courses and Hale has won on them all. While at the University of Colorado, Hale won the 1967 NCAA golf championship.

Many years ago, someone coined the phrase, "Nice things happen to nice people." Whoever said it first, must have had Peter Jacobsen in mind.

His victory at the Colonial came in a playoff over Payne Stewart and came just the week after Peter's father had undergone a rather serious operation. When he dropped a birdie putt on the first extra hole, Peter said, "Well, this one's for you, Dad."

Certainly, one of the more rewarding weeks of his career came last year at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. He burned up the desert courses to win for the fourth time. It was a two-stroke victory.

It had been six years between victories but several times he came close, such as in 1988 when he was runner-up three times.

One was the Beatrice Western Open when he double bogeyed the last hole to permit Jim Benepe to slip in with the victory. Two years ago, the Western was his best finish again as he tied Mark McCumber only to lose the title on the first extra hole of their playoff.

Interestingly enough, the Western was good to him again last year as he tied for third place. Peter battled a ruptured disc in his back in 1987 and at the time said, "I'm swinging and playing well only when the back allows." Obviously, it was much better last year.

Peter started in the game at age 12. His father taught him the fundamentals, and his older brother, David, also helped considerably. "They are about the only teachers I've ever had," he says.

He went to the University of Oregon and won the PAC-8 Conference championship in 1974. He was named to the collegiate All-America team three years. In 1976, he won the Oregon Open and the Northern California Open.

Lee Janzen found out early what life on the PGA TOUR is all about.

Before he obtained his TOUR card, he played in the 1989 Buick Open at the Warwick Hills Country Club and was cruising along in fine shape through three rounds. He had posted scores of 67, 72 and 69 for an 8-under-par 208.

"I was tied for 12th going into the last round," he said, "but I shot an even-par 72 on Sunday and dropped all the way to a tie for 31st. I learned in a hurry that you can't shoot even par on the last day out here, not against these players."

It wasn't easy for Lee to make it all the way to full membership status. In fact, even though he had enjoyed considerable success at other levels of the game, it wasn't until his fourth attempt at the Qualifying Tournament that he made it. In the fall of 1989, he went the distance at the TPC at The Woodlands.

As you might imagine, he was anxious to make an impression early in 1990. There were signs of success but, as he said, "I put too much pressure on myself on Saturday and Sunday.

After a good start, he would find a big number rearing its ugly head to deprive him of a solid finish. However, as the season progressed, Lee began to manage those mistakes.

A 68 on the final afternoon gave him a fifth-place finish in the Deposit Guaranty Classic and a 69-68 finish gave him a tie for seventh in the Buick Classic at the Westchester Country Club.

"The highlight of my year was at Westchester," he said. "I shot a 32 (3-under par) on the back nine on Sunday and that was my best back nine in the last round all year. It felt good."

Lee started to take the game serious at about age 14 after the family moved to Florida. Prior to that, they lived in Maryland and "we played Little League baseball in the summers. In Florida, the Little League games were at night and not in the summer.

"I needed something to do, so I started to go to the golf courses with the guys from Little League."

He won his first tournament at the age of 15 as a member of the Greater Tampa Junior Golf Association. A car accident when he was a junior at Lakeland High kept him off the golf team for six months, but he came back as a senior in 1982 to win the district's individual title.

He went on to Florida Southern College and in 1986, he won the NCAA Division II championship. Twice he was named All-American.

After being graduated in 1986, he turned professional "immediately" and set his sights on the TOUR. It wasn't until the Fall of 1989, however, that he hit his target.

When he needs help with his game, he goes to Rick Smith at the Treetops in Gaylord, MI.

Steve Jones won three times in 1989 and those who know him well believe those victories are a true indication of just how well this big fellow can play.

He was positively brilliant at the start of the season, winning the MONY Tournament of Champions by three strokes over David Frost and Jay Haas and the next week he won the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in a playoff over Paul Azinger and Sandy Lyle.

He took the lead the second day at LaCosta and never was headed in the Tournament of Champions. He opened the Bob Hope with a 76, but it was a 9-under-par 63 the fourth day at Eldorado that put him into contention.

After he tied with Azinger and Lyle on the fifth day he won it all on the first extra hole with a 7-iron approach to four feet and he made the birdie putt.

"I can't believe it," he said grinning. "I won one tournament in five years out here and I didn't think I was ready for this year, then, boom-boom."

In mid-summer, he made it three with an impressive victory in the Canadian Open.

Steve set the stage for a splendid campaign with a victory in the 1988 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, beating Bob Tway in a playoff.

Last year he was involved in another playoff, only this time he lost to Payne Stewart in the MCI Heritage Classic.

Steve started in the game at age 12 under the watchful eye of his father on a nine hole course in Yuma, CO. He went on to play in small junior tournaments around Yuma and also a few elsewhere in the state.

Golf was fun in those days, but the Jones boys were into other sports as well. Steve ran track and played golf in high school, but he earned all-state honors for basketball.

He knew at an early age that his career would be in golf, so when he moved on to the University of Colorado, he concentrated on the game.

He grew up reading golf magazines for tips and instruction. "When I'd see a tip in the magazine, I'd go right out and try it," he said, smiling. "I developed my putting stroke and my chipping style from reading those tips. They all came from the magazines."

These days, Paul Purtzer, who is the Director of Golf at Gainey Ranch Golf Club in Scottsdale, AZ, has been Steve's tutor. Paul played on the TOUR several years ago and is the older brother of Tom Purtzer.

Tom Kite's position as one of the outstanding players in the history of the game is secure. Just as important, he truly is one of the finest gentlemen ever to compete on the PGA TOUR.

His career is full of highlights, but he went well beyond the "highlight" stage in 1989. His performance was like a full-blown Fourth of July fireworks celebration as he earned PGA Player-of-the-Year honors.

He won the Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner for the second time in his brilliant career. He won it in 1981 and in 1989 he set a record with \$1,395,278. He also became the all-time leading money winner with \$5,600,691.

Last year, he took the total to well over \$6-million. A big boost came in his playoff victory over John Cook in the Federal Express St. Jude Classic.

He won three times in 1989 and they all were very significant events. He won the Nestle Invitational at Bay Hill in a playoff against Davis Love III and the next week he gave a superb performance in winning THE PLAYERS Championship on the TPC at Sawgrass course.

He continued to play well through the year but he climaxed it with a playoff victory over Payne Stewart in the Nabisco Championships at Harbour Town. This victory was worth \$625,000--\$450,000 for the winner's check and another \$175,000 from the season-long bonus.

Somehow, Kenny Knox found the right words to describe his feelings after an emotionally-filled victory in the Buick Southern Open last fall.

"Besides the major championships," he said, "this is my most important tournament."

Heading into the final round at the Green Island Country Club, he commented, "I'm excited. This probably is the most nervous I've been in a long time. That shows you what this tournament means to me."

He pointed out that he lived in Columbus until he was 16-years old; still had many friends there and "my father is buried here."

Kenny set the stage for his victory with a brilliant 8-under-par 62 the second day. He was tied for the lead after three rounds and a closing 66 left him tied with Jim Hallet at 15-under-par 265.

They both birdied the first extra hole and then Kenny birdied the second with a putt of 12 feet to win it.

A few months after Kenny started to play golf at age nine, he knew this was the game for him. "I never thought about anything else," he says.

It was his dedication that led to his success in high school golf, and then at Florida State University and finally all the way to becoming a winner on the PGA TOUR. He won the 1986 Honda Classic by turning back the challenges of such players as Andy Bean, John Mahaffey, Clarence Rose and Jodie Mudd, to name a few.

He followed with another fine season in 1987 with the highlight being the victory in the Hardee's Golf Classic. He won by a stroke over Gil Morgan with a tournament record 15-under-par 265.

In 1989, set a TOUR record for the fewest putts in a tournament--93--at the MCI Heritage Classic. He also tied the TOUR record, needing only 18 putts for 18 holes and eight for nine holes.

It wasn't easy for him to get on the TOUR. He first tried it in the Fall of 1978 and missed six times before making it in the Fall of 1981. In those days, there were two Qualifying Tournaments a year.

He was on-and-off the TOUR for the next four years. When it came time for the 1986 Honda Classic, he wasn't in the field, so he entered the Open qualifier (sometimes called 4-spotting). He shot a 67 and made it.

He led through the first two rounds. The wind blew extremely hard on the third day when the average score for the field was more than 79 strokes. He shot an 80 and still was only strokes out of the lead.

The final afternoon, he made the critical shots when he needed them, posted a 70 for a 1-under-par 287 and a one-stroke victory.

Wayne Levi has demonstrated his ability to be a winner every year on the PGA TOUR; but win four tournaments in one season? Even he said "It's like a dream."

Going into last season, Wayne had won seven individual tournaments in a seven-year span, but he had not won since the 1985 Atlanta Classic.

He climbed back aboard the victory train at the BellSouth Atlanta Classic in late May. Two weeks later, he won again in the Centel Western Open by a comfortable four strokes.

Three weeks later, he won again, this time by two shots in the Canon Greater Hartford Open. It wasn't until mid-September that he won for the fourth time--the Canadian Open.

For his efforts, Wayne was awarded the inaugural PGA TOUR Player of The Year award in 1990.

Prior to Wayne's performances, the last player to win four events in the same season was Curtis Strange in 1988.

He has been able to succeed on TOUR without devoting 100 percent of his efforts to the game. His family is very important and he spends as much time as possible with them.

As an example, prior to his victory in the 1983 Buick Open, he skipped five of the preceding six events, saying, "I wanted to be home to see Lauren crawl (their second-born) and I want to be there to see her walk. There will be many more tournaments, but you get to see that only once."

On a historical note, when he won the 1982 Hawaiian Open, he did so using Wilson's Optic Orange ball. He thus became the first player to win a TOUR event while using a colored golf ball.

Wayne started to play golf at age 13, mainly because his pals were playing the game. He fell in love with it almost immediately. During his days at Herkimer High School in upper New York State, he never lost a match, and won the 1970 New York State Interscholastic title. During his two years at Oswego State College, he lost only once.

He earned his TOUR card in the Spring of 1977. In the Fall of 1978, he teamed with Bob Mann to win the Walt Disney World National Team title. In those days, the team event was an official one. He had a multiple victory year in 1982, winning the Hawaiian Open and the LaJet Classic.

When Bruce Lietzke's game is right--and it usually is--he is one of the finest players in the game. It has been said, and rightly so, that he is capable of winning anywhere at any time under any condition.

So, it wasn't a surprise when he came from four strokes behind during the last round of the Honda Classic in 1984 to tie Andy Bean and then win the tournament on the first extra hole.

It was a surprise, however, that he did not win again until the GTE Byron Nelson Classic in 1988. He had to birdie the first extra hole of his playoff with Clarence Rose to get the victory. It was special, he said since Byron has been one of his idols for many years.

Last year was another profitable one for him and early in the Spring, he had a stretch of finishing third in three of four starts--the Honda Classic (then a tie for 11th in THE PLAYERS Championship), the Independent Insurance Agent Open and the GTE Byron Nelson Classic.

During the week of the 1982 Canadian Open, even though he was playing well, he kept insisting that he didn't expect to win. He held a two-stroke lead going into the final round at Glen Abbey, and told everyone he felt he had a good chance to win, but didn't expect to win. He did, of course, by two strokes over Hal Sutton.

It is hard to believe, but there was a time when Bruce put his golf clubs in the closet and wasn't certain if he wanted to continue with the game. It was in the Spring of 1973, shortly after he left the University of Houston.

"I had played so much through high school and college that I was tired of it," he said. At that time, he said he was through with the game. "Oh, I suppose, in the back of my mind, I knew I would get back to it."

Six-months later, he did, and he turned professional in 1974. He missed by one stroke in his first attempt at qualifying for the PGA TOUR, but he made it in the Spring of 1975.

He played well on TOUR almost from the start, although his first victory did not come until the 1977 Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he defeated Gene Littler on the fourth extra hole of a playoff. A couple of weeks later he won again in the Hawaiian Open.

Bruce started to play golf at age five when brother Duane, then an assistant professional in Wichita, Kansas, gave him a cut-down set of clubs.

Bob Lohr said, "I'm pretty proud, leading wire-to-wire, after never having won before." And well he should have been as he birdied the fifth extra hole of his playoff with Chip Beck to win the 1988 Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic.

Bob played brilliantly all week, to say the least. He opened with a 10-under-par 62 on the Palm course, added a 67 at Lake Buena Vista for a 15-under-par 129 and then a 66 at Magnolia for a 21-under-par 195.

He posted a 4-under-par 68 at Magnolia in the final round with a birdie on the final hole, while Beck had a 66 with a bogey on the 18th. They were tied at a tournament-record total of 25-under-par 263.

They both birdied the first extra hole, parred the next two and birdied the fourth. Then came the deciding hole. Beck three putted from 60 feet, missing his par from eight feet. Bob was over the green in two, chipped five feet beyond and then made a good comebacker for the triumph.

More consistency is beginning to evidence itself in Bob's game. As an example, he closed the 1988 season straight "in-the-money" finishes. His best in the stretch was a tie for third place in the Texas Open.

Last year, he made the cut in 10 straight and in 13 of 14 starts through early spring and summer. A last-round 64 gave him a top 10 finish at the Canon Greater Hartford Open.

After he came out of the Qualifying School in the fall of 1984, he didn't set any specific goals, "except to finish among the 125 money winners." I've never been a goal-oriented person," he explained. "Sometimes you can reach a goal and where do you go from there? I just want to continue to improve and learn what I can.

"If you play your own game and put a good score on the board, it doesn't make any difference what the other people do. It sounds simple enough, but it is something you have to learn and adjust to it."

Bob started to play the game at a relatively young age, but he also was an outstanding baseball pitcher as a youngster. He continued to pitch through high school, but when he went to Miami University in Ohio, he had to make a decision, since both sports were played in the spring. It wasn't an easy decision, but he decided to stay with golf.

Is there pressure on the TOUR? He says there is some but adds, "Pressure is when you're on the mound, the bases are loaded, it's the bottom of the ninth and you have a 3-and-0 count on the batter."

Davis Love III said, "I started to play golf as soon as I could walk. As long as I can remember that's all I've wanted to do. When I was nine-or-10 years old, there wasn't any doubt in my mind. I wanted to be a pro."

It was a natural happening. When Davis was just a tot, his father was playing on the TOUR. For many years, until his tragic death last fall, Davis Love Jr. was regarded as one of the premier teachers/technicians in the game.

"Whenever I would be doing something with Dad," Davis said of his early days, "it would be playing golf."

Since he had spent all of his life in the golfing environment, he knew the PGA TOUR wouldn't be an easy road to travel. He knew it would take hours of hard work to stay one stroke ahead of the next guy.

"What I didn't realize," he said, "was how much fun it would be. I've met so many nice people, made good friends and done things I never would have been able to do if it wasn't for the TOUR."

It certainly was a "lot of fun" for him at The International at Castle Pines Golf Club near Denver last year. He made it into the 24-man final field and, in this event that uses the modified Stableford scoring system, he had nine birdies and four bogeys for 14 points. He won by three (two points for birdie, minus one for bogey).

At year's end, he had the most profitable year of his career.

It was a good first year for the three-time All-American and former Walker Cup player in 1986. He was in position to win on a couple of occasions and it was disappointing not to get the victory, but looking at the season as a whole, it was a good one.

In 1987, Love proved that he's also one of the best players in the game, winning the MCI Heritage Classic on the Harbour Town Golf Links. He was also second at the Colonial NIT and went on to win \$297,378.

"Winning at Harbour Town was special because it was so close to home and on a course where you need to hit it straight and putt well," said Love.

Davis had another good season in 1989 and he came so very close to gaining his second victory. In the Nestle Invitational, middle rounds of 67-66 gave him a two-stroke lead over Tom Kite. The final afternoon, however, Kite caught him and then won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole. He also finished third in the BellSouth Atlanta Golf Classic.

Mark Lye enjoyed the best money year of his career in 1989 and much of it was due to an exceptional run at the end.

He reeled off four straight top ten finishes and collected nearly \$125,000 in the process with a fourth in The International, a third in the Greater Milwaukee Open, a ninth in the B.C. Open and a sixth in the Bank of Boston Classic. He did a similar thing last year with two top ten finishes in September.

Speaking of Bank of Boston, he may never experience another afternoon such as the hot-and-humid one at the Pleasant Valley Country Club in September of 1983.

After seven years of battling on the TOUR, he finally won his first tournament, coming from eight strokes behind the last day with a brilliant 8-under-par 64 to win by one shot over John Mahaffey, Jim Thorpe and Sammy Rachels. He finished birdie, par, birdie, birdie.

He came back with another very good year in 1984, with his performance in the Masters Tournament standing out. He led by two strokes after two rounds and was the center of national media attention. He finally finished tied for sixth.

He had the finest round of his career in the third round of the 1984 Walt Disney World Classic. He shot a course record 11-under-par 61 at the Palm Course.

Although he now resides in Ft. Myers, FL, he grew up on the fairways of the Silverado Country Club in Napa, CA and it was there in the 1979 Kaiser International that he nearly won his first tournament. With the cheers of his hometown friends ringing in his ears, he was tied with Lon Hinkle for the third-round lead, but finally had to settle for something less as several others came on strong at the wire.

As soon as Mark started to play the game, he knew he would be a golfer for the rest of his life. He received his first set of clubs as a nine-year old, and he played every day, all day.

He played all over California, and in 1970, he was the No. 1 junior on the state's point system.

He headed for San Jose State after being graduated from high school, and it was difficult at first, because he still had not started to sprout. As a freshman, he was five-feet-nine, 125 pounds. By the end of the next year, he was close to his present size of six-feet-two, 175 pounds.

After graduating from San Jose State, he set his sights on the TOUR, but first headed for Europe for more experience. He tried the Qualifying School in the fall of 1975 and missed and again in the spring of 1976 and missed. He was off to Europe, and then Australia after that, and blossomed a winner. In fact, he won the 1976 Australian Order of Merit. In the fall of 1976, he was back in the Qualifying School, and he made it.

The first victory usually is the most satisfying and Andrew Magee can agree to that. Late in the 1988 season, he came from four strokes back during the last afternoon to win the Pensacola Open.

Even before he went to Pensacola, he was enjoying his most productive year, thanks to such strong finishes as a tie for fourth in the Memorial Tournament.

"I have to give credit to two people," he said. "Jim Flick in Scottsdale has helped me tremendously with my game and Dr. Bob Rotella the sports psychologist from the University of Virginia has helped me with my confidence."

Andrew went over the \$200,000 mark in 1990 for the second time in the last three seasons. Interestingly enough, two of his best finishes came in Dallas and Fort Worth.

He went to high school in Dallas and had a ton of friends in the gallery as he tied for fifth place in the rain-shortened GTE Byron Nelson Classic at the TPC at Las Colinas course.

Two weeks later, he closed with rounds of 69 and 66 to tie for seventh place in the Southwestern Bell Colonial at the Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth.

Early in the year, he had five rounds in the 60s and another top 10 finish in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic.

Andrew was more than satisfied with his rookie season of 1985 and one of his more enjoyable weeks came at the Bank of Boston Classic. He started to play the game at age 11 at the urging of his older brother and that same brother caddied for him in Sutton, MA.

After getting started in the game by his older brother, he progressed gradually until he reached the University of Oklahoma. He had a good spring as a sophomore and then his game took the quantum leap. He became a three-time All-America choice.

"I started to think about the TOUR because I had few older friends who were going to the Qualifying Schools and making it, fellows such as Willie Wood and Mark Brooks."

"When I first came out," he said, "I worked hard on my game. I still do, but over the years I've learned how and when to practice to be more productive."

The most consistent performer last season on the Ben Hogan Tour was also the leading money winner, Jeff Maggert. He finished in the Top 25 on 17 occasions and posted two victories. In addition, Maggert led the Ben Hogan Tour in scoring with an average of 70.02 in 62 rounds.

Because of a lackluster performance in the finals of the qualifying tournament, Maggert was not a fully-exempt player on the Ben Hogan Tour at the beginning of the 1990 season.

"I wasn't assured of getting into the field for the first couple of tournaments, he explained, "so I decided to go overseas and play. It was this type of drive and desire that led Maggert to journey to Australia early in the year where he gained valuable experience.

"Playing overseas really helped me. I was down there with a lot of good players. However, it wasn't long before I began hearing other players talk about how the Ben Hogan Tour gives you an opportunity to improve your game in a competitive environment similar to that of the Regular PGA TOUR," he said.

Making it onto the PGA TOUR was Maggert's lifelong goal, so he decided to return to the United States and pursue his dream on the Ben Hogan Tour.

He took advantage of his first opportunity as his steady play led him to a 16th place finish in the South Texas Open. From there, Maggert missed only two cuts in the remaining events to become the first and only Ben Hogan Tour player to surpass the \$100,000 mark in earnings.

Maggert posted his first win in the Knoxville Open when he eagled the first hole in a sudden death playoff. His second victory came in the Buffalo Open when he calmly rolled in a 15-foot putt for birdie on the first extra hole of a sudden death playoff.

"I've gained a lot of experience this year in performing when the pressure is on, he said. "I feel like I can do well when I need to because of the number of times I've been in similar situations with positive results."

Although confident, he was surprised at his success on the Ben Hogan Tour. "I expected to play well," Maggert said, "but I honestly exceeded my expectations. I've gained a tremendous amount of experience and feel that I'm now prepared to compete on the PGA TOUR."

Maggert capped off a storybook season when he was recognized as the **1990 Ben Hogan Tour Player of the Year.**

"It's quite an honor to receive the inaugural award," Maggert said. "Because the award is voted on by other players on the Ben Hogan Tour, it increases the significance of it for me. I feel fortunate to have been singled out because there are so many good players."

John Mahaffey has been one of the better ball-strikers in the game for many years and, as a result, usually has been able to find a way to make his move at the right time.

Last fall, for example, he made a putt of 25 feet for a birdie on the last hole to win the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Finals at Troon North in Scottsdale, AZ. He defeated Paul Azinger and collected \$90,000.

It also was vintage Mahaffey in the 1989 Federal Express St. Jude Classic. He started slowly with rounds of 70 and 71 and on the new TPC at Southwind course and closed brilliantly with 66 and 65 to win by three strokes. The 10th victory of his career was worth \$180,000.

Certainly one of the highlights of his splendid career came in the 1986 Tournament Players Championship. He came on strong during the final round to overtake Larry Mize and win by a stroke on the TPC at Sawgrass course.

He also enjoyed profitable years in 1984 and 1985. He won the Bob Hope Classic in 1984 after defeating Jim Simons in a playoff and he won the Texas Open in 1985 by defeating Jodie Mudd in a playoff.

John joined the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1971 after a fine amateur career. He won the 1970 NCAA championship for the University of Houston.

His first victory was in the 1973 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas. Physical problems hit him for the first time at the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional. He suffered a hyperextended tendon in his left elbow. It gradually became worse toward the end of the year, and it practically was impossible for him to compete early in 1977.

He was completely healthy again by mid-1978 and enjoyed a six-month stretch when he played as well as everyone knew he could. He won the PGA Championship at Oakmont in a playoff over Tom Watson and Jerry Pate. The next week he won the American Optical Classic in Sutton, MA.

He was named to the World Cup team that played in Hawaii, and he won medalist honors.

Roger Maltbie has always been his own man, as they say, but he also has been highly respected by his peers.

He has had to overcome adversity but when he has been on his game he has been superb, indeed as the five TOUR victories attest.

The key one had to be the NEC World Series of Golf at the Firestone Country Club in 1985 because it provided him with a 10-year exemption. In addition to his on-course performances, he has helped to shape the destiny of the TOUR serving for four years as a Player Director on the Policy Board.

The personable Californian was one of the bright young stars in the game after winning the Quad Cities Open and Pleasant Valley Classic back-to-back during his rookie year of 1975. After the latter triumph, he left his winners check of \$40,000 in a restaurant near the tournament site. The sponsor issued a new one and, at last report, the original still hangs on the wall behind the bar.

The next year, he won the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village, defeating Hale Irwin on the fourth extra hole of their playoff.

After that, he struggled for several seasons, partly due to injuries, but bounced back in grand style by winning the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and the NEC World Series of Golf in 1985.

He came close twice in 1986, as Fuzzy Zoeller edged him out in the Heritage Classic on Hilton Head Island and he lost a playoff to Mac O'Grady in the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open.

There were several highlights to the 1987 season. He was tied for the lead after three rounds of the Masters Tournament but finished tied for fourth. He was third in the Westchester Classic. "The real highlight," he said smiling, "was on March 3. That's when Spencer Davis was born."

Roger was a teammate of Forrest Fezler at James Lick High School in San Jose, CA. As a sophomore, Roger beat Forrest, who was then a senior, for the county scholastic title. Maltbie went on to win the Northern California Amateur in 1972 and 1973, and the California State Open in 1974.

At the beginning of the 1990 season, Dick Mast was unsure if the road back to golf's highest level led through the cities hosting Ben Hogan Tour events.

"Early in the year, my first thoughts were to get back onto the PGA TOUR as quick as possible," he said. "I was going to try Monday Qualifying on the PGA TOUR and hope that a few sponsors would give me an exemption into their tournament. However, after playing in my first Ben Hogan Tour event, I decided to play the entire season because of the organized and efficient way that the tournaments are conducted. I am extremely glad that we had the Ben Hogan Tour because it gave me an opportunity to hone my game in a competitive environment."

Mast's Regular PGA TOUR experience enabled him to make an early impact on the Ben Hogan Tour. After missing the cut at the South Texas Open, he finished tied for second in the Baton Rouge Open. The very next week, Mast notched his first of three wins of the year at the Mississippi Gulf Coast Classic.

"Financially, it was like someone had lifted a great burden off of my shoulders," he explained. "We were struggling and I thought about getting a sponsor but my wife wanted me to wait just a little longer, and her advice paid off. The win was also a great confidence booster for me because of my strong finish in the last round. I knew what I had to shoot, and I went out and did it."

After adding victories in the Pensacola Open and the Fort Wayne Open, Mast became the first Ben Hogan Tour player to clinch his 1991 PGA TOUR card. However, he doesn't feel he's reached his potential as a player.

"I can't adequately express the confidence that I've gotten this year or the relief I felt in not having to return to the Qualifying Tournament. I've had a funny career in that I've been successful on the mini-tours and I have had some success on the Ben Hogan Tour. Now I want to accomplish these same things next year on the PGA TOUR."

Billy Mayfair joined the PGA TOUR in 1989 with an extremely-impressive list of credentials. He is one of the few people to win both the U.S. Amateur Championship--in 1987--and the U.S. Public Links crown--1986.

He also won a lot more as an amateur, enough to be named the 1987 collegiate Player-of-the-Year while performing for Arizona State University.

As a result, he was expected to do well and he certainly has not disappointed his followers.

He had a reasonably successful rookie season in 1989, winning well over \$100,000 and gaining exempt status on the money list.

Last year, however, he was comfortable with life on the TOUR and the results reflected it. His best opportunities for victory were in the Greater Milwaukee Open, where he lost in a playoff to Jim Gallagher, and in the Nabisco Championships, where he lost to Jodie Mudd.

Despite the playoff losses, Billy let it be known with his stellar play that his day will come soon.

He had a stretch in late summer of four top 10 finishes in six starts including Milwaukee and a tie for fifth in the PGA Championship.

Billy started to play golf at age two. "My father cut down some of his old clubs and I'd hit plastic golf balls in the back yard," he explained.

By the age of five, he was receiving instructions from Arch Watkins, who now is the head teaching professional at Camelback in Scottsdale. He was competing in the Arizona State Juniors two years later. He won the state Pee Wee division at age 8, his first title.

Being from Phoenix, it seemed natural for him to move on to Arizona State where his success continued. After winning the Arizona State juniors four times, he added seven collegiate titles to his collection.

Playing on the PGA TOUR "always was one of my goals," he said. He entered the Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1988 and of, of course, he made it.

He had some experience with TOUR events prior to 1989, such as playing in the 1988 Masters Tournament, the 1988 U.S. Open, the Phoenix Open twice, the Colonial National Invitational and the Tucson Open once.

He said of the first year, "The TOUR is great, but it isn't as glamorous as some people think. And, there is more travelling than I thought there would be."

As for the competition, he added, "You play with friends and they want to beat you and win just as much as you do. The important thing, though, is they remain your friends."

Blaine McCallister became part of TOUR history when he won the 1988 Hardee's Golf Classic at the Oakwood Club in the Quad Cities area.

His middle two rounds of 62-63--125 equaled the all-time lowest score ever posted on the TOUR. Ron Streck set the standard when he won the 1978 Texas Open in San Antonio.

With opening-and-closing rounds of 68, Blaine finished with a 19-under-par 261 and won by three strokes over Dan Forsman.

"Oh what a feeling," the personable Texan said. With a grin, he added, "Maybe I can hang out with some of the big boys now." He came close in the 1986 Bank of Boston Classic but his good friend, Gene Sauers, birdied the third extra hole of their playoff to win it.

He got his vengeance on the Pleasant Valley course in 1989 when he won the Bank of Boston title. He also collected the Honda Classic crown and had by far his best year with \$523,891 in earnings, good for 15th on the money list.

Last year, Blaine suffered with a bacterial infection during the early weeks of the season. He was even too ill to compete effectively in the Honda. He tried to defend his title, but had to withdraw.

By mid-season, however, his clubs were blazing again and a solid tie for fifth place in the Buick Classic at Westchester got him going.

Blaine started to play golf at age 14 in Fort Stockton, TX, with a couple of friends. "I thought it was neat how far you could hit the ball," he recalls.

He went on to win the 1977 Texas State High School championship. Ken Wright, who was the pro at the Fort Stockton Golf Club, helped him through those early years.

He received a scholarship to the University of Houston and became a four-year letterman. He roomed with Fred Couples one year and with CBS sportscaster Jim Nantz the other three.

Charlie Epps then, the head pro at the Houston Country Club, helped to turn his game around. Putting was one of Blaine's weaknesses because "I seemed to see too much break when I putted righthanded.

"I do everything lefthanded except play golf," Blaine recalls. "Charlie suggested I try putting lefthanded."

It took awhile to get used to the feel but gradually more putts started to drop.

It was a highly-emotional scene as Mark McCumber walked onto the 18th green at the 1988 PLAYERS Championship, his head held high, as the thousands in the gallery roared in salute to the champion-to-be.

Mark proceeded to win this coveted title at the Tournament Players Club with a TPC at Sawgrass record score of 15-under-par 273. He had rounds of 65-72-67-69 to win by four strokes over Mike Reid.

Mark had been recognized as one of the finest players in the game for several years -- he had won five previous events -- but THE PLAYERS moved him up another notch.

He had an impressive stretch in the summer of 1989 with four straight top 10 finishes, culminating in a victory in the Beatrice Western Open in a playoff over Peter Jacobsen. A tie for second in the U.S. Open was part of the streak.

He closed the year with seven top-10 finishes and certainly one of the highlights for him was being a part of the Ryder Cup team.

He started on TOUR in the Spring of 1978 and was a winner of the Doral-Eastern Open twice, in 1979 and 1985. He enjoyed a banner year in 1983, winning the Western and Pensacola Opens.

He added the Anheuser-Busch Classic title to his collection in 1987 with a final round of 66 helping immensely.

He also is extremely proud of the work of Mark McCumber and Associates, the design-arm of McCumber Golf, the company he helps operate with his brothers.

They have numerous courses either completed or in the design stage, but one that opened in the fall of 1987 was Summer Beach on Amelia Island, FL. They have worked on many courses, but as he says, "the last dozen or so have been Mark McCumber design courses."

As highly respected as he is for his talents in playing the game, Mark is beginning to make an even greater impact in the world of golf course design.

Jim McGovern's road to the 1991 PGA TOUR was difficult because he wasn't guaranteed of playing on the Ben Hogan Tour at the beginning of the 1990 season. Struggling with continual putting problems, McGovern was unsuccessful in gaining his card at the PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament and could finish no better than an alternate spot in the Ben Hogan Tour Qualifying Tournament. He was forced to wait until the player commitment deadline each week to see if he was included in the tournament field.

It was not until he won the Lake City Classic that the Oradell, New Jersey resident began to turn his career around. In addition to the \$20,000 first place check, his victory provided him with an exemption into the remaining tournaments.

"It was the biggest thing that has happened in my life," McGovern said of the win. "The Ben Hogan Tour provided me with a chance to prove that I could play against top caliber competition and I took advantage of that opportunity."

McGovern combined seven birdies with an eagle enroute to firing a course record 63, finishing the 54-hole tournament tied for the lead at 14-under par. He then defeated David Toms on the fourth playoff hole for the victory.

Playing in 29 of 30 Ben Hogan Tour events last season, he also posted impressive victories in the Texarkana Open and in the New Haven Open at the prestigious Yale Golf Club.

In addition, his aggressive style enabled him to lead the Ben Hogan Tour in birdies with 292. "The biggest thing I learned this year was that you have to give yourself a lot of chances to score," McGovern said. "Watching some of the best players in the world manage their game around a golf course was an educational experience in itself."

McGovern was first exposed to the game when his parents bought a house adjacent to the Hackensack Golf Club in New Jersey.

"Even though my dad was a member," he said, "I wasn't allowed on the course because of the minimum age restriction. But that changed, when, during a storm, a tree fell onto the fence behind our house. After that, my brothers and I were able to walk across the tree and onto the course where we hit balls until late at night."

From that point on, Jim McGovern's life has evolved around the game of golf.

"When I was nine years old, my brother Rob, who is a linebacker in the NFL, accidentally hit me in the mouth with a nine-iron, McGovern remembered. "Although I had to have 14 teeth replaced, he was so scared our parents would be upset with him that he ran away for for a full day."

Larry Mize will be known forevermore as the man who made the "impossible" shot to win the 1987 Masters Tournament.

Setting the stage, Larry made a gutsy eight-foot putt for a birdie on the final hole to tie with Greg Norman and Seve Ballesteros at 3-under-par 285.

The playoff started at No. 10, but Seve was eliminated when he three putted on the first hole. Larry and Greg par'ed.

On the 11th, Larry's approach sailed far to the right of the green, some 140 feet from the cup. Norman was on the right fringe.

Using a sand wedge, Larry's chip was absolutely perfect and rolled dead center for a birdie. Slightly dazed by the turn of events, Norman missed his long putt for a birdie.

It was the second victory of his TOUR career. The first was in the 1983 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic when he made a birdie putt of 25 feet to edge the likes of Fuzzy Zoeller, John Mahaffey and Chip Beck.

Even though he did not win last year, he had a marvelous season. Three times he finished second and twice was third and easily enjoyed his most financially-rewarding campaign.

He came from five-strokes behind in the MCI Heritage Classic to tie with Payne Stewart and Steve Jones, but Stewart went on to win the playoff. He also was second in the BellSouth Atlanta Classic and the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic.

While he defeated Norman in the Masters, it was Greg who won the 1986 Kemper Open in a playoff over Larry.

Even before his victory in the Masters, Larry was considered a solid player, who could win at any time. He was at his brilliant best throughout 1987, winning \$561,407 and ranking sixth on the money list.

Since the first time he picked up a club at the age of nine, Larry Mize has been totally in love with game. He only had a few lessons in the formative years, as his father, a scratch handicapper, pointed him in the right direction.

He went to Georgia Tech, where he was No. 1 for three years and captain of the team for two. Along the way he also won the Atlanta Amateur championship.

Gil Morgan has to be one of the most amazing men in the game. A few years ago, his career on the TOUR appeared to be in jeopardy due to an injury, but he came all the way back to have spectacular 1990 season.

He won the Kemper Open in early June in a marvelous display of consistency for the seventh victory of his career. By season's end, he had more than doubled his previous best single season money total.

He lost another event, the Independent Insurance Agent's Open in a playoff to Tony Sills and also was second in the Nissan Los Angeles Open.

He underwent surgery for a torn rotator cuff in early September of 1986. Dr. Frank Jobe of the Centinela Hospital Medical Center performed the operation and while it was declared successful, he couldn't be certain how well he would perform in the heat of battle.

It was nearly nine months before Gil was back on the firing line as he returned for the 1987 Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational in early May. During the middle of summer, he was near the top of his game again. At the Hardee's Classic, a third-round 63 gave him the lead, but he finally finished second to Kenny Knox. He was positively amazing early last year when he finished in the top eight in seven straight events.

Through the years, Gil always has been able to create excitement on the course. In 1983, for example, he won the first two tournaments of the year - the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in a playoff over Lanny Wadkins and then the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

His biggest victory was in the 1978 World Series of Golf when he defeated Hubert Green in a playoff and finished the year as the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson.

Gil started to play the game at age 15. When he was a junior at East Central State in Oklahoma, he decided to pursue it as a career, along with his goal of some day obtaining a degree in optometry. He waited until he earned his doctorate in optometry before turning professional in 1972.

Jodie Mudd moved up to another plateau in the game after his impressive victory in THE PLAYERS Championship on the TPC at Sawgrass course last year.

"It is the biggest win of my career," the soft-spoken Kentuckian said. One of the rewards, of course, was a 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events.

He posted rounds of 67-72-70-69 for a 10-under par 278 and one-stroke victory over Mark Calcavecchia. "I battled Mark down the stretch," he said, "and some people thought Mark would run me down. But, I won it on my own."

The victory was the third of his career. The first was the 1988 Federal Express St. Jude Classic in Memphis and it was special because "I waited a long time to win so close to home."

He won the 1989 GTE Byron Nelson Golf Classic as he shot a 5-under-par 65 the last afternoon to tie with Larry Nelson and then won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

He won the 1990 Nabisco Championships impressively by birdieing his final three holes to defeat Billy Mayfair in a playoff.

Jodie became an official member of the PGA TOUR in April of 1982, the week after the Masters Tournament. As an amateur, he tied for 20th at Augusta that year. His first pro start was the Tallahassee Open and he tied for 30th, winning \$675. The next week, he played in the USF&G Classic and tied for fifth place, pocketing \$10,537.

That was sufficient for him to meet the minimum money guideline that was in effect at that time, and he was a TOUR regular the next week in the Houston Open.

Jodie came from a golfing family, and in the early days, he caddied for his father. He continued to play golf in high school but also excelled in basketball.

After playing in a couple of events in Florida, he accepted a scholarship to Georgia Southern College. There, his game blossomed. Twice he won the United States Public Links Championship, in 1980 and 1981. He won the prestigious Sunnehanna Amateur in 1981 and was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup team the same year. He won eight collegiate events.

Through the years, Larry Nelson has compiled an enviable record winning 10 times including a U.S. Open and two PGA Championships.

He has served as a Player Director on the TOUR's Policy Board, played an important role on three Ryder Cup teams and been victorious enough in Japan to be a popular figure there.

He indeed, has been a tremendous credit to the sport, a true gentlemen with immense talent.

He won his first PGA title in 1981 before thousands of his hometown followers at the Atlanta Athletic Club. He won by four strokes over Fuzzy Zoeller.

He also won the PGA in 1988 in a playoff over Lanny Wadkins at Palm Beach Gardens, FL.

He won the 1983 Open at Oakmont in a brilliant effort. He was seven-strokes behind after two rounds but a 6-under-par 65 in the third round placed him one behind Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros.

The last day, while Seve was fading, Larry battled Watson. Severe thunderstorms hit the area when Larry was on the 16th tee and Watson on the 15th.

The next morning, Larry hit a 4-wood to the back of the green on the par 3 hole, some 62 feet from the cup. Incredibly, he made it for a birdie and went on to win by one. His 10-under-par 132 for the last two rounds established an Open record.

He was a proud man at the 1988 Georgia Pacific-Atlanta Classic. He gained his 10th victory after a brilliant display through the first three rounds, shooting 63-66-66--195 (21-under par) and then a final 73 to win by one at the Atlanta Country Club where he has a home.

Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, Larry was on TOUR.

He attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried college again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree Club in Kennesaw, GA. He turned pro six months after that.

Greg Norman may be the most charismatic player in the game today and with his incredible skills, he does generate excitement.

He has posted many victories worldwide and most of them have been impressive, indeed, such as the 1986 British Open at Royal Troon. Even when he doesn't win, he can make it exciting.

Last year, he won the Doral Ryder Open in a playoff over Paul Azinger, Mark Calcavecchia and Tim Simpson. He chipped in for an eagle on the first extra hole. He also won the coveted Memorial Tournament title.

He was second in The Nestle Invitational after Robert Gamez holed a 7-iron on the final hole for an eagle; and in the USF&G Classic when David Frost holed a bunker shot for a birdie.

Another that got away was the 1989 British Open Championship at Royal Troon, Scotland. He shot a final round 64 to tie with Calcavecchia and Wayne Grady, but Calcavecchia won the playoff.

He missed nearly two months of 1988 with an injured wrist. In the second round of the U.S. Open, on the ninth hole, he strained it severely when hitting a ball off a tight lie and the club hit a boulder.

He truly was incredible in 1986. He won twice on the TOUR and was second four times. Overseas, he won the British Open, European Open, Suntory World Match Play and then three in a row in his native Australia.

In all four of the more significant 1986 championships, he was in the lead going into the final round. He led by one stroke going into the last day of the Masters Tournament and finished tied for second. He led by one after three days at the U.S. Open and finally tied for 12th place.

Andy North has had many wonderful days on the PGA TOUR and he always thought there never would be another week like the one he enjoyed in 1978 when he won the United States Open Championship at Cherry Hills in Denver.

But there was another. It came in the Summer of 1985 at Oakland Hills in Birmingham, MI, when he won the Open Championship again, this time in a tense duel with several players who had opportunities to win. At the end, it was Andy at 1-under-par 279 and one stroke better than Tze-Chung Chen of Taiwan, Dave Barr of Canada and Denis Watson of Zimbabwe.

At Cherry Hills, he led by four strokes with five holes to play. There were some anxious moments before he was through, though. When he hit his tee shot on the 18th hole, he needed a bogey to win--and that's what he scored. After being bunkered in three, he blasted to four feet and he made it to gain the victory.

It was a struggle for Andy in 1983 and 1984, due mainly to a painful right elbow. It was thought to be tendinitis, but closer examination revealed a bone spur. He underwent an operation and had it removed in the Fall of 1983. As it turned out, it was "about the size of a piece of gravel."

In 1989, he underwent a knee operation at the beginning of the year, came back in the Spring and played through the U.S. Open. The next week he underwent a neck operation "to remove some bone spurs." He was back for the PGA, but a month later, he injured a shoulder and was finished for the year.

He also had a knee operation in October of 1987 "to clean the joint surfaces."

The brightest spot of last season came in September. A closing round of 66 at the Hardee's Golf Classic set the stage for a strong finish in the Canadian Open at Glen Abbey the next event. He tied for fourth place with four solid days of play.

Meanwhile, he also has become involved in golf course design work and has done some work as a golf commentator on television.

An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, WI. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf--if he rode in a cart.

Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

He also has been a winner elsewhere, such as in the 1985 Isuzu Kapalua International in a playoff over Corey Pavin and won several foreign events such as the 1986 Australian Masters.

The last several years, Hank Haney has been the man Mark has turned to when he needed help.

He started to play the game at age 13 after his family moved to Mission Viejo, CA. A golf course was next to their home and, at the time, Mark didn't know many of the kids in the neighborhood. So, he would slip onto the course and play.

He wanted to make the golf team as a freshman at Mission Viejo High School, and he did. His junior year, the team won the state championship.

He wanted to play well enough to earn a college scholarship, and he did that, too, going to Long Beach State University.

He broke onto the national scene in a big way in 1979, winning the United States Amateur at Canterbury in Cleveland, defeating John Cook in the finals.

Jerry Pate has never been one to look back and reflect on what might have been; at least not in public.

However, he couldn't be blamed if he did. Instead, when his brilliant career was put on hold after a serious shoulder injury in mid-1982, he moved on to other interests.

He continues to play a limited schedule and says he enjoys the competition as much as ever, but he also formed his own company named, Jerry Pate Golf Design.

He turned to golf course designing shortly after the injury and through the years, he has done some extremely impressive work, including the Valley Course at the TPC at Sawgrass with Pete Dye.

The personable Pate won the U.S. Open at the Atlanta Athletic Club in 1976 and a few weeks later, won the Canadian Open. He has eight TOUR titles, his last being the 1982 Tournament Players Championship on the Stadium Course at Sawgrass.

When he won the 1981 Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, he dove into the large lake to the left of the 18th green.

After he won the Tournament Players Championship and while on the 18th green for the awards ceremony, he pushed Deane Beman, Commissioner of the PGA TOUR, and the course architect, Pete Dye, into the lake; then he dove in himself.

He had good reason to celebrate. He birdied four of the last seven holes-including the 17th and the 18th holes.

Jerry has also left his mark on television. He has become a prominent on-course commentator for all ABC golf telecasts.

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a PGA TOUR rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a 5-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a two shot victory. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings was the most ever won by a rookie until Hal Sutton bettered it in 1982.

Steve Pate knocked on the door on several occasions and close followers of the game knew it was just a matter of time until the former standout at UCLA claimed his first victory.

When he decided it was time to go through the door, he did more than knock. He stepped all over it and charged through to three victories in a span of less than five months.

The first was in the Southwest Classic in Abilene, TX, in late September of 1987. He came from four-strokes behind the last afternoon to win by one.

He started the new year in spectacular fashion, winning the rain-shortened MONY Tournament of Champions at LaCosta by one stroke over Larry Nelson. Five weeks later, he won again by a stroke in the Shearson-Lehman Hutton-Andy Williams Open. Jay Haas was the victim this time.

Although he did not win again the rest of the year, he did finish second in the International and third in the U.S. Open. He earned well over a half-million dollars. "I wasn't disappointed with the year at all," he said grinning.

His best finish last year was a tie for second in the International and it was a double eagle two (driver 2-iron on a 535-yard hole) that propelled him into that position.

Steve came close to winning in his rookie year of 1985. He was tied with Wayne Levi after 72 holes in the Georgia Pacific-Atlanta Classic but lost on the second extra hole to Levi's birdie putt of 12 feet.

It prompted him to comment, "Yes, I'm a little disappointed but Wayne had to birdie three of the last four holes we played to beat me. I was having fun and it was a blast being on television."

Steve started to play golf at the age of nine, mainly because his parents played and they encouraged him. In his first competition, at age 11, he recalls shooting a 107. He progressed well enough to make his high school team in Santa Barbara as a freshman. In his senior year, he won the California Interscholastic Federation title. He moved on to UCLA.

Jim Petralia of the Annandale Country Club in Pasadena also has been a big help. "He was in Santa Barbara for awhile and I started to work for him when I was 16," Steve said.

Oh, yes, he does get asked frequently if he is related to Jerry Pate. The answer is no.

Corey Pavin went into the record book when he won the 1988 Texas Open presented by Nabisco at the Oak Hills Country Club in San Antonio. He won by eight shots with a total of 21-under-par 259.

He thus became the fifth player in PGA TOUR history-Donnie Hammond made it six with his 258 total in the 1989 Texas Open- to break 260. Mike Souchak owns the all-time mark at 257 (shot at Brackenridge Park in the 1955 Texas Open) while Corey joins Byron Nelson, Chandler Harper and Tim Norris as the only players at 259.

Corey started the week with a 6-under-par 64 and then added a 63 and a 66 before closing with a 66 and a 259 total.

Corey won the Houston Coca-Cola Open in his rookie season of 1984. He won the Colonial National Invitation in 1985 and his 14-under-par 266 established a tournament record.

He won back-to-back Hawaiian Open titles in 1986 and 1987. He also added the Greater Milwaukee Open to his list in 1986 and the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in 1987 when he made a dramatic birdie putt on the final hole.

Last year was another good one for Corey. A tie for second in the Southwestern Bell Colonial was his best and a final round of 63 gave him a tie for third place in the Las Vegas Invitational.

When Corey collected \$260,536 in his first year, it was at that time the most money ever won by a rookie. In 1985, he compiled 13 top ten finishes-more than any other player.

The last few years, Bruce Hamilton has been his mentor.

Corey started in the game at age eight and it wasn't long before he was receiving his first taste of competition. It was in 1977 that he won his first two important titles. As a 17-year old, he captured the Junior World crown and also became the youngest ever to win the Los Angeles City Men's Amateur.

He was very successful during his years at UCLA, winning 11 tournaments including the PAC-10 championship in 1982. His exceptional play as an amateur landed him a position on the 1981 U.S. Walker Cup Team. Later, he also represented Uncle Sam in the TOUR's 1985 Kirin Cup matches.

The Calvin Peete success story is one that will live forever in the history of the PGA TOUR. In a five-year span in the mid 1980s, he won nine times and established himself as one of the truly great ball-strikers in the game.

The most prestigious title came in March of 1985 when he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass. It assured him of exempt status for the following 10 years.

Four of his victories came in a brilliant 1982 campaign and he has been a leader in such statistical categories as driving accuracy and greens in regulation almost from the beginning of the program. He has played on two Ryder Cup teams as well.

Lower back problems put him on the sidelines for much of 1987 and again in 1989. "When I felt it coming on in 1987," he said, "I should have taken time off, but I didn't. It just made matters worse."

While he had a reasonably good 1988, the back flared up again in 1989 and he did take time away from the game this time.

Last year, he won the driving accuracy statistic for the 10th straight year. "I take great pride in that," he added, and well he should.

He won the Golf Writers' Ben Hogan award in 1983. It goes annually to the individual who had to overcome a physical handicap or illness to play the game. As a youngster, Calvin suffered a broken left elbow and even today, he cannot extend the arm. So much for golf's straight-left arm principle.

In 1984, when Calvin won the Texas Open in San Antonio, he had two rounds of 67 and two rounds of 66. It assured him of his first Vardon Trophy for low stroke average--70.56.

Born in Detroit, MI, Calvin spent most of his life on a Florida farm with his 18 brothers and sisters--through two marriages by his father. He was forced to drop out of school at an early age.

While still a teenager, Peete got into the business of selling goods to migrant farm workers. The field hands had little chance of getting into the city stores, so Peete would pack clothes, rings, watches, jewelry and anything else he could squeeze into his station wagon and take off. Wherever the migrant workers went, Peete was not far behind. From Florida it was a series of selling stops along dusty roads as far north as Rochester, NY.

Calvin had friends in Rochester, and each year his buddies would invite him to play golf. Finally, in 1966, when he was 23 years old, Calvin tried the game with his friends.

David Peoples seems to enjoy squelching the long-standing notion that PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament is akin to a "chamber of horrors."

"That's my favorite tournament of the year," he said late last year and then he added a laugh to let you know he was only kidding.

And, right now, he can joke about it because at long last he has earned full exempt status on the TOUR. He enjoyed a very good season in 1990, earning well over \$200,000, and winning the Isuzu Kapalua International.

Consider his plight during the decade of the 1980's, if you will. It was one of great perseverance as he went to the Qualifying Tournament nine times and was successful six of those years.

He easily reeled off the chapters, each committed to memory and none will go away.

"I made it in the fall of 1982 and won \$28,000 in 1983. Back to the school. I made it and won \$18,000 in 1984. Back to the school..." and so on.

It is interesting to note that in 1982, he was second to Donnie Hammond at the TPC at Sawgrass. And, in 1989 at the TPC at The Woodlands, he was the medalist.

Actually, he describes the Q-School as a "survival" school. "Your year's on the line," the personable fellow said. "Your life's on the line. It's a whole year of your life in six rounds and six days.

"Yes, there have been times when I thought I should be doing something else. But, now it looks as if I finally got it right.

"For the first time since I turned pro (in 1981), I get to go hunting this fall (1990) rather than back to TOUR school and I can have a real Christmas."

David was born in Augusta, ME, but Florida is where he calls home. He established himself as a fine player early, winning the 1979 Florida State Amateur championship.

He attended the University of Florida before turning professional in 1981 and seeking his fame and fortune on the PGA TOUR.

Through the years, he learned how to bring consistency to his game. Early last year, he had a stretch of nine tournaments where he made the cut in each one. His best finish was a tie for third place in the Independent Insurance Agent Open at The Woodlands, TX. He was only one stroke out of the Tony Sillis-Gil Morgan playoff.

He had another string of nine late in the year with his best being a tie for fourth place in the Buick Southern Open. He started 67-62 at the Green Island Country Club. As he said, "the 62 is the lowest I have ever shot."

One of the nicest people in the game, he now seems set to stay awhile.

Everything about the game of Chris Perry seems to get better each season. Last year, a tie for second place in the Canon Greater Hartford Open and tie for fifth place the next week in the Anheuser-Busch Classic led to the most rewarding year of his career.

There was a time when Chris had to make a very big decision. As a strong-armed righthander, he compiled a 9-0 pitching record as a ninth grader with a 0.91 earned run average and he also carried a healthy .325 batting average.

But, he also loved to play golf.

"My dad never said I had to follow him," Chris remembers, "but he did say things are so specialized in sports today that I would have to make a decision. I couldn't do everything."

His dad, Jim Perry, knew something about such things. He was an outstanding pitcher for many years in the major leagues, starring for Cleveland, Minnesota, Detroit and finally with Oakland.

"By the time I was 13-or-14-years old," Chris adds, "I knew I wanted to play professional golf. In Minnesota (his dad pitched for the Twins for 10 years), you play golf and baseball for six months and skate for six months." And skate he did. High school ice hockey is a big, big sport there and Chris was captain of his team his senior year. "I played hockey for eight-or-nine years as a defenseman," he said.

When it was time to move on to college, he selected Ohio State University "because of its great tradition. Being from the north, I didn't want to go south and play golf 12 months of the year. As soon as I saw Ohio State, I fell in love with everything about it."

The feeling was mutual. Chris went on to win 14 collegiate events, shattering the "victory" record of Jack Nicklaus. He was a first-team All-America choice for three years.

After he was graduated in 1984, he made his first attempt at the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall and he made it easily.

He prefers to play the ball from right to left, "but I like to work it both ways. My iron game improved a lot during the year."

Oh, yes, his dad played a major role in his development as a young player. "We'd go to spring training with him and play the courses in Florida. He's still a good player and carries about a 4 handicap now, but I sure wouldn't give him two strokes a side."

Kenny Perry has improved his money winnings each year on TOUR and as the figures indicate, his game has continued to improve as well.

During the last two years, he has had a second-place finish. He started with rounds of 65 and 67 in the 1989 MCI Heritage Classic and wound up in second place to Payne Stewart.

Last year, he started slowly in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and gained momentum as the week went along to finish second to Mark O'Meara. His check for \$108,000 was the largest one-week payday of his career.

Kenny looks back to the 1987 Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational as the tournament that started him on the road to success.

"It was a turning point," he said of his tie for fourth place. "I was tied for the lead after three rounds (with Hai Sutton, Ken Brown and Dan Pohl). I played in the last group on Sunday and I shot a 69. It gave me a lot of confidence."

Paul Azinger had a final round of 64 and won the tournament, while Sutton finished second, Curtis Strange third and Kenny tied with Brown for fourth place. He earned \$55,000.

"I had to learn how to play in front of so many people," he went on. "It's hard to concentrate, but I learned how to go out and play my own game and not think about them. It isn't easy."

Kenny started to play golf when he was seven under the encouragement of his father. "Dad used to be a scratch golfer and he still is my biggest fan," Kenny said.

His first competition came when he was 11 and he went on to have a fine high school career -- he won the 1978 Kentucky State High School Championship -- and also played well while at Western Kentucky University.

Norman Head of Bowling Green, KY, who now is retired, has been Kenny's teacher since he was a freshman in college. "I really believe in his theories and owe a lot of my success to him.

"He stressed ball striking more than chipping and putting but he never lets you forget you have to work on all aspects of the game."

Kenny tried the TOUR Qualifying Tournament three times before he made it in the Fall of 1986.

Peter Persons wasn't even thinking about winning when he arrived at the Valleybrook Golf and Country Club for the 1990 Chattanooga Classic.

He had been enjoying a good first year on the PGA TOUR and this personable fellow out of the University of Georgia was only looking to solidify his position on the money list and assure himself of exempt status for 1991.

This turned out to be the week when he did it all. His play was exceptional as he set a tournament record of 20-under-par 260 and won by two strokes over Richard Zokol. He did so on rounds of 64-64-65-67 over the 6,641-yard course.

He gained the lead after the second round with a 12-under-par 128 and did comment later, "there is no way I'm going to win this golf tournament. I'm not even thinking about it."

When it was all over, however, he stated, "I didn't know if I had it in me to win a tournament." His best finish prior to that afternoon was a tie for sixth place in the Hawaiian Open.

Make no mistake about it. Peter Persons has all the tools to be very successful on the TOUR and a personality that makes him a popular individual.

"No question, those were the four best days I've ever had," he said. He chipped in five times and finished with 17 birdies and three eagles, plus three bogeys.

The victory served as a reward for his perseverance. He didn't make it through the Qualifying Tournament until his fourth attempt in the Fall of 1989.

One year after failing to make it - in 1987 - he played on the European Tour.

Peter started to play at about age five with the help of his father and two brothers. The family lived on the Idle Hour Golf and Country Club in Macon, GA, and Peter played every time he had the opportunity.

By the time he was 15, he knew golf would be his game. Shortly afterwards, he won the Georgia State Junior Championship. He went on to be successful at the collegiate level, winning five times for the Bulldogs and winning the 1985 Southeastern Conference title. He was the runner-up in the U.S. Amateur that year. And, he won the 1985 Georgia State Open as an amateur.

He has worked with Dr. Bob Rotella, the noted sports psychologist, in recent years, but he also pays tribute to the three people who helped him the most. Davis Love Jr. and Jimmy Hodges of Sea Island, GA. They were killed in a plane crash in the fall of 1988. Now Scott Davenport of Sea Island lends his support when needed.

Dan Pohl had been suffering with back problems for a couple of years and, finally, on October 2, 1989, he had to undergo surgery. As a result, he did not play in any official events in 1990.

Fortunately, his exempt status remains intact. He won twice in 1986 and one of the victories was the NEC World Series of Golf. With it, he earned a 10-year exemption to all TOUR co-sponsored events.

He also won the Colonial National Invitational Tournament in 1986.

The next year, 1987, he made Uncle Sam's Ryder Cup team and also won the prestigious Vardon Trophy for low stroke average - (70.25). He earned a career high of \$465,269 and also won the first All-Around stats title, indicative of the strength of his overall game.

"To have had a good year (1986) and come back with another one is very satisfying," said Pohl. "The Ryder Cup selection was a real honor; anytime you represent your country and your fellow players, it's a real thrill."

As for his length off the tee, Dan was the TOUR leader the first two years such statistics were kept. In his best year, he averaged 280.1 in 1981.

Although he started in the game at age five, baseball and basketball were his first loves.

He earned his TOUR card on his second attempt, in June of 1978, but the following 12 months profited him only \$1,047. He went back to the school in June of 1979 and regained his playing privileges.

With new vigor, he attempted to qualify for the Canadian Open and Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, but could gain only alternate status. He didn't get in either one.

The next week, he qualified for the Western Open, and suddenly, he was in the spotlight. With three holes to play on Sunday afternoon at the Butler National Golf Club, Dan Pohl was in the lead.

"I had played solid all day," he said, "but you can't believe how pumped up I was. I thought I was putting good swings on it, but the ball started to act like it was shot out of a cannon. I hit every approach shot over the green on the last three, and bogeyed each one of them."

He tied for third, only one stroke out of the Larry Nelson-Ben Crenshaw playoff, won by Nelson. Nevertheless, he won \$17,400, and he was here to stay.

Don Pooley had been waiting for a year such as 1987 to come along. It easily was his best season on TOUR with the victory in the Memorial Tournament serving as the highlight.

"It was my best year in a lot of ways," he said. "It was pleasing because I played well when I was in contention."

He also will be remembered for his \$1-million hole-in-one at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. The \$1-million was offered as a prize for an ace on the 17th hole during the final round.

Pooley used a 4-iron for the 192-yard shot and the ball hit the flagstick about two feet above the cup and dropped straight down. The Arnold Palmer Children's Hospital in Orlando received \$500,000. Don gets the other half -- in monthly installments of \$2,083.33 for the next 20 years.

The Memorial has become a good tournament for him. Last year he tied for third at Muirfield Village and followed with a top 10 finish in the BellSouth Atlanta Classic. In August, he tied for eighth place in the PGA Championship.

In 1985, he won the coveted Vardon Trophy with a 70.36 scoring average for 97 rounds.

The Don Pooley story is an interesting one. It shows what a person can do who is willing to work at his profession and, as he says, also have a faithful God.

After suffering through a miserable year in 1979, winning only \$6,932 due mainly to muscle spasms in his back and tendinitis in his left hand, he rebounded with a \$157,973 year in 1980. The improvement of \$151,041 was the biggest jump on TOUR that year.

His first victory came at the B.C. Open in 1980. He was tied with Lee Trevino at 10-under par 203 after three, and his closing 68 gave him a one-stroke margin over Peter Jacobsen, while Trevino slipped into a tie for third.

Don says he has been playing golf for as long as he can remember. He received his first set of clubs on his seventh birthday.

He improved at each level of competition, and was the No. 1 man on his Riverside High School team and then played No. 1 on the University of Arizona team.

He played the mini-tours for a while after college, and it wasn't until his third attempt at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975, that he obtained his card.

Although Nick Price was born in South Africa, he moved to Zimbabwe - formerly Rhodesia - at a very early age with his family and it was there that his career in golf started.

Since both of his parents are British citizens, he carries a British passport but for several years, Nick has made the United States his home. This is where he play almost all of his tournament golf and he has done so exceptionally well.

He joined the PGA TOUR for the start of the 1983 season and it turned out to be a big year for him. He qualified for the World Series of Golf as the leader on the Order of Merit for the South African tour that year and he played brilliantly to win by four strokes over Jack Nicklaus at Firestone Country Club.

The victory gave him a 10-year exemption to PGA TOUR co-sponsored events. He continued to play well through the next two years, but starting in 1986, he made the big leap up the money list and has remained among the game's best since then. In the third round of the 1986 Masters Tournament, he shot a course record 63 and eventually finished tied for fifth place.

He had back-to-back second place finishes in late May last year - to Ben Crenshaw in the Southwestern Bell Colonial and to Wayne Levi in the BellSouth Atlanta Classic.

Two of his biggest disappointments over the years have come in the British Open. At Royal Troon in 1982, he led by three strokes with six holes to play but dropped four shots on the way to the clubhouse, permitting Tom Watson to slip in and gain the victory.

Nick led by two strokes after three rounds at Royal Lytham in 1988, but Seve Ballesteros shot a brilliant 65 at him the last day to edge him. A superb shotmaker, he has shown the ability to post really low numbers on occasions, but every year he is among the leaders in scoring average.

Nick started in the game as an eight-year old caddy for his brother in Zimbabwe. He progressed rapidly as a player, and by the time he was 17, he had an invitation to compete in the Junior World tournament at Torrey Pines in LaJolla, CA. "Everyone said I should go," he recalls, "so my mother and brother paid my way. They figured that if I didn't do well, I would get competitive golf out of my system." He fooled them. He not only played well, but he won.

He played on the South Africa and the European Tour as an amateur in 1975, and then went into the Rhodesian Air Force for the next two years.

Tom Purtzer will tell you that no matter what else he accomplishes in the game, it isn't likely to give the satisfaction he experienced when he won the 1984 Phoenix Open although his triumph in the 1988 Gatlin Brothers-Southwest Classic might come close.

He has spent most of his life in the Phoenix area and through the final round at the Phoenix Country Club, there wasn't any doubt about who most of the thousands in the gallery wanted to win.

He won in rather spectacular fashion, too. On the par 5 18th hole, he put his second shot into a bunker on the right, but he played a brilliant explosion shot. The ball stopped about two feet from the cup. He made the putt for a birdie and a one-stroke victory over Corey Pavin.

It gave Tom a 6-under-par 65 for the sunny afternoon and a total of 16-under-par 268.

Tom was four strokes behind entering the last round of the Southwest at Abilene, TX. His 8-under-par 64 -- with an eagle at the last hole for 19-under-par 269 gave him the lead. Along came Mark Brooks with an eagle at the 18th on a putt of 50 feet to tie him.

On the first extra hole, Tom won it all with a par.

Over the years, some of his finest performances have been on the more difficult courses. His first victory was at Riviera, for example, in the 1977 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

His two best weeks of 1990 came in the spring. He tied for fifth in the Doral Ryder Open and then tied for third in THE PLAYERS Championship.

Tom got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball when we were eight or nine. (Paul is Director of Golf at the plush Gainey Ranch in Scottsdale, AZ, and a former TOUR player).

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball. I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

Mike Reid found it difficult to express his feelings after the 1988 NEC World Series of Golf. And, for good reason. He had just won the coveted title by defeating Tom Watson in a playoff.

Reid and Watson tied at 5-under-par 275 and on the first extra hole, Mike made his par while Tom bogeyed.

It truly was the culmination of many years of hard work and dedication. The victory - the second of his career - gave him a 10-year exemption to all TOUR co-sponsored events.

There also were tears in Mike's eyes as he proudly accepted the winner's check in the Seiko-Tucson Open in the fall of 1987.

Mike has been one of the TOUR's more consistent players for many years but as good as he was, he could not break through and win. So, as his 11th season was coming to a close, he played brilliantly and won by four strokes.

It was another good year for Mike in 1989 even though a big one got away on the final holes. He played marvelously through three rounds of the PGA Championship and led by three strokes going into the final afternoon after rounds of 66, 67 and 70 for 13-under -par 203. He still was leading with three holes to play but water at the 16th and a balky putter at 17 were costly and he tied for second behind Payne Stewart.

Mike's father was a Colonel in the Air Force when he retired, but during his growing-up days, Mike was in many different cities. At an early age, he realized golf was a game he could play alone, and it was a game that gave him something in common with others no matter where they lived.

His older brother, Bill, General Manager of the TPC at Sawgrass and has assisted Mike with his game over the years. The John Geerstens of Pebble Beach, Senior and Junior, have worked closely with Mike.

Mike went to Brigham Young University, and was a teammate of Jim Nelford, John Fought and Pat McGowan. The first time he attempted to get his TOUR card, he made it, in the Fall of 1976. He progressed up the ladder the next three years, and his closest bout with victory was in the 1978

Larry Rinker started to play the game at the age of six when his brother, Laine, began taking him to junior golf clinics. Larry played in his first Florida State Junior tournament at the age of 12 and continued to play through high school and at the University of Florida.

While playing for the Gators, he won the 1978 Southeastern Conference championship and, upon graduation, was presented the Doug Beldon Award for athletic/academic excellence.

While playing on the mini-tours, he won 10 tournaments including six in 1980 and was voted the "player-of-the-year" by Florida Golf Week magazine.

Larry's first national exposure came at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open Championship. He was in the final twosome of the third round and, after 40 holes, was tied for the lead. He eventually tied for 15th place.

Larry came into his own in 1984 after finishing second in the USF&G Classic in New Orleans. He finished 60th on the money list as he earned \$116,494.

He enjoyed a tremendous year in 1985. During the first three months, he had won more money than he had in any other single season. He earned big checks when he tied for second place in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and was third by himself in the Tournament Players Championship.

In 1985, Larry led the TOUR in eagles with 14. He also joined with his sister, Laurie Rinker, to win the JCPenney Mixed Team Championship.

He has won well over \$100,000 in each of his last three seasons to retain his exempt status.

He indicated that he is trying to develop outside interests. He would like to continue developing his role as an entertainer, singing and playing the guitar. He has played at a few TOUR events the last few years.

He also believes that getting married will help him focus in on his priorities and lead to better play.

The Rinkers have quite a golfing family. His brother Lee played on the TOUR in 1984. His sister, Laurie, is a winner on the LPGA Tour. Kelli, who is the wife of Larry's brother, Laine, also has played on the Ladies' Tour.

"We work with each other," he said. "We trade ideas and pull for each other."

It took Loren Roberts a few years to find his place on the PGA TOUR, but once he got the feel of it in 1988, he became a solid contender.

His successes have pleased his peers because they know how long and hard he has worked to perfect his skills. In each of the last three years, he has set personal highs on the money list and now there doesn't appear to be any limit to what he might accomplish.

His best effort last year was a tie for third place in the Centel Western Open after a 65 start. In four of his next five starts, he finished seventh or better.

The soft-spoken Californian who played for six seasons with limited success, said, "It was just a matter of making a few changes and having the experience to count on when things were tough."

One of the changes involved his putting.

"I changed from a blade putter to a mallet," he said, "and I added two-and-a-half inches to the shaft so I would be more upright. And, with the heavier putter, I started to see immediate results."

There was more. "I used to be a stiff-wristed and shoulder putter, but I switched at the start of 1988 to more hand action. It gave me more feel."

In his second start of 1988, he tied for sixth place in the Hawaiian Open, although he collected bigger checks later in the summer with top 10 finishes in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic and the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis.

Interestingly enough, in 1984 when he earned exempt status for the first time, his two best efforts were at Westchester and Memphis.

Loren didn't start to play the game seriously until he was about 16-years old. He played a lot of tennis and baseball in high school in San Luis Obispo, CA, but the golf coach convinced him to concentrate on golf.

He worked for a while as an assistant pro at the San Luis Obispo Country Club. He said, "I didn't really set out to be a professional; it just sort of happened."

Through the years, his best finish on the TOUR was a third place in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open in 1985. He opened with a 65 at Torrey Pines, added three more rounds in the 60s and finished alone in third place, just one stroke out of the Woody Blackburn-Ron Streck playoff.

He has worked hard to reach this level and he gives considerable credit to Jim Swagerty, who was a head professional in the Los Angeles area for many years, but now is retired and living in San Diego.

Through most of his golfing career, enthusiasm for the game was one of the strong points for Bill Rogers. No one in the game seemed to be having more fun than Bill.

While winning the 1981 World Series of Golf gave him a 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events, the spark that was present earlier in his career has diminished. He rarely plays on TOUR anymore.

His last victory was in the 1983 USF&G Classic in New Orleans. "I had a very positive attitude," he said. "It was never the same after that."

Even in his fondest dreams, it would have been difficult for Bill to picture himself having a year such as 1981 and being named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

Winner of the World Series of Golf, the Heritage Classic and the Texas Open on TOUR, plus the British Open, Japan's Suntory Open and New South Wales Open in Australia; Rogers was dazzling once he got his act together starting with the Tournament Players Championship.

The year had a strange beginning. He was seventh in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Then his game nearly fell apart. He missed cuts in five of his next six starts. He only tied for 51st in the TPC, but it was there, at Sawgrass, that he could see his game taking shape again. Indeed it did, because he won the Heritage Classic the next week.

Bill started to play at age nine in Montgomery, Ala. The family moved to Texarkana, TX, shortly after that and Bill began to play competitive golf by the time he was 13. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at Northridge Country Club in Texarkana, who taught him the fine points of the game.

While attending the University of Houston, he was a roommate of Bruce Lietzke and the latter nicknamed him the "Panther." As Bill recalls, "I was the jumpy type. I never wanted to miss anything.

Bill's father was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from age six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa.

When Bill Sander joined the PGA TOUR in the Spring of 1978, he thought "here we go. This is going to be fun."

He had won the U. S. Amateur Championship the summer before at Bel-Air Country Club in Los Angeles. At age 19, he was one of the youngest in modern times to do so. The next year, he played on the Walker Cup and World Amateur Cup teams.

He did miss in his first attempt to obtain his TOUR card in the Fall of 1977 but made it easily the next Spring.

"My first tournament," he recalls vividly, "was the Western Open. I played beautifully and on the last day, I was paired with Andy Bean. Andy won the tournament and I won a nice check. I thought it was great.

"The next week in Milwaukee, I played well again and was one-under par after 36 holes but I was shocked to discover I had missed the cut. The next week, I shot a 69 in the Monday qualifier for the Quad Cities Open and didn't make it.

"That's when I said to myself, 'Welcome to the TOUR'.

The years that followed were not too kind to Bill. It wasn't until 1985 when he tied for fourth in the Canadian Open and tied for seventh in the St. Jude-Memphis Classic that he finally broke through and earned exempt status.

He had his "best-ever" finish in the 1988 Los Angeles Open. He started the week with a 70, and then added marvelous rounds of 69, 66 and 66 to tie for second place behind Chip Beck.

He enjoyed his most profitable year in 1990 and the main reason was because he turned his consistency level up a few notches. He started the season on a bright note with a final-round 65 boosting him into a tie for fourth place at the Northern Telecom Tucson Open.

Bill started to play at age 13 when he was caddying at Inglewood Country Club in Seattle. He won three straight Seattle City Amateur titles, the first as a 17-year old.

During his early years, Billy Derrickson, who was the head pro at Inglewood, helped him the most. When he came on TOUR, he started to listen to suggestions from everyone. It took him awhile to realize he had to play his own game.

When everything is going right, he prefers to play right to left. Iron play, plus chipping and putting, are the strongest parts of his game.

Maybe Gene Sauers was off to a rather slow start through the first two years of his PGA TOUR career, but once he gained the confidence he needed, he became one of the finest young players in the game.

He has improved his money winnings each year since his inaugural season in 1984, but the big push to the top started when he won the Bank of Boston in a playoff over Blaine McCallister.

Since then, his star has continued to climb. He won for the second time in February of 1989 at the Hawaiian Open. Although the weatherman played a part - the tournament was called official after 54 holes due to excessive rain - Gene would have been difficult to catch no matter what the weather.

He had rounds of 65 the first-and-third days with a 67 in between for a total of 19-under par 197. He obviously enjoys Waialae Country Club in Honolulu. In 1988, he had three solid rounds in the 60s to finish fourth.

Last year, since he was not in the Masters Tournament field, he slipped over to Hattiesburg, MS, and won the Deposit Guaranty Golf Classic. It's not an official victory but the \$54,000 he won is official.

Every player has had a tournament get away from them, but Gene remembers the one in his own backyard in 1987. He has lived all of his life in Savannah, GA, and on nearby Hilton Head Island in the MCI Heritage Classic, he was tied for the lead going into the final round. A third-day 64 put him in that position, but a 73 the last afternoon dropped him into a tie for third place.

Gene went through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1983. He was the youngest player on the circuit when he started in 1984, but during the early weeks of the season, he didn't get into many tournaments.

Once the three-time Georgia State Open champion got his chance to play consistently towards the end of the season, he made the most of his chances.

The 1985 season started out in similar fashion. In mid-season, though, Sauers got his chance to play regularly and he capitalized on it. He went on to finish among the top 125 money winners, a position he would not relinquish.

Gene started in the game at age nine when he would tag along with his father and brother out to the golf course on the weekends.

"They'd bring along an extra club and I'd hit it around," Sauers recalls. "My brother was a good golfer (played at Columbus College) and I'd go out to practice with him and beat balls around."

Ted Schulz wrote one of the better success stories on the PGA TOUR in 1989. He went from winning only \$17,838 in 1987, to being off the TOUR in 1988 to an impressive \$391,855 in 1989.

He made the season a total success by winning the Southern Open by one stroke over Tim Simpson and Jay Haas. He had three rounds of 66 and another of 68 at the Green Island Country Club for his total of 14-under-par 266.

Throughout his golfing career, Ted has had to learn the meaning of patience. He'll be the first to tell you he never won much of anything in the game--except the 1983 Kentucky State Amateur and a pair of Kentucky State Opens, 1984 and 1988.

A typical youngster, Ted played all sports but when he was about 15-years old he decided that "golf really was a major league sport." He worked in his father's grocery store in Louisville, KY and played in junior tournaments whenever the opportunity presented itself.

He went on to the University of Louisville but, as he said, "I only played one year fulltime."

He turned professional in the fall of 1983 and had thoughts of the TOUR, but he knew he wasn't ready. The winter season of 1984, he ran the driving range for Bill Ogden at Bermuda Dunes in the Palm Springs area.

Finally, in the fall of 1986, he made it through the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament but in his rookie season of 1987, he only made \$17,838 in 29 starts.

He headed for the Asian Tour in 1988 and he says that may be the place where he started to fill in the missing pieces. "You had to be tough," he said, "you learn a lot of patience; how to make cuts; playing in really adverse conditions on bad courses."

He went back to the Q-Tournament in the fall of 1988 with a new approach.

"I knew I had to get it (TOUR card)," he said, "and then keep it. Otherwise, I'd have to go back to one of those foreign tours. That's incentive and pressure. And, it's scary." He finished 25th and then started to make plans for 1989.

Immediately, he found success. He tied for 14th in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic - his first start - and earned \$17,500. The next week in the Phoenix Open, a first round 64 led to a tie for seventh place and another \$21,088.

His consistent play continued. In mid-summer, he tasted victory as he shared the Jerry Ford Invitational (non-TOUR) title with Donnie Hammond.

A few weeks later, he tied for ninth in the Chattanooga Classic and then tied for third the next week in the Greater Milwaukee Open. Those events served as the impetus for his march to victory in the Southern Open.

"It's always been the dream of my life to be able to say I've won on the PGA TOUR. Now that I've done it, I can't describe the feeling."

Tom Sieckmann was one happy fellow after he won the 1988 Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic in a playoff over Mark Wiebe at the Kingsmill Golf Club.

Wiebe, who won the same title in 1985, masked his own disappointment with kind words for his friend.

"Tom is really a fine player," he said. "He's been grinding it out, paying his dues, paying a LOT of dues. I'm sorry for me but I'm really happy for him."

The victory was rather unexpected. Everyone knew Tom had the skills to win, but prior to the Anheuser-Busch Classic, he had won money in only three of 16 events.

He stayed close to the lead through the first two rounds at Kingsmill and then was tied with Peter Jacobsen and Kenny Knox after three at 12-under-par 201. While Jacobsen and Knox faltered slightly, Wiebe took the lead midway through the incoming nine with a birdie at the 13th to go 14-under-par. He finished at that figure.

Sieckmann birdied the 13th to go 14-under, but bogeyed the 15th to drop a shot off the pace. He came back with a birdie at the 17th and eventually tied at 14-under-par 270.

Tom and Mark both parred the first extra hole and then Tom won it on the next by making a par from the left fringe while Wiebe missed the green, chipped long and two putted for bogey.

Tom set the table early last year for another good season with back-to-back top 10 finishes in the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open (he had a second-day 64) and the Nissan Los Angeles Open (all four rounds in the 60s). He also tied for eighth place in the U.S. Open at Medinah.

He was a basketball player as a youngster, but as the years moved along, he knew golf would be his game. He started at the University of Nebraska, but later transferred to Oklahoma State University.

Mike Holder, the Cowboys' golf coach, said, "Bob Tway and Willie Wood were our best players in those days but Tom was with them and they formed one of the best teams I've ever had."

He had his problems trying to get on the PGA TOUR, but whenever he went elsewhere to look for a game, he found success. He won several times overseas and 1981 was the banner year when he won three times--the Philippine Open, Thailand Open and the Brazilian Open.

He finally made it onto the TOUR in a rather impressive fashion. He tied for second in the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984. He earned \$30,052 for his first year in 1985 and unfortunately finished 143rd on the money list.

He went back to the Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1985 in an effort to improve his position on the priority list. He did that as he earned medalist honors.

If there ever was a reward for perseverance, surely Tony Sills would be a prime candidate. He attempted to qualify for the PGA TOUR six times before he made it at the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass in the fall of 1982. Twice, he remembers vividly, he missed in the finals by two shots. "That just told me that I wasn't ready," he says.

"All through those years," he continued, "I was living a dream. Playing on the TOUR was something I knew I was going to do. Now I know dreams do come true."

Another dream came true last year when he won the Independent Insurance Agent Open in a playoff over Gil Morgan at the TPC at The Woodlands in Texas.

Sills birdied four of the last five holes on his way to a 7-under-par 65 to force the playoff.

"After the 13th hole I really didn't think I was in the tournament," said Sills. "I was making birdies, so I figured everyone else would."

"It's unusual to win at 12-under when the leaders start off at 11-under."

It was also unusual when his 4-iron approach shot skipped off the water and over the wood pilings on the seventh hole enabling him to save par.

"My thoughts haven't been on winning but on finishing strong," Sills said after his round. "Winning just happens, you can't force it."

Unfortunately, he was not able to enjoy the victory. A month after leaving The Woodlands, he was lifting luggage at the GTE Byron Nelson Classic and injured his right elbow. He was off the TOUR for the next 3 1/2 months and it still wasn't completely right when he returned for the NEC World Series of Golf.

His first exposure to the game was as a five-year old. "My father started to play for health reasons. The doctor encouraged him because of the exercise he needed, so I started to follow him around."

During those years when he was attempting to get on the TOUR, he said, "I had a lot of different jobs. I stayed at home with my parents to keep expenses down, but I did everything from delivering pizzas to grinding clubs in Jerry Barber's golf factory."

"I even worked for a beer distributor, but my best job was at the Los Angeles Country Club. I worked part-time on the driving range, so that I could have a half day to practice. During those years, I lived on practically nothing money wise. I was determined to see this thing through.

He has had to overcome serious physical problems even to play the game, so serious in fact, that many others would have turned and gone in another direction.

Scott Simpson has been a strong, steady player for many years so it wasn't surprising to those who follow the game that he could win the grandest prize of them all--the U.S. Open Championship.

He did it in 1987 at the Olympic Club in San Francisco, winning by one stroke over Tom Watson. He did it with a brilliant final nine holes as he registered three birdies and saved par on three other occasions with splendid recovery shots.

His birdies came in succession, starting at the 14th hole where he hit a 7-iron to four feet and made the putt. Then he made putts of 30 feet at the 15th and 15 feet at the 16th. He finished the day with a 2-under-par 68 and a total of 3-under-par 277.

"I feel overwhelmed that I could win a tournament such as the U.S. Open," he said. "This totally is a dream come true for me."

Earlier in the year, he braved the wind and cold to win the Greater Greensboro Open. By season's end, he had earned \$621,032 and was ranked fourth.

Scott earned the fifth victory of his TOUR career the hard way at the BellSouth Atlanta Classic in 1989. He was four strokes off the third round lead. And, so was Bob Tway. They both shot 68s the last day to tie at 10-under-par 278 and then Scott won the playoff with a par on the first extra hole.

Scott had an excellent amateur record, winning the National Collegiate titles in 1976 and 1977 for the University of Southern California. "It was after I won it the first time that I thought I would make a career in golf, and someday turn professional. I felt if I could win over a field such as that, then maybe I had a chance."

He also won two PAC-8 titles for the Trojans and was a member of Uncle Sam's Walker Cup team in 1977. He seemed to be a sure thing.

Yet, he met the disappointment that so many young players have had to face, twice failing to make it through the TOUR's tough Qualifying School. He finally made it the third time, in the fall of 1978.

Tim Simpson is one of the better ball-strikers in the game and two years ago his putting improved to the point that he became one of the leading players on the TOUR.

He won twice in 1989. The first came in late March in the USF&G Classic in New Orleans as he held off the challenges of Greg Norman and Hal Sutton. Late in the season, he won the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic by a stroke over Donnie Hammond.

Tim played well the other weeks as well. He lost the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic in a playoff to Mike Donald and tied for second in the Southern Open just a stroke behind Ted Schulz. He finished brilliantly at Green Island, shooting 65-63.

Incidentally, the Southern has been a good event for him. He won the title in 1985 for his first TOUR victory and was second in 1987 as well.

Last year at the Doral Ryder Open, Tim was seven strokes off the pace after two rounds and then he blitzed the Blue Monster course with a pair of 6-under-par 66s. It put him in a playoff with Greg Norman, Paul Azinger, and Mark Calcavecchia. Norman chipped in for an eagle on the first extra hole to win the title.

His consistency level continued to improve last year and his strong play netted him a position on the PGA TOUR's team for the Asahi Glass Four Tours World Championship of Golf competition in Japan last November.

A keen student of psychology, he has been working with Dr. Bob Rotella, the sports psychologist. It was Rotella who told him, "from my observations and from what I've heard from others, the one missing link in your game is your putting." He stressed the need for Tim to relax more.

Tim's father, Jack, started him in the game as a seven-year old and he went on to win junior championships of Atlanta and Georgia. "I owe a lot to my father," he said. "He worked hard so I could afford to play and he has always stood behind me. He has been the guiding force in my life."

Another who helped to mold his game is Art Kraft Jr., the pro at the Ansley Country Club in Atlanta. "I've been working with Art since I was 15-years old," Tim said.

There are three other people who have helped turn his career around - his wife, Kathy, son Christopher and daughter Katie. "They gave purpose to my life," he said.

Joey Sindelar is a player with incredible skills so it comes as no surprise when he puts together a season such as he had in 1988. He won twice - Honda Classic and The International - and accumulated \$813,732 to rank third on the money list.

As an example of how others assess his talents, he was the first player chosen in the Nabisco Team Charity draft for the 1989 campaign. He was tabbed by the folks at K mart Greater Greensboro Open.

So, it was something of a surprise when his game suffered in 1989 and he only had three top 10 finishes as compared to 10 the year before.

When he talks of his golf game and his goals, he always says, "we." He'll tell you, "We talked it over and decided ..." The other party in the "we" is his father, the man who first put a club in Joey's hands when he was six-years old.

"My Dad always stressed that if anything is worth doing, it's worth doing right. He's always been behind everything I've done."

He struggled early in the season of 1990, but then it came as no surprise when he won again. This time in the Hardee's Golf Classic. He shot a final round 66 with an eight-foot birdie putt on the final hole to tie Willie Wood and then he won the playoff with a par on the first extra hole.

Through high school, Joey knew that if he was going to go to college, it would have to be on a scholarship, so he worked extra hard on his golf game. There were offers, but he decided on Ohio State.

He was devastating for the Buckeyes. He won 10 collegiate events and in 1981, he won the Big Ten championship by 12 strokes. He was named Ohio State's Athlete-of-the-Year in 1981.

Along the way, he managed to sweep the New York State titles -- Junior, Amateur and Open championships.

The PGA TOUR was his goal, though, and he made it through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1983, finishing in a tie for third.

His first win came at the Greater Greensboro Open when he holed an eight-foot par-saving putt on the 72nd hole to win by one and then later in the year he won again at the B. C. Open edging Mike Reid for the title in front of his hometown fans. He also won the B.C. Open in 1987.

Jeff Sluman turned in one of the great finishing rounds in PGA Championship history and won going away in August of 1988.

He started the last day three strokes behind Paul Azinger and then proceeded to shoot a brilliant 6-under-par 65 to win by three strokes over Azinger. Jeff had two birdies and an eagle (holed a sand wedge shot from 115 yards) on the outgoing nine, and returned with three birdies and a lone bogey.

"I accomplished one of the things I've always wanted to do," he said, "and that was to win. And, to make my first one a major, well, that's very special to me."

He'll tell you the main reason for his successes in recent years is "practice, more than anything else and I'm probably a little sharper mentally."

His best effort a year ago was a tie for second place in the K mart Greater Greensboro Open, just two strokes behind Steve Elkington.

Jeff nearly had his first victory in the 1987 Tournament Players Championship, but he lost on the third extra hole of his playoff to Sandy Lyle.

When introduced to the game of golf at an early age, he had no goals or aspirations to be a professional golfer. Started in the game by his family at age four, Sluman didn't even think about turning pro until after his senior year at Florida State University. After a solid collegiate career that saw him win the Metro Conference title, Sluman opted for a career in golf.

Sluman turned professional in 1980 and in the fall of 1982 he earned his PGA TOUR card. However, he won only \$13,643 in 1983 and finished 171st on the money list and lost his playing privileges.

After sitting out the 1984 season, Sluman returned to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984 and regained his player's card.

Jeff won the 1985 Tallahassee Open when it was part of the Tournament Players Series, so it was unofficial. It also was special, however, since he had three rounds of 65 and won by a stroke over Gary Player and former FSU teammate Kenny Knox.

Mike Smith said, "It feels good to be playing golf back in the United States again," and after his performance last year, it looks as if he is here to stay a while.

After finishing 47th on the money list in 1985, a ruptured disc early in 1986 forced him off the TOUR. Unable to play here, he headed for the European Tour and played there in 1988 and 1989 with success.

He had second-place finishes both years - to Jose Maria Olazabal in the 1988 Belgian Open and to Colin Montgomerie in the 1989 Portuguese Open.

However, it wasn't where his heart was, and that's on the PGA TOUR. So, Mike went back to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1989 and made it.

His best finish last year was a tie for third place in the Bank of Boston Classic, just two strokes behind the winner, Morris Hatalasky. He also finished seventh in the USF&G Classic en route to his best money season.

"I'm really thrilled to be back here," he said midway through the year. "I accomplished what I wanted in Europe and that was to stay in the game and try to get better."

Mike's best-ever TOUR finish came in 1985 when he finished second in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational. He collected a check for \$102,600.

Mike started to play golf at age 12. "I was visiting my grandmother in the hospital in Selma (AL). When I was coming out, I saw a couple of friends of mine playing golf on the course across the street. So, I went over and asked if I could play along."

He was in his first competition as a 14-year old and went on to win the Alabama State Junior title twice. He also won the State Jaycee Junior title twice and also the Dixie Junior Championship.

Bob Burns, the head professional at Selma Country Club, has helped him the most through the years, but when he went to Brevard College in Florida for two years, Floyd Horgan, the coach there, and John Redman, worked on refining his game.

"After that, I went on the mini-tours," he said. "I tried to get my PGA TOUR card six-or-seven times, but didn't make it until the Spring of 1980."

During his early not-so-successful years on the TOUR, he said he spent too much time sight-seeing instead of paying attention to his game.

Although there were a lot of good young players on the Ben Hogan Tour, none made an impact faster than Mike Springer. The former University of Arizona star posted a two-stroke victory in the Bakersfield Open, the inaugural event on the Ben Hogan Tour.

Eleven players were within three strokes of the lead as Sunday's final round began. Atop the leaderboard was Springer, who had injured his hand earlier in the week when he hit 300 consecutive range balls during a practice session. Springer fired a one-under par 71, one of only eight sub-par rounds recorded on the bitterly cold day, and held off a late charge from Dave Tentis to win.

"Looking back, the fact that there will never be another first winner made that tournament special for me," said Springer. "I will always remember Bakersfield as the place that got me started."

After suffering a mid-season slump, Springer bounced back with a four-stroke victory in the Reno Open.

"I hit it good and didn't give the tournament away," he said. "I had been in contention several times since Bakersfield but just couldn't bring the round into the clubhouse." Three straight birdies on Northgate Golf Club's back nine were the turning point for Springer. An eagle 3 on the final hole tied the course record of seven-under par 65 and the \$20,000 first place check put him in a distant 10th place on the Ben Hogan Tour money list going into the final tournament of the season.

In the El Paso Open, Springer fired a final round 65 to post a dramatic two-shot victory and vault the Fresno, CA, resident into fourth place on the final money list and onto the 1991 Regular PGA TOUR.

"I was the last guy on the list with a chance to get my card," Springer said, "so I knew just what I had to do -- win. That was the one goal I had in mind. Nothing else was good enough. I began the final round trying to play one shot at a time and ended up hitting the grand slam."

It was a performance that would have made even the legendary Ben Hogan proud.

Whatever Craig Stadler accomplishes during the rest of his career, his followers will fondly remember 1982. It was the year he broke away from the field and went from being a good player to a superstar.

He won four times, starting the year by capturing the first tournament, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. He won two of the year's more significant events, the Masters Tournament in a playoff over Dan Pohl and the World Series of Golf in a playoff over Raymond Floyd. His other victory was in the Kemper Open by an impressive seven strokes.

He won the Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner, as he earned \$446,462. Until 1985, only Tom Watson and Mark O'Meara had won more in a single season.

He won the Byron Nelson Classic in 1984 and has been so close to winning a few more.

For example, in 1985 he played the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and Hawaiian Open in a combined 47-under par, yet he didn't win. He lost in a playoff to Lanny Wadkins in the Hope and was second to Mark O'Meara in Hawaii.

In 1987, he lost the Hawaiian Open again, this time in a playoff to Corey Pavin.

In 1988, he was third in the Masters and Kemper Open; and in 1989 was second in the Independent Insurance Agent Open and third in the Las Vegas Invitational.

The trend continued last year with several top 10 finishes and a financially-profitable year. Away from the TOUR, he shot a final-round 61 to win the Scandanavian Open in Sweden.

Before turning professional in 1975, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U. S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo.

He had given some thought to leaving the University of Southern California after that triumph, but changed his mind. He went on to be an All-America choice in 1974 and 1975 and was named to the 1975 Walker Cup team. He also has played on two Ryder Cup teams.

Payne Stewart has established himself as one of the outstanding players in the game - certainly the most colorful.

He has been a strong and steady player for several years but in 1989 he elevated himself to a new plateau with victories in the PGA Championship and the MCI Heritage Classic.

He also was second three times that season, losing once in a playoff to Tom Kite in the Nabisco Championships. He had 11 top 10 finishes and was No. 2 on the money list to Tom Kite with \$1,201,301.

Last year was another good one as he repeated as the victor in the MCI Heritage Classic and also won the GTE Byron Nelson Classic.

In the PGA at Kemper Lakes near Chicago, a first round 74 put him eight strokes out of the lead, but he came on strong with rounds of 66, 69 and 67 to win by a stroke.

Another special victory for Payne came in the 1987 Hertz Bay Hill Classic. He donated his entire check of \$108,000 to the Florida Hospital Golden Circle of Friends Home, "in memory of my father, William Louis Stewart, who died of cancer two years previous to the day."

Payne's golfing career progressed in an orderly fashion through junior programs, high school and finally to a golf scholarship at Southern Methodist University. While there, Payne won several collegiate events, including the 1979 co-championship of the Southwest Conference.

He played the Asian Tour in 1980 and 1981 and with victories in the 1981 Indian and Indonesian Opens under his belt, plus his marriage to Tracey Ferguson, an Australian girl he met while in Malaysia, Payne returned to the U.S. to attend the 1981 spring Q-School. He was successful.

Curtis Strange stands with the greats in the history of the game. His play has established him as one of the most feared competitors in the world.

Look at the record. He won the United States Open Championships in 1988 and 1989 to become the first since Ben Hogan (1950-1951) to win the coveted title in back-to-back years.

His victory in 1988 at The Country Club in Brookline, MA, was in a playoff over Nick Faldo, 71 to 75; and in 1989 he played brilliantly through the final holes at Oak Hills in Rochester, NY, to win again.

He has won 12 times on the PGA TOUR in the last six years and three times he won the Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner. In 1989, he became the first player in TOUR history to exceed \$1-million in official earnings in a single season. He won four times that year and collected \$1,147,644.

His biggest moneyday came in the 1988 Nabisco Championships at Pebble Beach. He birdied the second extra hole to defeat Tom Kite. It was worth \$360,000 plus the season-long bonus money of \$175,000.

Obviously, he was everyone's "player-of-the-year".

Curtis started to play at age seven, "and by the time I was eight, I was playing every day." His father was a golf professional and owned the White Sands Country Club in Virginia Beach, Va. He won the 1974 NCAA Championship while at Wake Forest.

Mike Sullivan knows of the importance to be patient on the golf course. He knows what it means to be patient in the clubhouse, as well.

His victory in the 1989 Independent Insurance Agent Open at The Woodlands near Houston came because he managed to stay calm both places.

Mike barely survived the cut after rounds of 76 and 71, but he hung in there and came back with a 4-under-par 68 for the third day. He was an early starter on Sunday but he was seven strokes behind the leader, Mike Donald.

The big, personable Sullivan caught fire on the TPC Course at The Woodlands and proceeded to roll in eight birdies before a bogey at the 18th gave him a 65 and an 8-under-par total of 280.

He really didn't think it would hold up - but it did, by a stroke over Craig Stadler. His 65 was three strokes better than anyone else that day.

Mike started on the TOUR in 1977 and his only other victory came in the 1980 Southern Open in Columbus, GA. The next year at the Southern, he shot a final-round 64 to tie J.C. Snead, but Snead won the playoff.

Another victory came his way in 1984 when he teamed with Don January to win the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Utah on the Senior PGA TOUR.

He has always had the talent to excel, but re-occurring back problems have kept him from reaching the high consistency level at which everyone knows he can play. As an example, of his skills, he shot a 7-under-par 28 for nine holes in the 1988 Texas Open.

Mike played a lot of golf with his father when he was a youngster. "He was a scratch amateur, and taught me everything in those days."

Living in Ocala, FL, his father took him to see the Florida Citrus Open in Orlando, and the old Greater Jacksonville Open. He went to the University of Florida briefly--and had Andy Bean for a roommate--but he wanted to play golf, and not go to school.

In the 1978 Buick Open, he tied with Jack Newton of Australia but lost the playoff.

Hal Sutton keeps searching for ways to get better but true to the mark of a great competitor, he says he isn't as good as he knows he can be and expects to be.

His first victory was in his rookie season of 1982. He won twice in 1983, added two more in 1985 and was a double winner again in 1986. During the "non-win" years, he knocked at the door constantly, but something always seemed to happen to keep him out.

Just like two years ago when he had two runner-up finishes and a very good year financially. He lost the Anheuser-Busch Classic in a playoff to Mike Donald and was runner-up to Tim Simpson in the USF&G Classic.

At the 1987 Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational, Hal was closing in on victory again, but Paul Azinger came roaring from out of the pack, made eagle at the final hole with a long, long putt, and won by a stroke over Hal. He also was second to Mike Reid in the Seiko-Tucson Open.

His greatest season had to be 1983. He won the Tournament Players Championship and the PGA Championship and went on to be the No. 1 money winner with \$426,668.

Although his father did not play the game, Hal said he always was the "moving force behind me." A friend of his father's sent him a set of clubs when he was 11, and that was the start. "I played some team sports, but it was discouraging because I never seemed to be on a good team. I decided I wanted to win or lose on my own ability and that's why I chose golf."

As a 12- and 13-year old, he would take his father's cart and "sometimes play 72 holes a day." He said he only had mediocre success until his junior year at Centenary College, although he did win the Louisiana State Junior title in 1974.

Hal won the 1980 U. S. Amateur at the Country Club of North Carolina. Also in 1980, he was named Golf Magazine College Player of the Year. At the time, there was talk that he might forever remain an amateur.

"I went to work for my Dad and would go as long as a month without playing at all," he said. "When I did try to play, I didn't have any feel. I had put so much into the game to that point, I felt it was senseless to give it all up. I could always go back into business, but in later years, I couldn't go back to the game at the level I wanted. So I decided to turn professional and go on TOUR."

There was never any doubt in Brian Tennyson's mind. He knew as a 12-year old that he wanted to play on the PGA TOUR.

It took him awhile to make it - four attempts in the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament - but he was successful in the fall of 1987. Now, Brian has established himself as one of the better young players in the game.

"Actually," he said with a smile, "I was a little disappointed with my first year, but I was also happy to achieve a couple of my goals. I wanted to win at least \$100,000 and that would let me keep my TOUR card.

The continued improvement through the last two seasons has been noteworthy. He made a big move last year on the strength of several impressive top 10 finishes. His first was a tie for second in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic after a 66-67-66 finish. A 66-66 finish gave him a tie for third at the B.C. Open.

Two years ago, he tied for second at the Hardee's Golf Classic.

He demonstrated his skills early in the season with four good rounds at the USF&G Classic and the next week he tied for fourth place in the Independent Insurance Agent Open in Houston.

Brian started to play golf at about the age of eight. The youngest of nine children, his mother and father were the first to put a club in his hands. An older brother, Roger, is a Class A PGA teaching professional.

Brian played through high school and he also lettered in soccer. He went to Ball State University and played for four more years, winning eight events and gaining All-American status. That's also where he met his wife, Jeanne.

He turned professional after graduation and tried three times to qualify for the TOUR with out success. In 1986, he only missed by a stroke.

So, he played where he could including 10 tournaments on the Asian Tour in 1987 and he won twice, the Indian Open and the Philippine Open.

He turns to Mike Adams, the Director of Golf at the Academy of Golf at the Hills of Lakeway in Austin, TX, when he needs help. "Without Mike's help," he said, "I'd probably be looking for another line of work. He made the big change in my game."

There were many memorable accomplishments on the PGA TOUR in 1986 and Doug Tewell's performance in the Los Angeles Open has to rank with the best of them.

Playing the great Riviera Country Club course, Doug shot rounds of 66 and 63 the last two days and won by seven strokes over Clarence Rose. He took the lead the third day when he birdied the first six holes and then set sail for the victory.

He saved his best until near the end in 1987. After taking a month off the TOUR, he went to the Pensacola Open. It was close until the final nine holes, then he ran away from the field and eventually won by four strokes.

He had a couple of good runs at the Buick Open title. In 1988 he closed with an 8-under-par 64 and finished in second place, two strokes behind Scott Verplank.

In 1989 he had an injury-filled year but he did recover in time to tie for second again at the Buick, just one stroke behind Leonard Thompson.

He said of 1989, "It was a frustrating year. I missed 12 of the first 16 events because of a back injury but with the help of the people at Centinela Hospital I was able to recuperate."

Last year, he tied for seventh place at the Buick Open but his best finish was a tie for third at the B.C. Open.

Doug said he "will remember forever" his first round in the 1985 PGA Championship at Cherry Hills Country Club. He shot a course record 64 and went on to a respectable tie for 12th place.

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won twice, in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in a playoff over Jerry Pate; and in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. In the latter event, he was 10-strokes behind after two rounds but closed brilliantly with 65-67 to win by one over Tom Kite.

Doug started to play golf at about age 12 and his first teacher was Labron Harris, Sr. at the Lakeside club in Stillwater, Okla.

After being graduated from Oklahoma State University, he worked as an assistant professional for two years and then moved on as head pro at the Pinetop Country Club in Pinetop, Ariz. During the off seasons, he worked at Camelback in Phoenix. In June, 1975, with his Class A PGA membership in hand, he joined the TOUR.

Leonard Thompson had tears in his eyes - and so did a lot of other people - as he stood by the 18th green at the 1989 Buick Open and realized he finally was a winner again.

It had been 12 years since he had enjoyed the sweet taste of victory and TOUR records indicate that it represented the longest anyone had ever gone between triumphs. He had to go back to the 1977 Pensacola when he rolled in a birdie putt of 50 feet on the final hole to edge a rookie by the name of Curtis Strange.

Leonard started on the TOUR in the fall of 1971 and his first victory came in the 1974 Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. It led to his first \$100,000-plus season.

He was the first round leader in the Buick at Warwick Hills Country Club after a first round of 65. A 71 the second day put him one stroke off the lead and a third round 69 left him three strokes behind Payne Stewart.

It was touch-and-go all afternoon with Stewart and Hal Sutton appearing as the main contenders. Sutton double bogeyed the 17th and Stewart bogeyed the 18th and when all was said and done, Leonard was the winner. His closing 4-under-par 68 gave him a 15-under-par total of 273 - and a check for \$180,000.

With a big grin, he said, "I didn't know they made checks that big with my name on it."

He returned last year and although not at the top of his game, he opened with a 6-under-par 66 and finally tied for seventh place.

In 1981, Leonard had a day to remember as he shot a course record 31-31--62 at Glen Abbey Golf Club in the Canadian Open. He only missed one green but still birdied as he chipped in from off the edge. He used the same golf ball for 18 holes and then presented it to the Royal Canadian Golf Association for its museum at Glen Abbey.

Prior to joining the TOUR, Leonard had sharpened his game at Wake Forest and was a teammate of such players as Lanny Wadkins and Joe Inman.

A native North Carolinian, one of the highlights of his career was the course record 7-under-par 29 on the back nine at Pinehurst No. 2, set in the 1977 Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

Jim Thorpe may be in the record book for a long time as the last player to win back-to-back match play championships.

He capped a brilliant 1985 season by defeating Jack Renner in the final of the Seiko-Tucson Match Play event and he followed with a repeat victory in Tucson in 1986 when he defeated Scott Simpson. Each victory was worth \$150,000.

Tucson returned to the stroke-play format in 1987 but Jim had to miss it. He underwent surgery on his left wrist/thumb on September 30. He also had to miss most of the 1988 season because of an injury.

The 1989 season then became something of a year to try and regain his competitive form. He was at his best at the Kemper Open where he tied for second.

He continued to improve last year and set the tone with a runner-up finish in the Phoenix Open, his second start of the year. He won more money in 1990 than he had in the three previous years combined.

Five years ago, Jim even went beyond his own dreams as he compiled an outstanding record. He won twice, in the Greater Milwaukee Open when he outdueled Jack Nicklaus down the stretch and then in Tucson.

He nearly won for a third time. In the Western Open, he came from behind the last afternoon to tie amateur Scott Verplank. Unfortunately for Jim, Verplank won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole.

He is the ninth of 12 children. He grew up in a large home off the second fairway at the Roxboro (NC) Golf Club where his father, Elvert, was the greens superintendent. He says with a laugh, "We used to go out after dark and hit shots by the back porch light."

Jim was quite a football player in high school and earned a scholarship to Morgan State. He was a running back, and a powerful one at that, but after a year, he abandoned the sport and then left school after two years to devote more time to golf.

"There were five boys in the family," Jim says, "and my father was the one who started me playing golf, but in those days, I would rather play football. My brother, Chuck, was the best golfer in the family."

Chuck was on the PGA TOUR in the early 1970s and it was Chuck who gave Jim some sound advice regarding the TOUR. "I couldn't hit my long irons very well, so one day Chuck said we should go to Pinehurst and he would help me with my game. We played and practiced and played some more. Finally, one day, Chuck said, 'You're ready.'"

Jim obtained his TOUR card in the Fall of 1975, but he only won \$2,000, so he went home again. In the Fall of 1978, he was back in the School, this time better prepared, and was co-medalist with John Fought in the Q-School. Early the next year, he let everyone know he was indeed ready, as he tied with Tom Watson for second place in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, two strokes behind Bruce Lietzke.

Bob Tway picked a good time to place a crown jewel on his 1990 season. He won the Las Vegas Invitational in a playoff over John Cook in October and collected \$234,000. Bob and John tied at 26-under-par 334 for the 90-hole event and then Bob won it with a par on the first extra hole.

It was a year to remember for Tway in 1986 when he displayed the skills necessary to let everyone know he will be one of the game's best for a long time.

He was the TOUR's leading winner with four victories. He highlighted the season by dramatically holing a bunker shot on the final hole to win the PGA Championship after a tense duel with Greg Norman.

He went on to be named the PGA Player-of-the-Year. He finished as the No. 2 money winner with \$652,780 and was only \$516 behind Norman. However, he added another \$500,000 to his account at the end of the season as the winner of the inaugural season-long Vantage Cup competition.

He broke through for the first time in the 1986 Shearson Lehman Brothers-Andy Williams Open. Due to weather, only 54 holes were played and Bob found himself tied with Bernhard Langer but he went on to win the playoff with a par on the second extra hole.

A second-round 63 set the stage for his triumph in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic. He finished with a 64 the in Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic and passed Hal Sutton.

In 1989, Bob came through with another victory, and an impressive one it was, too. He won the Memorial Tournament by two strokes over Fuzzy Zoeller with his last three rounds in the 60s.

During his years at Oklahoma State University, Bob earned All-American status three times. He won the 1981 Fred Haskins award as the college player-of-the-year. Working under the watchful eye of Mike Holder, the golf coach at OSU, his game matured rapidly.

Bob started to play golf at age five. "I'd follow my grandfather and father around the course," he said. He was "about seven" when he played in his first junior tournament.

The family moved to Marietta, GA, when he was a youngster and Bob played basketball during his first two years in high school. Golf was his game, though.

After being the 52nd and final qualifier at the 1988 Q-School, it didn't take long for Greg Twiggs to make an impact.

In mid-February Twiggs captured the first PGA TOUR victory of his career at the 1989 Shearson Lehman Hutton Open. The triumph came in Twiggs' hometown of San Diego on the Torrey Pines course on which he had played many previous rounds.

"I'm not thinking of things as easy because I'm from here," said Twiggs after his third round 64. "It's just more familiar."

Twiggs came back the next day and fired a 69 to win the tournament by three strokes over four other players. "It's almost a surprise," said Twiggs. "I tried not to think about anything, I just realized I was in the position to enjoy myself."

After going through Q-School five times, Twiggs' victory earned him a two year exemption along with some new found riches. In fact, his winner's check of \$126,000 was more than he had earned previously on the PGA TOUR.

"There is a lot of love in this game. People know how hard it is out here," Twiggs said following his popular victory.

Golf is not the only sport in which Twiggs has been successful. He was a member of the 1976 United States Junior World Hockey team and he also excelled in American Legion baseball.

While his road on the TOUR was somewhat rocky in the early stages, he did shoot the lowest score in the history of the old Tournament Players Series. He had a 62 in the 1982 Chattanooga Classic.

Still those memories will be hard pressed to beat the ones of the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open. "I have a lot of good memories on this course.

"The feeling coming down to the last hole, with all the people watching me about to win a golf tournament, was that I started to feel proud of myself," said Twiggs.

It was not a year of distinction, however, other than the victory. After finishing 43rd in the Masters Tournament, he missed the cut in 12 of his last 17 starts with his best finish in that stretch being a tie for 32nd in the NEC World Series of Golf.

Nevertheless, his \$154,302 placed him in 90th position and the victory gave him the winning feeling that he expects to carry him to more successes.

Howard Twitty struggled with a bad back for quite a while, but in mid-summer of last year, it started to feel better. It was evident from the results as he started to swing the clubs with his old authority.

A strong finish to the season assured him of exempt status once again among the leading money winners. For example, he started the Buick Southern Open with an 8-under-par 62 which included a 29 on the incoming side.

He knows, though, he may never again play the game as well as he did in a stretch of 3 tournaments in mid-summer of 1980. He went through 14 rounds with 13 of them being in the 60's and was 57-under-par.

One of those weeks ended in a victory, as he defeated Jim Simons on the sixth extra hole in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. In the others, he was second in the Greater Milwaukee Open, fifth in the Quad Cities Open, and, after the victory, he started 64-66 in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic but then the bubble burst.

Howard's first TOUR victory came the year before in the B. C. Open when he outplayed two close friends, Tom Purtzer and Doug Tewell on the 72nd hole. They were tied through 71, but Howard managed a par on the home hole and that gave him the victory.

One of the biggest men on the TOUR at six-feet-five, 210 pounds, he once was asked why he didn't concentrate on football. With a grin, he replied "I like to keep my blood in my body."

Twitty believes now that his ample physical proportions probably slowed his progress in golf at an early age. He started to play at age 10 but it wasn't until he was a senior in high school in Phoenix that his game started to develop.

"I was about 6'3" when I was a sophomore," he recalls, "and I was terrible. I guess I just needed time to catch up with my body. I didn't have the coordination that I needed."

As a sophomore and junior at Arizona State, Twitty really showed progress, however. He won the important Sunnehanna and Porter Cup amateur events and, when he was a senior, he finished right behind the co-champions of the NCAA championship, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite from the University of Texas.

Twitty turned pro in 1973 and made it through the PGA TOUR Qualifying School in June, 1975. That was the same year he also won the Thailand Open during a second trip to the Far East circuit.

When Kirk Triplett was going to college at the University of Nevada-Reno, his mind was set on a career in engineering. He even had a couple of jobs lined up.

However, he did enjoy playing golf and had experienced some success. "I decided that I should give it a try while I had a chance. I could always fall back on my engineering degree."

He played around the world, such as on the Australian, Asian and Canadian Tours in 1987, 1988 and 1989.

"I wouldn't trade the experience for anything," he said. "I learned so much, not only about golf but about life, about myself. I'll be telling stories until the day I die about Asia."

"It now makes the PGA TOUR look so much better and I can fully appreciate everything that goes on out here. The travelling always is a difficult part of the TOUR, but it is so easy as compared to elsewhere. We get spoiled."

He made it onto the TOUR in the fall of 1989, being successful in the Qualifying Tournament.

"I was fortunate," he said, "because I knew a few guys who had been on TOUR before. I would always ask them questions about what life was like, so I had some idea of what to expect."

"Then, there were eight-or-10 guys in the Q-School who were good friends, so we sort of travelled together, practiced together and had dinner together. It wasn't like being out here alone."

Kirk said he is amazed at how good the talent is on TOUR. "At Las Vegas, I was playing well (four rounds in the 60s) and the last day, I shot an even-par 72 and fell into a tie for 32nd place."

His first taste of success came early in the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open at Torrey Pines in LaJolla, CA. He tied for fourth and collected \$32,625.

His big breakthrough came in mid-summer. He started the Buick Classic with a 65 to take the first round lead. He fell back with a 74 the next day at the Westchester Country Club, but came back strong with rounds of 67 and 66 to finish alone in third place. It was worth \$68,000.

He followed with a tie for 13th at the Canon Greater Hartford Open and a tie for 12th at the Anheuser Busch Classic. He earned \$103,625 in those three tournaments.

At the Buick Classic, he said it was a big help to play with Craig Stadler the last afternoon. "I made a few putts and Craig was very encouraging to me all day. He was just super."

Kirk started to play at age 10. "The whole family took up the game at the same time in Pullman, Washington," he said.

There's hardly a year that goes by without a rags-to-riches TOUR story and the 1989 version was the Chattanooga Classic champion, Stan Utley.

Utley, who had played in only a handful of TOUR events since leaving the University of Missouri in 1984, gained a sponsor's exemption into the Chattanooga event on the strength of his victory the previous week in the Missouri Open. He took advantage of his opportunity by earning a one-shot victory worth \$90,000. More importantly, he also earned his TOUR card through 1991.

"It was the first sponsor exemption I'd ever gotten on TOUR and I was thrilled just to get one," said Utley. "Once I started playing, though, I knew I was on my game. Everything was set up for me to have a good week."

It was a good week, indeed. A third-round 64 left him five strokes out of the lead but close enough to think about winning. By the 16th hole of the last round, he was only one in back of Ray Stewart, the leader.

He birdied the 17th to pull even and then won it all with another birdie at the 18th, making a 12 footer after a fine 5-iron shot.

Last year, he improved on his winnings with a big boost coming from a sixth place finish in The International.

Utley had experienced success on the mini-tours winning several events including the Missouri Open in both 1988 and 1989 with record scores, but had suffered nothing but frustration at the PGA TOUR's annual Qualifying Tournament. He missed by a single shot of gaining his card in 1985 and advanced to the finals again in 1987 and 1988, but again missed earning his playing privileges.

"I knew I was making progress, though, I could see that I was getting better each year," said the native of Thayer, MO. "I was making money playing golf and I was close to getting my card every year."

A three-time All-Big Eight choice and two-time All-American for the Missouri Tigers, his early career highlights included a Missouri Junior title and the individual title at the BYU Cougar Classic where he set a tournament record. The top moment, however, came when his Missouri team topped Oklahoma State and Oklahoma to win the Big Eight title in 1984.

Stan began in the game at age nine learning from his father. He played other sports but realized at age 14 or 15 that golf was really his special ability although he dreamed of a pro basketball career.

Bobby Wadkins goes about his business on the PGA TOUR without much fuss or fanfare. He occasionally will knock on the door of champions' room, but it has had to be satisfied with walking away with a nice check instead.

While he has not won during his 16 years on the TOUR he has learned to live with it. He said not too long ago, "hopefully, I'm a late bloomer and my best years are still to come."

Even without the elusive victory, he has won well over \$1 million during the last five years.

Twice over the years he has lost titles in playoffs - in 1985 to Bernhard Langer in the MCI Heritage Classic and in 1979 to Lou Graham in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. Graham came from six strokes behind the last day, shooting a 64 to catch him.

Overseas, he has been more successful and in strong events, too. He won the 1978 European Open and twice has captured the Dunlop Phoenix titles, in 1979 and 1986. That's one of the biggest tournaments in Japan.

As comfortable as he is on the golf course, however, he is even more so in a bass boat or hunting ducks and geese.

Bobby is approximately 20-months younger than his brother, Lanny, and while Lanny was more spectacular on the national amateur level and now during his years on the TOUR, they both were standouts in junior golf around their home territory of Richmond, Va.

They kept the city junior title in the family for six straight years, with Lanny winning four.

Through the years, Bobby and Lanny have worked on their games together, but a couple of years ago, Bobby went to Peter Kostis for extra help. The results have been dramatic.

After high school--where he also was a standout basketball player--Bobby headed for the University of Houston and his two closest friends there--and now--were Bill Rogers and Bruce Lietzke.

After one year, though, he transferred to East Tennessee State and earned All-American status in 1972 and 1973.

He earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1974.

Lanny Wadkins surely will go down in golf history as one of the outstanding players of all time. He has compiled such a brilliant record that it is impossible to single out his greatest achievement. He has won the PGA Championship, THE PLAYERS Championship and the World Series of Golf.

Seven times he has won at least two tournaments in the same season and, in 1985 when he won three times, he was named the PGA Player-of-the-Year. Through the years, he has won 19 times and played on six Ryder Cup teams.

Lanny's approach to the game is quite simple, really. He attacks the course constantly. "I've never thought of myself as being that aggressive," he has said, "but, everyone says I am, so I must be. It's the way I've always played and I get a big kick out of it."

Last year he came through with a marvelous performance to win the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic at Williamsburg, VA, by five strokes over Larry Mize. A native of Virginia, it was especially pleasing since it came not far from where he grew up in Richmond.

He won the 1977 PGA Championship in a playoff over Gene Littler at Pebble Beach; and later that summer, won the World Series in a marvelous performance at Firestone.

Two years later, when weather conditions bordered on the unplayable, with wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour, he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass with a 5-under par total of 283--five better than runner-up Tom Watson.

He won the U.S. Amateur championship in 1970.

When Denis Watson was asked to give an assessment of his performance in 1984, he smiled and said, "It was an incredible result to a lot of hard work; a couple of years of hard work."

He joined Tom Watson as the only three-time winner on the PGA TOUR in 1984; came within a whisker of winning PGA Player-of-the-Year honors; and finished fourth on the money list with \$408,562. Compare that, if you will, with his 1983 total of \$59,284, which was his previous best.

Actually, his brilliant performance was centered on three tournaments in a seven-week span late in the summer. He broke through with a victory in the Buick Open, thanks to a 63-68 finish.

After he was 33rd in the PGA Championship, he won the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club. He shot a course record 8-under-par 62 the second day and stayed in front the rest of the way to collect a check for \$126,000. He missed the cut in his next two outings, and then won the TOUR's richest payoff of \$162,000 in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational.

While he enjoyed a good season in 1985, he said, "I was within a couple of shots of an unbelievable year." True enough. He finished tied for second in the U.S. Open, just one stroke behind Andy North. Trying to defend his World Series of Golf title, he was tied with Roger Maltbie after three rounds, but Roger shot an exceptional 66 the last day to win it and Denis finished second.

Injuries in three of the last four seasons have slowed his progress but he is hopeful that an operation in the summer of 1989 will prove profitable in the long run.

There were several factors that boosted him into prominence. First of all, he has been working for several years with David Leadbeter on his golf swing; and has worked on the mental aspects of the game with Dr. Bob Rotella of the University of Virginia. He gives them both considerable credit.

His father started him in the game when they lived in Rhodesia. He was 14-years old at the time, and two years later, his handicap was down to a one. "That's when I started to think about turning professional."

He played all sports, including cricket, rugby, tennis and competed in track and field, but golf was his love, no doubt about it. He turned pro when he was 19.

"Gary Player and Dale Hayes said I should give the TOUR a try," Watson said. "Then Gil Morgan told me he thought my game was well suited for the American courses and even Howard Twitty encouraged me to come over here. So, I did."

Denis earned his TOUR card in the Spring of 1981.

Tom Watson's position as one of the all-time greats in the history of golf is unquestioned. For many years, he was the dominant player in the game. The fact that he was the PGA Player-of-the-Year a record six times and the leading money winner five times attests to that.

He has won five British Opens, two Masters Tournaments and one United States Open. He has won 32 times on the PGA TOUR.

As long as the game is played Tom will be remembered for the brilliantly-executed pitch shot he made from off the 17th green at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open.

As you recall, his 2-iron off the tee on the par three hole bounced in heavy rough on the left side of the green. He was tied with Nicklaus, who already had completed his round. Par seemed the absolute best Tom could do. Instead, he hit the perfect shot, and holed it for a birdie two. He went on to birdie the last hole and win his first Open by two over Nicklaus.

In 1987, he nearly won his second Open, but lost by one stroke to Scott Simpson at the Olympic Club. Possibly, the sweetest victory came in the fall of 1987 in the Nabisco Championships in San Antonio, TX. He was vintage Watson as he led all the way to capture the \$360,000 winner's check. As he said, "I'm probably the happiest man in the world today."

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won six times on TOUR, plus the British Open, and won a record \$530,808. He was the first player to break the half-million dollar mark.

D. A. Weibring is one of the more popular players in the game, so anytime he works his way into contention, he has a lot of people pulling for him.

That certainly was the case at the rain-shortened 1987 Beatrice Western Open when he turned back the challenge of Larry Nelson and Greg Norman to win by a stroke. Over the years, he has shown an ability to do well in the more significant championships. He finished second to Calvin Peete in the 1985 Tournament Players Championship. It took a final round of 6-under-par 66 by Peete to beat him. D.A.'s 11-under-par 277 was worth \$97,200.

He tied for fourth in the PGA Championship in 1986 and was tied for third in the 1987 PGA, just one stroke out of the Nelson-Lanny Wadkins playoff. Two years ago, he finished tied for third in the U.S Open.

He also is sprouting out into the business world and has joined with a few friends to form Golf Resources, Inc. The company will work in the areas of design, renovation and agronomic consulting and management.

D.A. has had some very good years but injuries also have cut into his effectiveness. A wrist injury at the 1983 Phoenix Open cost him a couple of months. There were times when the wrist continued to bother him and in November of 1989, surgery was performed on the right wrist and it limited his ability to play early in 1990.

Starting at the Kemper Open, he began to play very well again with a tie for third at the Bank of Boston Classic his best in a run of eight straight cuts.

His first victory came in the 1979 Quad Cities Open. He was tied with Calvin Peete through 14 holes the last day, but D. A. took charge at the par five 15th, registering an eagle and taking the lead to stay.

It was a popular victory. A graduate of Illinois State University, D. A. had a number of his followers from his hometown of Quincy, IL, there to cheer him on. He said, "If I had to pick a place to win my first tournament, the Quad Cities would be it."

He explained how the use of his initials came about.

My father's name also is Donald Albert, and when I was a youngster, Mom decided she didn't want me to be called 'Little Don,' or 'Junior,' so she started to call me D. A. It has been with me ever since."

Mark Wiebe has become one of the solid players in the game and, at his current rate of progress, there appears to be no limit to what he can accomplish.

He came on strong in 1985 to win the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic in a playoff over John Mahaffey. He won the 1986 Hardee's Golf Classic with rounds of 69, 65, 66, and 68 for a 12-under-par 268.

It was a good year in 1986 for other reasons, too. He had four rounds in the 60s as he finished second in the Byron Nelson Classic. He also tied for third place in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His earnings, obviously, increased significantly.

"The best part of the year was in September," he said. "That's when Taylor Lynn was born and then Gunner came along in 1989. They're special to us."

His victory in the Anheuser-Busch Classic came after he three-putted the final hole for a bogey and dropped back into a tie with Mahaffey. On the first extra hole, however, he ended it quickly with a long birdie putt.

Three years ago, he nearly won the Anheuser-Busch Classic again. A third round 64 put him in position and then a final round 68 gave him a tie with Tom Sieckmann at 14-under-par 270. Unfortunately for Mark, Tom won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole. A few other strong finishes helped him to his best money year.

As expected, he followed up with another solid campaign in 1989. A tie for second place in the Shearson Lehman Hutton Open highlighted the year.

Last year he went over the \$200,000 mark for the fourth time in the last five years. Two of his biggest paydays came toward the end of the season. He tied for fifth place in the Canadian Open and then used a final round of 64 to finish second to Nolan Henke in the B.C. Open.

He collected \$108,350 in those two events.

A two-time high school player of the year, Wiebe attended Palomar Junior College in California and won the state junior college title before going on to star at San Jose State.

Upon leaving the Spartans for whom he earned All-America honors, he decided to join the PGA TOUR. He would be frustrated in his attempts more than once, but finally made it at the Fall, 1983 Qualifying Tournament.

A considerable part of the credit, he says, goes to Carl Welty of the LaCosta staff.

Willie Wood came back last year with a new determination to succeed and he did just that. One of the more likeable players in the game, his efforts delighted his colleagues.

He nearly won for the first time at the Hardee's Golf Classic. Instead, he lost a playoff to Joey Sindelar as he bogeyed the first extra hole. It appeared as if Willie might win in regulation, but he bogeyed the 17th and Sindelar birdied the 18th to get the tie.

Nevertheless, Willie was not too disappointed. "My goal at the start of the year was to get my exempt status again and I did."

In fact, 1990 was his best money year ever on TOUR. In addition, he did win a non-TOUR event, the Oklahoma Open.

Willie went through a period of nearly three years when it was extremely difficult for him to play. His wife, Holly became seriously ill and eventually passed away due to cancer in 1989.

"I could never concentrate on golf," Willie said. "At times it just didn't seem important."

Willie started in the game at age nine and it was a natural sport for him. His father, Willard, was the head professional at the Shreveport (LA) Country Club at the time. "He's a teaching pro in Lake Charles now," Willie said, "and he still is my only teacher. And, my older sister Oeanie has played on the LPGA tour."

Willie accepted the challenge of competition immediately and he has been successful at every level of the game. He won numerous junior titles, the most impressive being the 1977 USGA Junior; the 1978 PGA National Junior and the 1979 Western Junior.

He went on to Oklahoma State University and proceeded to win nine collegiate events. In 1982, he was named the College-Player-of-the-Year. In 1983, he was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team.

In the 1984 Anheuser-Busch Classic, he was leading by four strokes after three rounds but Ronnie Black came from seven strokes back with a brilliant 63 to win by one. "I had an even-par 71 which wasn't too bad," Willie said, "but Ronnie just played great the last day."

His all-time low score was a 61 at the 49ers Club in Tucson. He was in senior high school at the time, and had two eagles, nine birdies and two bogeys

Every year on the PGA TOUR there are storybook tales and in 1987, Robert Wrenn was the author of one of them.

The year started slowly for Robert and by mid-summer, he only had a little more than \$15,000 in earnings for the year. He entered the Buick Open, almost unnoticed.

An opening round of 7-under-par 65 drew him a little attention. His second round of 9-under-par 63 tied the course record and people sat up and took notice that this young man could indeed play the game.

Still, though, many expected the 27-year old to fade under the pressure of the weekend. They were wrong, very wrong.

A third round score of 67 put him at 21-under-par 195 for 54 holes and eliminated virtually any doubt that here was the tournament winner. He started the final round with a six-shot lead and quickly extended it with birdies on two of the first three holes. He then took dead aim at the PGA TOUR's all-time record of 27-under par for 72 holes.

A birdie on the 17th hole put him at 26-under and he hung a chip for birdie on the lip on the final hole to finish at 262 and win by seven shots over his nearest competitor. He collected \$108,000 for his efforts, over \$30,000 more than he had won in his first two and a half years alone.

In 1989, he played brilliantly in the Las Vegas Invitational and his 24-under-par 336 for the five rounds put him into a tie with Scott Hoch. Unfortunately for Robert, Scott birdied the fifth extra hole to win it. However, Robert collected \$135,000 for finishing second.

An 8-under-par 62 in the final round of the 1988 Texas Open let him finish second alone to Corey Pavin.

Robert was a third-year professional out of Wake Forest when he first made it in the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1984. He had a moderately-successful first year but struggled in his second year of 1986. It was all part of the learning experience.

Robert (it is Robert, not Bob) was introduced to the game at age 12 by his father Bob (his mother is Bobbie) and he eventually progressed well enough to earn a scholarship to Wake Forest where he earned a degree in Communications in 1981.

Robert started to work with Scott Davenport of Sea Island in 1986 and David Leadbetter in mid-1987 and he credits them for his improved play.

Bob Wolcott knew when he was in high school that, someday, he would play on the PGA TOUR. Now, he can say, "dreams do come true."

He tried four times to make it onto the TOUR without success but finally found the secret in the Fall of 1988. However, his first season of 1989 was not as profitable as he had hoped it would be.

He went back to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1989 and made it again. He made the most of his opportunity last year, easily earning exempt status for this year.

Even though 1989 was not a good year, he said he learned a lot about the game and about himself.

"I had put the guys on the TOUR so far out there ahead of me," he said, "that I didn't think I could ever meet the expectation that I put on myself. I shouldn't have done that, but I did learn to have more self-confidence from those experiences."

He started last season slowly, making the cut in only two of his first 11 starts. Then he made six in a row with a tie for third place in the Anheuser-Busch Classic his best. He won \$58,000 that week.

Sadly, he reported that his father had passed away about a year earlier and "he would have been so proud and thrilled" of his effort at Kingsmill.

Knowing that now he was in position to earn his exempt status for 1991, Bob put together three more good weeks at the Greater Milwaukee Open, Hardee's Classic and Canadian Open that assured him of his position among the top 125 money winners.

Bob started to play at about age 5, going with his father, a dentist, to the Dickson (TN) Country Club to play. His first competition was at age 15 "in junior events around the club."

After he won the Dickson Club junior championship, he started to travel around the area to other tournaments. "I knew then, most definitely, that golf was my game," he said.

He won the Tennessee State High School championship in 1979 and also added the State Junior title to his collection. He won the State PGA Junior championship three times.

In 1978, he was the runner-up to Willie Wood in the PGA National Junior championship, losing in a playoff.

He went on to Wake Forest University on an Arnold Palmer Scholarship but after one semester, he transferred to the University of Georgia.

During those years, he won two Tennessee State Amateurs, the 1983 Tennessee State Open and in 1984 he won the Missouri and Arkansas State Opens.

With the strong support of his wife Valerie, he was on his way to his goal - the PGA TOUR.

Jim Woodward knew he could play this game because he had enjoyed success at all levels--except on the PGA TOUR.

After working through the 1980s as a club professional, he wanted to see just how good he could become. He wanted to give the TOUR a try.

He got his chance last year after going through the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1989. With one of his hearty laughs, he said, "I didn't feel old as a rookie at age 33 because I had taken a sabbatical from competition."

A tie for 12th in the Hawaiian Open gave him an early boost but it wasn't until late in the year when he nailed down his exempt status for this year. A final-round 66 at Glen Abbey boosted him into a tie for second place in the Canadian Open--just one stroke behind winner Wayne Levi.

The check for \$88,000 was just enough.

Jim remembers how he was watching golf on television with his father one day and that was how he became involved with the game.

"I was only eight-or-nine years old," the personable fellow said, "and I saw Gary Player make a putt to win \$20,000. After Dad told me I could make that much money playing golf, I decided that was the way I was going to go.

"After I started to play in junior tournaments, I found golf to be more fun for me than the other sports."

He went on to win at every level. He won such events as the 1975 Oklahoma State high school title; the Oklahoma State Amateur and the Southern Amateur, both in 1978. And, twice he won the California State Open.

After he was graduated from Oklahoma State University, he went the route of the club professional; first as an assistant pro at Oak Tree in Edmond from 1981 through early 1984.

He then moved on to become the head professional at Wood Ranch in Simi, CA, from late 1984 through early 1987.

He qualified for the 1987 U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco and last-round 69 moved him into a tie for 17th place.

Soon after, he started to think about the possibility of playing on the TOUR. In the fall of 1989, he started to work with Dick Harmon in Houston and received the boost he needed with his game.

"Doug Tewell took me under his wing," Jim said, "and told me I didn't have to play great every week, just figure out a way to become exempt."

And, that's just what he did.

Fuzzy Zoeller is regarded as one of the outstanding players in the game. A United States Open Championship crown and a Masters Tournament title are enough to insure his place in history.

His position as one of the game's all-time personalities and favorite of the galleries is unquestioned.

Few people, however, really know what Fuzzy has had to endure to reach such a lofty status; or have stopped to wonder how much greater his impressive record would be if he had been healthy all these years.

Those close to him knew of his back problems, but it wasn't until the week of the 1984 PGA Championship at Shoal Creek, AL, that the sports world became aware.

He arrived in Shoal Creek amid a torrent of publicity because of his performance in winning the U.S. Open a few weeks earlier at Winged Foot. In the Open, he was tied with Greg Norman after 72 holes, and the next day, he won the 18-hole playoff by eight strokes, 67 to 75.

The morning he was to play his first round in the PGA, his back was so painful he barely could move. He was rushed to the hospital and remained there for nearly a week.

A month later, he was in Las Vegas to defend his title in the Panasonic Invitational, but his back condition worsened and he went to the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City. The diagnosis was that a "couple of discs had ruptured." Unfortunately, surgery was necessary.

Fuzzy was back on TOUR in 1985 for the Doral-Eastern Open at the end of February. He was delighted to tie for 46th place. The next week, he tied for 20th in the Honda Classic and then he won the Hertz Bay Hill Classic by shooting 66-67 the last two days.

"The back problem started when I was playing high school basketball," he explains. "I was submarined and the back has bothered me from time-to-time ever since."

Despite the problems, Fuzzy was terrific in 1986, winning three times.

He was on the TOUR for five years before he won, but he did so impressively. In 1979 he won the Andy Williams San Diego Open and also the Masters.

Richard Zokol continues to find ways to improve his golf game, but he also is looking forward to helping others, as well.

He is involved in establishing an Academy of Golf in his native Vancouver area "for the purposes of developing the leading junior program in Canada," he said.

As far as his TOUR career is concerned, he enjoyed another good season in 1990 and for the second time, he nearly won again. He shot two 65s and two 66s for an 18-under-par 262 but lost by two strokes to Peter Persons in the Chattanooga Classic.

In the 1988 Hawaiian Open, he was leading by two strokes going into the final round after a 65 on Saturday. He battled Lanny Wadkins down to the final hole before bowing by a stroke. Lanny shot a 66 en route to victory.

He enjoyed a good year in 1987, too, with three top 10 finishes. One was a tie for seventh place in the Canadian Open. He collected five-figured checks in six of his last seven starts.

Even more important, his wife, Joanie, presented him with twin sons on October 14, 1987. Last summer, Hayley was added to the family.

When Richard was working on his golf game during his teenage years in his native Canada, he always kept an eye on Jim Nelford.

"I didn't know him then," Richard said, even though they both were from the Vancouver area. "Jim was a couple of years ahead of me and he seemed to win everything. When he went on to Brigham Young University, I could see how much his game improved, so I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

When it was time for Richard to head for college, he wrote to Karl Tucker, the golf coach, to inquire about the possibilities of going there. "He told me that since I didn't have a good amateur record, they couldn't offer me a scholarship," he recalls.

Soon afterwards, Zokol and Nelford were competing against each other in the British Columbia Amateur and after three rounds, Zokol was leading. "We talked about it, and Jim said he would call the coach and recommend me. The next thing I know, Coach Tucker said I should come down to Provo.

"The day after the tournament, I drove 24 hours straight through, and entered the school without a scholarship, but I was there. I made the team and for three years, I roomed with Bobby Clampett."

He enjoyed an especially proud moment at the 1984 Canadian Open. He tied for fifth place, and that represented the best finish by a Canadian in their national championship in 26 years.

MERRILL LYNCH SHOOT-OUT SERIES

A real winner in its first four seasons, the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series will return bigger and better than ever in 1991.

A 10-man competition covering nine holes of play, the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series will be held at 22 different PGA TOUR events in 1991 with the top players collecting \$4,000 from the \$12,650 purse.

What is a Shoot-Out? The format is easy to understand and a pleasure to watch. Ten players begin and on each hole, and the player with the highest score is dropped from the field. Should ties exist, a sudden death playoff is held requiring each of the players involved to execute a pitch shot, a chip or a long putt. The player farthest from the hole is eliminated.

The field for each Shoot-Out consists of that tournament's defending champion, the six leading money winners entered into that tournament and three sponsor selections. At season's end, a Shoot-Out championship will be held (date and place TBA) in which 10 players will vie for \$250,000 in prize money, with \$90,000 going to the winner. John Mahaffey won the title last year at Troon North CC in Scottsdale, AZ.

The field for the final competition consists of the top five money winners on the 1991 PGA TOUR Official Money List, the top three money winners from the season-long Shoot-Out Series and two sponsor selections. The 1991 Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series Competition's will be held on the Tuesday of tournament week.



THE VARDON TROPHY

The Vardon Trophy is awarded each year by the PGA of America to the PGA TOUR player who posts the season's best scoring average. The system was amended in 1988 to allow all TOUR members to compete for the prestigious award provided they have played in 60 rounds. The new system also uses an "adjusted" score for purposes of computing the scoring average. The adjusted score is computed based upon the average score of the field at each tournament. As a result, a player's adjusted score may be higher or lower than his actual score. For example, a player shoots 70 each day at a tournament while the field average was 73. His 280 total would then be adjusted to 268 since he actually played 12 shots better than the field did during the tournament. The Vardon Trophy is a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" by 27".

Each year the PGA of America honors the TOUR's leading player by presenting him with the PGA Player of the Year Award.

The award now is made on the basis of playing record for the year. Points are awarded on the following basis: 30 points to winner of Masters, U.S. Open, British Open, PGA Championship. 20 points to winner of THE PLAYERS Championship, NEC World Series of Golf. 10 points to winners of all other co-sponsored or approved events. Points also awarded to top 10 on the year's money list and top 10 on year's scoring average list (20 for first, 18 for second, 16 for third, etc. down to 2 for 10th).

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of the two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursome matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five foursomes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side was expanded to include all British PGA/European TPD members who are residents of European nations.

The 1991 Ryder Cup Matches will be played September 26-29, 1991 at Kiawah Island, SC

THE RYDER CUP

The USA PGA squad selection is based upon an accumulation of Ryder Cup points from the beginning of the calendar year 1989 through the 1991 PGA Championship. The top ten point-getters qualify for the 12 man team. The 1991 PGA Champion, provided he meets eligibility requirements, is also an automatic team member. Then the U.S. Captain will select an additional player to complete the team. If the 1991 PGA Champion is currently among the top ten point-getters then the captain will pick another player to complete the team.

Points are awarded to the first ten positions in each PGA TOUR event on the following basis:

PGA Championship, U.S. Open, Masters Tournament and the British Open: 1st-125; 2nd-90; 3rd-80; 4th-70; 5th-60; 6th-50; 7th-40; 8th-30; 9th-20; 10th-10.

All other PGA TOUR events: 1st-75; 2nd-45; 3rd-40; 4th-35; 5th-30; 6th-25; 7th-20; 8th-15; 9th-10; 10th-5.

If a player who is ineligible finishes in one of those positions, no points are awarded for that position. In order to be eligible, a player must be a U.S. citizen and a member of the PGA of America.

MEDIA REGULATIONS

THE GENERAL REGULATIONS

The following regulations are to be followed by *all* members of the Media:

1. An **ARM BAND** is necessary to walk inside the galley ropes. Remain *not more than an arm's length from the ropes*, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be a part of the gallery at all times.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. **DO NOT** interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their round.
3. **DO NOT** interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions prior to their round except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by **PRIOR ARRANGEMENT WITH THE PLAYER** and up against the ropes and **NOT** in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.
5. **DO NOT** disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.

WORKING PRESS REGULATIONS

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading players each day—and others requested—will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

TAPE RECORDER REGULATIONS

1. All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubhouse.
2. Tape recorders are **NOT** permitted in the locker room.
3. Tape recorders are **NOT** permitted within the playing area of the golf course unless written permission has been granted from the PGA TOUR and/or the tournament sponsor.

RAIN DELAY GUIDELINES

1. During rain delay situations, **NO ONE** other than players and essential staff will be permitted in the locker room. This means the Media is not permitted in the locker room in such situations. However, whenever possible, arrangements will be made to provide players for interviews during such situations.
2. Fully accredited members of the news media **WILL BE WELCOMED** into the locker room at all other times to carry out their assigned duties. (Note: Cameras and tape recorders are **NOT** permitted.)

This Tournament is essentially for the players and spectators. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players interests. The result of any one shot could decide the Tournament.

Only **ACCREDITED PHOTOGRAPHERS** for **RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA** will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photo assistants may be issued a credential, but not photo arm bands for access inside the ropes. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a ProAm). Free lance photographers shooting on speculation will **NOT BE ACCREDITED**.

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and videotape cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

PHOTOGRAPHY REGULATIONS

GENERAL—ALL PHOTOGRAPHERS

- A photographer must not ask a player to pose or in any way verbally distract a player during a round.
- If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.
- A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.
- At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper official. Under the Rules of Golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in stroke play may be disqualified.
- Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.
- Use of golf carts or other means of transportation on the course during tournament play is prohibited.

STILL PHOTOGRAPHERS

- Only still photographers to whom armbands have been issued will be permitted inside gallery ropes. They must station themselves immediately inside such ropes, and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE ROPES, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open. Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to working inside the ropes and possibly to work at the tournament.
- Close-up action shots are prohibited.
- All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.
- When working at a green, photographers must not position themselves directly in a player's putting line.
- Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

TELEVISION/VIDEOTAPE CAMERAMEN

- Television and videotape filming may be done from inside the gallery ropes, or from areas approved by the PGA TOUR. All camera personnel who have been issued PHOTO armbands will be permitted inside the gallery lines but this does not include other members of the crew. Camera personnel must station themselves immediately inside the gallery lines, not more than an arm's length from those lines, so as to blend into the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.
- Filming may be done from such locations during a player's stroke, provided modern equipment that produces a minimum of noise is used.
- Post-round interviews must be filmed far enough away from the arena of play to eliminate the possibility of distraction to those competing.

Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.

The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.



ASHAI GLASS WORLD MONEY LIST

The Asahi Glass World Money List consists of all official money won in each of the four participating golf circuits (U.S. PGA TOUR, PGA European Tour, Japan PGA, Australia/New Zealand PGA Tour).

The Asahi Glass World Money List was initially formulated as a qualification vehicle for the 1985 World Championships of Golf. It has become evident since then, however, that the list provides a standard by which world-class players could be compared, regardless of whether or not they competed regularly in head-to-head competition.

Since the initial list was compiled, many have come to believe that this list will ultimately become the world standard for judging professional golfers' performances on an international basis.

The 1991 Asahi Glass World Money List will be compiled from Sept. 1, 1990 through August 30, 1990 in order to best accommodate the various start and finish times of the four circuits involved. On the PGA TOUR, the 1991 Asahi Glass World Money List will end on August 25, 1991 at the NEC World Series of Golf.

The 1991 Asahi Glass Four Tours World Championship of Golf will be held November 7-10, 1991 at the Royal Adelaide GC in Adelaide, Australia.

SONY WORLD RANKING

Originally formulated in 1986, the Sony World Rankings received the PGA TOUR Board approval for the first time in 1990 after the Sony Advisory Committee, at the request of the TOUR, agreed to a series of modifications to the system.

The rankings are compiled each week following the conclusion of all world events. The top finishers in these events are awarded points according to their respective finish. Since the Sony World Rankings employ a rolling three-year period weighted in favor of the most recent play, points accumulated over the current 52-week period are multiplied by four, points earned over the previous 52-week period are doubled and points from the first 52-week block are simply added to the total.

Each player then is ranked according to his point average which is earned by dividing his final number of points by the number of starts he has made over that three-year period. A player must, however, play in at least 20 events per annum. Should he play in less, his divisor will still be 20.

After this process is completed, the top 100 players are listed with ratings points being assigned each position. The number one player receives 65 points, the runnerup 60 and so on down to the players from 76-100 who earn one point apiece.

One of the new changes for the 1990 season provided that virtually all tournaments are weighted solely on the strength of their respective fields. Each event totals the number of ratings earned by the top 100 players from the Sony list in its field. A sliding scale has been created to reflect the number of points each tournament awards to top finishers according to the strength of its starting field. For example, a tournament winner from the strongest field possible will earn 50 points (X4) while a winner from a moderately strong field would take home something more along the line of 25-30 points (X4).

Since the 1990 season began with players already ranked according to the old method, the rankings will not completely reflect the changes that have been made. However, the TOUR is comfortable with the new system in that it will provide a usable method of comparison of players from around the world, and gradually reflect the TOUR's requested changes.

The rankings will be available each week at TOUR sites. The current top 20 as 1991 begins:




